From Father Sateesh

"Jesus the Shepherd, Searches, and Saves us!"

During this Easter season we are given many signs of the presence of the Risen Lord. We see his presence when he appears to the apostles after he has risen. We also see his presence in the community formed around the Risen Lord, and the witnessing of the apostles. Today we are



given one more characteristic of the Risen Lord, his care for his sheep, and all who belong to his flock. As people of the Resurrection, we are assured that He is our Good Shepherd. Do we care about others?


In today's first reading we see the power of the Risen Lord, which had transformed Peter who preaches eloquently and takes on the establishment. Peter was speaking to the elders, the scribes, Pharisees, and Sadducees, a powerful opposition for an uneducated fisherman, yet he and the other apostles displayed courage as they confront them head on. "If we are being questioned and asked how this man was healed, let it be known that this man is standing in good health by the name of Jesus of Nazareth. Peter could have taken the credit for the miracle. Peter has learnt his lesson and knows that if he relies on himself, he will fall, but his confidence is in the Lord who never fails. Peter moves from the immediate fact of the healing to the thing signified, namely the power of the gospel of Jesus Christ.

One of the most beautiful descriptions of God given by Jesus is contained in today's gospel reading where he proclaims: "I am the good Shepherd. The good shepherd lays down his life for his sheep." Jesus was the visible sign of God's constant care for his people. In our present-day set-up, the image of the shepherd may be alien to us but in Palestine the shepherd was a common figure in the country-side. The shepherd in Palestine led his flock, he did not drive them as shepherds elsewhere did. The shepherd literally lived with his flock, spent most of the day and night with them. Though there were hundreds of sheep belonging to different shepherds, the shepherd knew his own and his own sheep recognized his voice and followed him to the pastures. The good shepherd cared for the sheep to the point of death. He does not just surrender his life for his sheep, but he gives his life willingly, as He said at the last supper.

Today is Good Shepherd Sunday, a good time to pray for the good shepherds as well as the bad ones; and a good time to realize that the Good Shepherd still walks with us. Let us try to become more loving people. Love has the power to do things which hatred does not. I pray that the experience of this personal love of Jesus may bring about a transformation which our world is so much in need of today. May we discover the Risen Lord our God Shepherd always caring for us!

Special Collection for Recovery Efforts

THIS WEEKEND - APRIL 20 & 21 Efforts continue across the Mou

Efforts continue across the Mountain State after the severe flooding that occurred earlier this month. West Virginia encountered tornados, microbursts, strong winds, heavy rains, and mudslides. Several counties have experienced moderate-to-substantial flooding, notably along the Ohio River and its tributaries. The National Weather Service has confirmed 5 tornadoes in West Virginia – Huntington (Cabell/ Wayne), St, Albans (Kanawha), Cross Lanes (Kanawha), Quick (Kanawha) and Lavista (Fayette). A State of Emergency has been declared in 17 West Virginia Counties.

Most Rev. Mark Brennan, Bishop of the Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston, has approved a special collection to be held the weekend of April 20-21, 2024, in all parishes and missions throughout the diocese to support recovery efforts related to the series of disasters that have occurred. Checks should be made out to your respective parish with "Disaster Relief" on the memo line. Donations can also be made on the diocesan website at https://dwc.org/disaster-relief/.

Proceeds from this collection will support the long-term humanitarian and recovery efforts of Catholic Charities West Virginia. Their offices assist families long after other organizations have moved out. The role of Catholic Charities will last months and years as they help families and individuals in the rebuilding process to restore safe, secure, and sanitary living conditions. All of the money raised will stay in West Virginia to assist our neighbors.

Please remember in prayer all those whose lives have been changed in the wake of these disasters. Let us come together now to support our brothers and sisters in Christ who have been injured and lost their homes, cars, employment, and access to food and water.




This year marks the 61st Anniversary of the World Day of Prayer for Vocations on April 21, 2024.

The purpose of this day is to publicly fulfill the Lord's instruction to, "Pray the Lord of the harvest to send laborers into his harvest" (Mt 9:38; Lk 10:2). As a climax to a prayer that is continually offered throughout the Church, it affirms the primacy of faith and grace in all that concerns vocations to the priesthood and to the consecrated life. While appreciating all vocations, the Church concentrates its attention this day on vocations to the ordained ministries (priesthood and diaconate), consecrated life in all its forms (male and female religious life, societies of apostolic life, consecrated virginity), secular institutes in their diversity of services and membership, and to the missionary life.

Will you make a special effort to ask the Lord for vocations to the priesthood and religious life? Pray for the priests who have ministered to you throughout your life, both living and dead. Encourage your children, grandchildren, or other young people to consider a vocation as a priest or religious brother or sister. Pray a rosary for more young men and women in our diocese to respond to God's call.

Solemnity of the Dedication of the Cathedral April 21; Observed This Year on Monday, April 22

On April 21, 2024, we celebrate the 98th Anniversary of the Dedication of the Cathedral of Saint Joseph. Because this day falls on a Sunday this year, it is observed on Monday, April 22. Throughout the Diocese, the date of the dedication of the Cathedral is important. The anniversary of dedication is celebrated as a feast for all the parishes of the diocese. At the Cathedral itself, this special date is celebrated as a Solemnity.



Thomas G. Simons, author of *Holy People, Holy Place: Rites for the Church's House* writes: "The celebration of the anniversary of the dedication of the parish church building is an often forgotten opportunity to celebrate the life of the local church and re-emphasize to the people the importance of the gathering place for God's holy people. It is an occasion in which sacred identity and local history become tangible. The continuity of the faith from generation to generation is celebrated" (68).

The Cathedral is called the "mother church" because it houses the bishop's cathedra (seat), from which it receives the name. The *Ceremonial of Bishops* tells us that "The cathedral, the sign of diocesan unity, is the place where that unity can be given concrete expression. For all these reasons, it should be a model of liturgical life, both in architecture and in celebration. (42 ff.)

The Cathedral of Saint Joseph is home to Wheeling's oldest Catholic community, dating to 1822. It has been the liturgical heart of the Diocese of Wheeling (originally) since the Diocese's erection by Pope Pius IX in 1850 and is an architectural and artistic treasure in both the city and state.

In 1847, the Cathedral was moved from its former location further south to the corner of Eoff and 13th Street, and the Church was titled to Saint James the

Apostle. In 1805, St. James became the Cathedral of the Diocese, with Bishop Richard V. Whelan as the first bishop of Wheeling.

In 1872, in response to the rising devotion to Saint Joseph, Husband of Mary throughout the universal Church and the burgeoning labor movement among the Catholics of the coal fields, Bishop Whelan petitioned Rome to change the title of the Cathedral to honor Saint Joseph.

Bishop Patrick Donahue became Bishop of Wheeling in 1894. Donahue conceived a design and began to interview possible architects, eyeing Edward J. Weber of Pittsburgh, a rising star in Church architecture, as a likely candidate. Bishop Donahue's death in October 1922, before work had even begun may have scuttled all plans, were it not for a serendipitous fire in 1923 that did significant damage to the Cathedral structure.

The fire cleared the way for Bishop John J. Swint, the fourth Bishop of Wheeling, to begin the construction of the new Cathedral, with the help of Weber and a team of artisans. In two short years, the new Cathedral was completed and church was dedicated on April 21, 1926.

Pro-Life Provision For the Journey

The Vatican (specifically, the Dicastery for the Doctrine of the Faith) just published Dignitas Infinita, or Infinite Dignity, about our God-given worth and needs. All humanity possesses this infinite dignity – regardless of our circumstances

– which we must honor, cultivate, and protect, from the womb, onward. Dignitas Infinita reminds us of these timeless Truths, our timeless Beauty, and the responsibilities of this timeless Goodness.

It also highlights thirteen violations of human dignity, ending with digital violence. It notes, "The internet, in particular, offers immense possibilities for encounter and solidarity." However, "the digital environment is also one of loneliness, manipulation, exploitation, and violence, even to the extreme case of the 'dark web," noting that "Such tendencies represent the dark side of digital progress."

Month of the Holy Eucharist

The month of April is dedicated to devotion to the Holy Eucharist. This tradition has developed because Easter Sunday often falls in April, and when it does fall in March, the Easter season continues on through all of April. In essence, April is a month of Easter, and during the Easter celebration we remember the Eucharistic sacrifice Christ gave us and the baptism in the Holy Spirit, which would come after Jesus's resurrection.

At the Last Supper, surrounded by His Apostles, Jesus gave to the world the most sublime gift of His Real Presence by instituting the Sacrament of the Eucharist – His Body, Blood, Soul, and Divinity. Jesus took bread and pronounced the words: "Take and eat, this is my Body"; then He took a cup of wine and said: "Take and drink, this is my Blood. Do this in memory of me." With these words Jesus instituted the greatest of all of the Sacraments, the Sacrament of the most Holy Eucharist.

Ways to Honor the Holy Eucharist

- Truly prepare yourself to receive Christ in the Holy Eucharist by arriving early to Mass and spending time in prayer.
- If you are not in the state of grace before receiving Holy Communion, go to confession
- Spend time in Eucharistic Adoration

SAINTS OF THE WEEK

April 23 - St. George, martyr (275-303)

St. George of Lydda was a soldier under Diocletian, likely a military tribune, who resigned his commission rather than follow orders to participate in worship of Roman gods and was subsequently martyred. George demonstrated great faith and courage when he defied Diocletian at the cost of his life. *Patronage*: knights; soldiers

St. Adalbert, bishop, martyr (956-997)


St. Adalbert served as a missionary at the pope's request, evangelizing pagan populations in Prague and in Prussia until his martyrdom. Twice Adalbert tried to trade episcopal life for the quiet of a monastery, but he was obedient to his call to the mission field and died as an example of heroic faith.

April 24 - St. Fidelis of Sigmaringen, priest and martyr (1577-1622)

St. Fidelis was a Capuchin friar known for his learning, charity, and devotion, whether serving as prior in Germany or preaching to former Catholics in the north of France, where he was martyred by Calvinists. His combined wisdom and humility allowed Fidelis to convert many by his example.

April 25 - St. Mark, evangelist (d. 1st century)

St. Mark is the author of the second Gospel which he wrote between AD 60 and 70. He was not an apostle, as were Matthew and John, but he was close to Peter. His simple and direct Gospel account was one of the main sources for the other evangelists. Mark's portrayal of Jesus is very human and serves as a model for us to "go into the whole world and proclaim the Gospel to every creature" (Mk 16:15). *Patronage*: Egypt; Venice; notaries

Commemorating 100th Anniversary of Benwood Mine Disaster in Prayer

Sunday, April 28 at 4:00 pm Mt Calvary Cemetery, Wheeling

The Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston invites the public to a special prayer service at 4pm, Sunday, April 28, at Mt Calvary Cemetery, 1685 National Road, Wheeling, to commemorate the 100th anniversary of the Benwood mine disaster.

The event will honor the lives of 119 men and boys, who lost their lives as a result of two explosions within the Wheeling Steel Coal Mine in Benwood on April 28, 1924.

While the miners were from the surrounding communities on both side of the Ohio River, the majority were immigrants from Poland, Greece, Italy, Hungary, Russia, Serbia, Croatia, Lithuania, and Ukraine. Notably many were also Catholic, belonging to St. John Parish in Benwood and St. Ladislaus in South Wheeling. The memorial on April 28th this year will take place at the site at Mt. Calvary, where the largest mass burial in Wheeling ever took place. On May 5, 1924, 22 miners were buried during a service that was conducted in three languages. Others were later buried at Mt. Calvary, but in different areas.

Victims of the disaster including those miners who were burned beyond recognition were buried in a mass grave at Greenwood Cemetery across the street.

WHY DO WE DO THAT? Catholic Life Explained:

Pilgrimages

Question:

What is a pilgrimage? Why do people go on them?

Answer:

A pilgrimage is a spiritual journey to visit a holy site, such as the shrine of a saint, a place where the Blessed Virgin Mary has appeared, or an historic church or chapel. What makes a pilgrimage different from a vacation and a pilgrim distinct from a tourist is the spirit in which the journey is made. Pilgrimages are really a symbol of our spiritual journey in life, reminding us that this world is not our true home and that we spend our lives journeying to our homeland, which is the Kingdom of God.

Pilgrimages — which can be as involved as a trip to Rome or the Holy Land or as simple as visiting the Blessed Sacrament in a local parish church — are also an opportunity for us to step out of the rhythms and limits of our daily lives to seek out connection with God in a special way, by visiting a holy place. At times, such as on a special feast, a jubilee, or the anniversary of the dedication of the church, special graces (called "indulgences") can also be offered to pilgrims, helping to enrich our experience of the celebration.

In the end, pilgrimages are an ancient act of devotion and something that each of us can put into practice, helping us to discover how God is present in the world around us, in places both near and far.
