



The Sixth Sunday of Easter

Acts 10:25-26, 34-35, 44-48; Ps 98:1, 23, 3-4

1 John 4:7-10; John 15:9-17

In today's Gospel reading from Saint John, Jesus says, "As the Father loves me, so I also love you. Remain in my love." The Lord closes this passage by saying, "This I command you: love one another." In one form or another Jesus tells us to "Love one another" eleven times in the Bible. St. Paul also includes this commandment in his writings as do others, including passages in the Old Testament. Obviously, one could do an entire reflection on what this love means, what it entails, but it has a much greater depth than just talking about it. "Love," like "discipleship" implies action.

There is something impressive about St. Peter as reflected in the First Reading from the Acts of the Apostles. Peter has clearly grasped what Christ meant when He instructed His followers to "Love one another, as I have loved you." The passage begins with Peter arriving at the house of Cornelius, who in deference to Peter, falls at Peter's feet to pay him homage. Peter's response says everything to us about how to treat others and how we ourselves need to view our own lives.

Peter says, "Get up. I myself am also a human being." Prior to that Peter lifts Cornelius up. The deep faith of Cornelius is well documented in Acts. We learn that Cornelius sent his servants to get Peter and bring him there. Cornelius had certainly heard of Peter and knew of his past and his involvement with Jesus. However, Cornelius also realized that he was a Gentile, and so there may have been some fear on his part that Peter might reject him, or even hesitate to enter his house. Peter's response to this show of respect from Cornelius is an example of the love about which we are speaking. Peter felt that Cornelius should not show this reverence to Peter, and Peter also felt he should not receive it.

Peter would be the first to tell Cornelius and others that the reverence offered him should be offered to Jesus Christ Himself. As Jesus said, we are to love as He loves us. Peter did that.

If we know Jesus, we understand that He is filled with power, wisdom, truth, holiness, devotion, submission, sacrifice, and many other traits. Yet, He chooses to summarize it for us quite simply by saying, "As the Father loves me, so I also love you. Remain in my love." That really says it all, doesn't it? It all seems so simple, but we know what kind of an effort real love requires. That is the effort we are called to put forth in our daily lives.

Ascension of the Lord - May 13

A gentle reminder that in the Province of Baltimore, to which the Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston belongs, the Solemnity of the Ascension of the Lord is observed on the Seventh Sunday of Easter (this year on May 13) rather than on the Thursday after the Sixth Sunday of Easter. The Feast of the Ascension is important to Catholics as an integral part of the redemptive work of Christ, beginning with His betrayal, suffering and death, followed by the Easter celebration of his resurrection and concluding with the coming of the Holy Spirit on Pentecost.

Living Our Faith

What do the titles of Mary mean?

Through the years, the Church has come to call the Blessed Virgin Mary by many different titles. The titles do not indicate different people, but all represent Our Lady. When the Church gives Mary a title, the intent is not to diminish Jesus or to raise Mary in any way to Jesus' level, which is not possible. Rather, the titles help us to better understand Jesus by understanding who Mary is. For example, when we call Mary "Ark of the Covenant," we are acknowledging Jesus as the New Covenant: Mary, as the Ark, bears the incarnate Word of God. As with everything Our Lady does, Mary points to Jesus to guide us toward heaven through the revelation of her titles.

The titles of Mary have come from various sources. Some of them are declared by popes, such as the "Immaculate Conception." Others have come from Scripture, such as "Queen of Heaven." (Rv 12:1) Still others come from the locations of Our Lady's apparitions or her messages during apparitions, such as "Our Lady of Fatima." Perhaps the most important title of Mary is "Theotokos," which is Greek for "God-bearer" or "Mother of God." This title was declared by the Council of Ephesus in 431. Again, this title does not glorify Mary, but helps us to understand Jesus as the Word made flesh, born of the Virgin as one man with two natures: human and divine.

Mary's titles allow us to connect with our Blessed Mother in unique ways, and they provide a good means of meditation. We invite you to pray the Litany of Loreto, which we pray in the Cathedral every Tuesday following the 12:05 p.m. Mass, to gain a better understanding of Mary's important role in the life of Our Lord and Savior:

Passion Revisited

It is known as devotion, fury, dedication, affection, joy, ecstasy, rapture, anger, excitement, suffering, devotion, and intensity. "Passion is defined as a strong inclination toward a self-defining activity that people like (or even love), find important, and in which they invest time and energy on a regular basis. The self-defining activity represents a feature of one's identity. The activity defines oneself. The activity becomes an inherent part of who the person is." (Robert J. Vallerand, PhD)

How passionate are you? What passion makes you feel the happiest? Is your passion about religious beliefs strong and unwavering? Do religious beliefs define who we are, how we act, and think? Are we passionate in being a Christian or Catholic or do we just call ourselves Christian or Catholic? In comparison, I have known musicians and artists who are passionate about their talents. I have also known people who play a musical instrument and like to draw and paint. There is a difference. Musicians, who are a violinist, flutist, guitarist, pianist, organist, or maybe a clarinetist, spend many hours practicing and perfecting their talents. An artist may be captivated by the picture in their mind as they attempt to create the picture on canvas, in stone, wood, or clay. This captivation may go on for hours, days or longer until they are completely satisfied with their creation. Someone who only plays a musical instrument or likes to draw or paint when the urge or boredom overcomes them, are they considered inspirational to others?

Bringing my thoughts close to home, as it is said. Do we go to Mass, say the rosary, and say prayers when the urge overcomes us? Do we have such passion about our Christian faith that we are identified as a Christian or Catholic by our behavior, our kindness, and caring

for others? Do we inspire others with our freely chosen passion for Jesus? Does wearing a cross on a chain around one's neck define them as someone who believes in God, knowing who Jesus is, and the sacrifice Jesus made for us, or is it only a piece of jewelry? Vallerand describes two types of passion. One is harmonious passion. This passion is freely chosen for the pleasure that comes from the activity. People pursue the activities that provide harmonious passion because they want to, not because they may please someone else. This type of passion provides satisfaction with one's life. Obsessive passion is the wanting to please others or to maintain a certain status that is important to self-esteem. It can become unmanageable, controlling one's life. Our passion for Jesus and his teachings has survived over centuries. These teachings have brought comfort to those who have felt as an outcast, who have sinned against God and neighbor, and those who have lost religious faith for a time. The passion that every man and woman feels in turning to a religious life has helped sustain this passion. This passion is one that exists to help others through prayer, and caring for those in need. From the prophets of the Old Testament, to the Apostles, and the generations of those who chose a religious life, they all lived their passion for our Triune God. They have taught us how to pray for ourselves and others. They have shown us how to ask forgiveness. They have set an example of how we should treat others. They have taught us through words and examples how to live each day with our passion for Jesus and how to share this passion with others. Kind of sounds like being a parent doesn't it? As parents, aunts, and uncles, we are passionate in the care of our children, and family. We pray for them, and care for their needs.

We want our family to grow in faith, and in the desire to help others. We are a complex creation, aren't we? We have feelings and emotions that may complicate our life. It seems we are in constant need of direction in life with the many wants and desires that tempt us. We look for examples to follow, for heroes to look up to or emulate. We all want to be loved and cared for. We all want comfort and security. We all have passions in life, harmonious or obsessive. All the passion for which we search is found in Jesus. This Passion has survived centuries and is compared to none. But this passion must be nurtured and practiced. We should be constantly learning of the passion Jesus has for us which only increases our obedience and passion for Him, and compassion for others.

ABOUT OUR PARISH

This Week with the Saints

May 10 - After years of missionary work in the Hawaiian Islands, **Saint Damien de Veuster** (1840-1889), a young priest from Belgium, sought to align himself even more with the “crucified” in society. He requested to be stationed on the island of Molokai where the lepers and diseased were sent to die. Outraged by the deplorable conditions of the island, he sought to restore a sense of dignity. Within a short period of time, the sick were living in clean houses instead of caves, and upon death they were given a proper burial rather than being dumped into mass graves. Even though leprosy was highly contagious, he chose to remain in close contact with the people. Damien eventually contracted the disease and died from it. He was recently canonized by Pope Benedict XVI on October 11, 2009.



May 12 - The information we have regarding the lives of **Saints Nereus and Achilleus** († end of 1st c.) comes from an ancient inscription written in their honor by Pope Damasus I. While serving as second-century praetorian soldiers, they had a conversion experience resulting in the choice to relinquish their weapons for the Gospel of peace. Because they refused to succumb to idol worship, they were beheaded during the reign of Trajan (98-117).

Also on May 12, **Saint Pancras** (†304), a Roman martyr, was a casualty of the Diocletian persecutions. After moving to Rome he converted to Christianity, thus making him a target of the anti-Christian ideology of the reigning emperor. He was beheaded at the age of fourteen, giving rise to a strong cult of followers. Stemming from St. Pancras’ popularity among the faithful, a monastery in Rome and a church in Canterbury were dedicated to him.

Pope: Faith says ‘no’ to Satan, ‘yes’ to God

VATICAN CITY (CNS) — Baptism requires rejecting Satan and professing one’s full faith in God, Pope Francis said. Only by being able to say “no” to the devil, his works and empty promises “am I able to say ‘yes’ to God, who calls me to conform myself to him in thoughts and deeds,” he said.

“It is not possible to follow Christ (while) imposing preconditions,” he said May 2 during his weekly general audience in St. Peter’s Square. Continuing his series of talks on the sacrament of baptism, the pope looked at the importance of the heart being ready to receive the gift of new life from God through the baptismal water and the Holy Spirit. When a child is presented for baptism, its parents and godparents renew the vows of their own baptism in rejecting sin and professing faith in Jesus.

“Either you are with God or with the devil,” the pope said, which is why the renunciation of sin and the profession of faith are “two acts tightly connected to each other.” One must break with the past and its sinful attachments, “leaving them behind in order to embark on the new way, which is Christ” and to be able to “truly embrace others,” he said. “The devil divides and God always unites the community, the people” in one body, he said.

During the baptismal rite, he said, the individual is asked to respond in the first person, to reject evil and profess his or her faith as a sign of choosing to be personally responsible in this daily commitment of trusting in God and walking with him. The profession of faith reflects a commitment - aided by baptism - to be strong and persevere throughout all of life’s trials and temptations, he added.

They are required throughout life, he said, and “the presence of the Holy Spirit will give you the strength to fight well” against evil and temptation.

Whenever people bless themselves with holy water, he said, they should recall with joy and gratitude the gift they received on the day of their baptism and they ask for the grace to persevere and live “immersed” in God’s love.
