SUNDAY OF DIVINE MERCY SECOND SUNDAY OF EASTER

7 APRIL 2024 3:00 P.M. From the diary of a young Polish nun, a special devotion began spreading throughout the world in the 1930s. The message is nothing new, but is a reminder of what the Church has always taught through scripture and tradition: that God is merciful and forgiving and that we, too, must show mercy and forgiveness. But in the Divine Mercy devotion, the message takes on a powerful new focus, calling people to a deeper understanding that God's love is unlimited and available to everyone - especially the greatest sinners.

The message and devotion to Jesus as The Divine Mercy is based on the writings of Saint Faustina Kowalska, an uneducated Polish nun who, in obedience to her spiritual director, wrote a diary of about 600 pages recording the revelations she received about God's mercy. Even before her death in 1938, the devotion to The Divine Mercy had begun to spread.

The message of mercy is that God loves us - all of us - no matter how great our sins. He wants us to recognize that His mercy is greater than our sins, so that we will call upon Him with trust, receive His mercy, and let it flow through us to others. Thus, all will come to share His joy. It is a message we can call to mind simply by remembering ABC:

- A Ask for His Mercy. God wants us to approach Him in prayer constantly, repenting of our sins and asking Him to pour His mercy out upon us and upon the whole world.
- B Be merciful. God wants us to receive His mercy and let it flow through us to others. He wants us to extend love and forgiveness to others just as He does to us.
- C Completely trust in Jesus. God wants us to know that the graces of His mercy are dependent upon our trust. The more we trust in Jesus, the more we will receive.

Devotion to The Divine Mercy involves a total commitment to God as Mercy. It is a decision to trust completely in Him, to accept His mercy with thanksgiving, and to be merciful as He is merciful.

"This Feast emerged from the very depths of My mercy, and it is confirmed in the vast depth of My tender mercies...It is My desire that it be solemnly celebrated on the first Sunday after Easter...I desire that the Feast of Mercy be a refuge and shelter for all souls, and especially for poor sinners. On that day the very depths of My tender mercy are open. I pour out a whole ocean of graces upon those souls who approach the fount of My mercy."


ORDER OF CELEBRATION

THE CHAPLET OF DIVINE MERCY

SIGN OF THE CROSS

In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. **Amen.**

OPENING PRAYERS

You expired, Jesus, but the source of life gushed forth for souls, and the ocean of mercy opened up for the whole world. O Fount of Life, unfathomable Divine Mercy, envelop the whole world and empty Yourself out upon us.

(*Prayed three times*):

O Blood and Water, which gushed forth from the Heart of Jesus as a fount of mercy for us, I trust in You!

THE OUR FATHER

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name; thy kingdom come; thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread; and forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us; and lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. Amen.

THE HAIL MARY

Hail Mary, full of grace, the Lord is with you; blessed are you among women, and blessed is the fruit of your womb, Jesus. Holy Mary, Mother of God, pray for us sinners now and at the hour of our death. Amen.

THE APOSTLES' CREED

I believe in God, the Father almighty,
Creator of heaven and earth,
and in Jesus Christ, his only Son, our Lord,
who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary,
suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died and was buried;
he descended into hell;
on the third day he rose again from the dead;
he ascended into heaven, and is seated at the right hand
of God the Father almighty;
from there he will come to judge the living and the dead.

Holy God, Holy Mighty One, Holy Immortal One, have mercy on us and on the whole world.

CONCLUDING PRAYER

Let us pray.

Eternal God,
in whom mercy is endless
and the treasury of compassion — inexhaustible,
look kindly upon us
and increase Your mercy in us,
that in difficult moments we might not despair
nor become despondent,
but with great confidence
submit ourselves to Your holy will,
which is Love and Mercy itself.
Amen.

Presider:

God is the Father of all mercies. In him we place our faith as we pray the following petitions:

Deacon or Reader:

All: Lord, hear our prayer.

For all who have committed grave sin and who are afraid to go to confession: that their fears will dissolve in the face of Jesus' longing to forgive and be reconciled to them, let us pray to the Lord.

All: Lord, hear our prayer.

For those who serve in public office:

that they govern with true compassion for the lives of the most vulnerable among us—especially unborn children, the elderly, and persons with disabilities, let us pray to the Lord.

All: Lord, hear our prayer.

For parents:

that, by their guidance and the witness of their own lives, they will teach their children how to love and forgive when they have been wronged, let us pray to the Lord.

All: Lord, hear our prayer.

For the protection of conscience rights and religious liberty, and that all people of good will may work together against the increasing threats to these fundamental rights, let us pray to the Lord.

All: Lord, hear our prayer.

For peace throughout the world, especially in Ukraine and other areas of conflict: that ancient prejudices and hatreds will be replaced by a spirit of mercy, peace, and unity, let us pray to the Lord.

All: Lord, hear our prayer.

For those who have turned away from God: that, through the guidance of the Holy Spirit, they may find the strength to return to our merciful Father and be strengthened in a life of Faith, let us pray to the Lord.

All: Lord, hear our prayer.

For all who have died: that, through the rich mercy of God, they may see the face of the Risen Jesus in heaven,

All: Lord, hear our prayer.

Presider:

Almighty and merciful Father, we give you thanks for all of your many blessings, and we ask you to hear these petitions in the name of your Son, our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, God, for ever and ever.



Blessed be the name of Mary, Virgin and Mother.

May the heart of Jesus, in the Most Blessed Sacrament, be praised, adored, and loved with grateful affection, at every moment, in all the tabernacles of the world, even to the end of time.
