Well, ask away. I have all the answers, as if you didn't know.

Me: You know me so well after all our conversations. Well, I mean, you know us all. You know what we are thinking. You know...

God: Are you going to ask your questions or ramble?

Me: Both! I do have questions. I always have questions. Every city I visit, I see homeless people. They are camped out everywhere it seemed in San Diego. Their belongings were stored in garbage bags and old luggage. They pushed everything they owned in shopping carts. They slept on benches, in doorways, the grass in parks and sidewalks. They used cardboard as a mattress.

Some sat together, talked and laughed as they shared food from a greasy stained bag. Others stared straight ahead. They appeared oblivious to all around them. Some people stared and pointed at them. Others walked by without a notice. Why are there so many homeless? What are we doing wrong? What are they doing wrong?

God: There are several reasons why my children become homeless. They may have a mental illness and don't know how to properly care for themselves. There may have been a loss of a job and the inability to find another suitable to keep their home. They may have been on the receiving end of domestic

violence. They may have been orphaned at a young age which caused a lack of hope and family love in their life. They may be dependent on mind altering drugs. Come now, you know these answers. For whatever reason someone becomes homeless, it is up to you and everyone else to take care of them. You were told to take care of the poor, hungry and homeless by My Son. Are you feeling guilty about something? You can't hide your thoughts from me. The homeless and hungry have been around long before My Son walked the earth. Their existence will continue until the Day of Judgment. My Son told you to take care of others. He is an example for all that is good. You are to follow his teachings. Do not boast when your help the poor. Your help should be given with humility not expecting praise. You are all my children. "...I want a day that you take the burdens from others. I want a day when you set troubled people free and you take the burdens from their shoulders. I want you to share your food with the hungry. I want you to find the poor who don't have homes and bring them into your own homes. When you see people who have no clothes, give them your clothes. Don't hide from your relatives when they need help. If you do these things, your light will begin to

swer would not do. You would not have accepted an easy answer, now would you?

Me: Of course I would...not. But how can we let others be hungry, without shelter and proper clothing? Yes, I guess I do feel guilty that I have not done more to help.

God: Bring to mind those days when you were so involved with a project you did not stop for lunch or even dinner until early evening. When you finished, the hunger pains grew. For you and many others, you have food in your home to eat. You have a choice. For the homeless, they may not have a choice. They eat what is given to them at a shelter.

That is the good food. They may have to eat what they can find that has been discarded by others. Is this why you feel guilty? Is your conscience bringing on this guilt? You know I gave everyone this inner sense of right and wrong. The Holy Spirit teaches what is right and wrong from my Word. As you can see, I am very complex. Inspiration comes from the words of My Son in helping the poor. The guilt to do something comes from within.

Me: I understand about guilt. You most of all know our feelings of guilt. The problem of the homeless is like a water pipe with leaks. One leak is fixed, but another appears. It is endless. I know we try to bring awareness of this problem to others. But it never goes away. The homeless and hungry have been around, as you say, before Jesus walked on the earth. Why can't we make a difference now?

God: My children are not perfect, regardless of their own personal views of themselves. You are making a difference, a little at a time. Each article of clothing given for the poor helps cloth my children. Each box of food given feeds them. Each hand extended helps pick them up from the cold ground on which they sleep. Your guilt

is not meant for you to hide. It is to inspire you to help.

Me: I do so enjoy our conversations. But why do I feel guilty after each one?

God: You are my child. You are still learning right and wrong. Guilt will be ever present in your life. Without it, you will not fear punishment or want to make amends. I have not made a perfect child, only perfect souls. Should we talk of intrinsic and psychological values of the soul or are you finished with your questions for now?

Me: I am done for now. As always, you have left me with more to pray and think about than with a direct answer. Maybe this is how you keep me questioning and talking to you each day.

God: You are learning my child.

Born of a farming family in Sotto il Monte in northern Italy in 1881, Angelo Guiseppi Roncalli was ordained a priest in 1904. After serving in World War I as a stretcher-bearer, he was later made national director of the Society for the Propagation of the Faith. In 1925 he became a papal diplomat, serving in Bulgaria, Turkey, and in France. With the help of Germany's ambassador to Turkey, Roncalli helped save an estimated 24,000 Jewish people during World War II. Named a cardinal and appointed patriarch of Venice in 1953 by Pope Pius XII, he was elected pope in 1958 at age seventy-eight. He took the name John after his father and the two patrons of Rome's cathedral, St. John Lateran. He convoked the Second Vatican Council; his most famous encyclicals were Mater et Magister and Pacem in Terris. "Good Pope John" died of stomach cancer June 3, 1963. His feast day, Oct. 11, recalls the day of the first session of the Second Vatican Council. Declared a Blessed in 2000, he was canonized, together with Pope John Paul II, by Pope Francis on April 27, 2014.
