"I am the vine, you are the branches!"

Today's liturgy reinforces the intimate relationship between Christ and his disciples. The first reading narrates how God's grace can change the lives of individuals who seem to act against God's plan like Saul of Tarsus who later becomes Paul. The second reading encourages us to grow



in closeness to Christ by keeping God's commandment.

In the Gospel, Jesus employs the metaphor of the vine and the branches, a familiar image for his listeners to reveal that He is not a regular person we can arbitrarily accept or reject. In referencing the Hebrew scripture, in which Israel is the vineyard and God the vinedresser, he discloses himself as the fulfilment of God's promise to Israel. Jesus, the Logos made flesh, is the embodiment of the power by which God creates and sustains the world. It means anything that exists, exists through him.

He is not a teacher we can decide on whether to listen to or follow. Jesus is our life - without life we are dead. It doesn't take a rocket scientist to figure this out; he is the power through which we exist, from moment to moment. We are related to him on all levels of our existence. There is never a moment we live outside of him. He is in the well-articulated words of Bishop Robert Barron "a force in which we participate. A body in which we are cells and molecules, a river in which we swim". Independent of Him, we the branches can bear no fruit. In the absence of an authentic intimate relationship with Jesus, we can bring forth nothing. A branch does not and cannot sustain itself, its existence is tied up to the vine. Its survival is conditioned by the vine. They are inseparably one. The branch has the same nature as the vine, it has one life and one spirit with the vine and has one object for which it exists that is to bear fruit. It derives its sap from the vine, it has nothing except what the vine provides. In the same manner, we have only one reason as branches of God the vine. We are fashioned in God's image and likeness.


Remaining grafted to Jesus is not without pain and suffering, God allows us to go through trials and suffering even when we are united to him. This is a pruning process that he carries out to enhance better growth. God prunes our ego; he prunes us of all bad influences and those things that may distract us and hamper our relationship. We may claim to be disciples of Jesus; believing in Him and knowing his commandments, yet, what distinguishes the real disciples from the fake disciples is that of fruitfulness. What kind of branches are we and what efforts are we putting in to remain grafted to Jesus the vine?

ST. LOUIS GRIGNION de Montfort

We remember St. Louis de Monfort on April 28. St. Louis de Montfort was born on January 31, 1673. He was a French Catholic Priest and Confessor. He was known in his time as a preacher, and was made a Missionary Apostolic by Pope Clement XI. He authored several classic Catholic books that influenced many Popes. He is best known for his devotion to the Blessed Virgin Mary and the practice of consistently praying the Rosary. He is accredited as one of the early proponents of the field of Mariology as it is known today. He is a candidate of becoming a Doctor of the Church. His most notable works are "The Secret of Mary" and the "True Devotion to Mary". Truly - he set the example for each of us to have a personal relationship with Mary, the Mother of Our Lord.

Why We Need Eucharistic Adoration

Eucharistic Adoration is the adoration of Jesus Christ present in the Holy Eucharist. In the many Churches, the Eucharist is displayed in a special holder called a monstrance, and people come to pray and worship Jesus truly present before us. Christ's great love for us was shown when he was crucified on the cross to pay the penalty for our sins and give us eternal life. He loves us without limit, and offers Himself to us in the Holy sacrament of the Eucharist. Can we not give Jesus a few minutes of love and adoration in return?

Some Catholics think that we can gain grace from the Eucharist only in the Mass by receiving Holy Communion. This idea limits the power and the love of Jesus too much. Certainly participation in the sacrifice of the Mass and receiving Holy Communion is the most powerful source of grace for us, but it is not the only source of Eucharistic grace. After the sacrifice is completed, the sacrament continues on. Jesus, in His sacramental body and blood remains here with us as our friend, just as He promised. This is why Eucharistic Adoration is so important.

This is why we should visit our friend, Jesus, in the Blessed Sacrament, to return His love for us and to draw spiritual strength and nourishment and encouragement from that love.

Listen to what Pope St. John Paul II said: "The Church and the world have a great need of Eucharistic worship. Jesus waits for us in this sacrament of love. Let us be generous with our time in going to meet Him in adoration." Notice how he is asking you to be generous with your time. He is not asking for your money but something much more precious – your time.

Spending time with Jesus in adoration should not strike us as unusual. It is really a very natural human activity. When two people love each other, they want to spend time together to visit, to get to know each other better.



You cannot love someone you do not know. Adoration of our Lord in the Eucharist is your chance to know Jesus better.

One of the best aspects of Eucharistic adoration is this: how you spend your time with Jesus is entirely up to you. You spend your time with Jesus any way you want. You can pray your Rosary, you can read your Bible, or you can do some other spiritual reading or devotional prayers. But we must always remember, you are there to visit with your friend, Jesus. Talk with Him; tell Him your problems, your needs or your concerns. Tell Him about your joys, too. Chances are He doesn't hear about those very often! But most important, stop and listen, let Jesus do some of the talking. He's been waiting for a chance to visit with you, but your life is so busy with work, family and school, your line is always busy. Jesus can't get through to you. It's time to give yourself a break.

The whole purpose of our human existence is to live forever with the Blessed Trinity in heaven. We get a foretaste of that eternal happiness and peace when we visit and adore Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament. This is why thousands of people from all over the world will testify that one hour each week with Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament is the most peaceful, the most satisfying hour of their whole week.

The month of May is the "month which the piety of the faithful has especially dedicated to Our Blessed Lady," and it is the occasion for a "moving tribute of faith and love which Catholics in every part of the world pay to the Queen of Heaven. During this month Christians, both in church and in the privacy of the home, offer up to Mary from their hearts an especially fervent and loving homage of prayer and veneration. In this month, too, the benefits of God's mercy come down to us from her throne in greater abundance" (Paul VI: Encyclical on the Month of May, no. 1).

This Christian custom of dedicating the month of May to the Blessed Virgin arose at the end of the 13th century. In this way, the Church was able to Christianize the secular feasts which were wont to take place at that time. In the 16th century, books appeared and fostered this devotion.

The practice became especially popular among the members of the Jesuit Order — by 1700 it took hold among their students at the Roman College and a bit later it was publicly practiced in the Gesu Church in Rome. From there it spread to the whole Church.

Ways to Honor Our Lady

- · Learn or pray a new Marian devotion (Regina Caeli, Litany of the Blessed Virgin Mary, Novenas to Our Lady, etc.)
- Decorate a statue of Our Lady with flowers
- Imitate Mary's deep humility, obedience, and faith

SAINTS OF THE WEEK

April 29 - St. Catherine of Siena, virgin, doctor of the Church (1347-1380)

St. Catherine of Siena was a Dominican tertiary and mystic, the twenty-fourth of twenty-five children. In spite of family opposition, she dedicated herself to Christ at a very young age and at the age sixteen, she withdrew from her family to lead a life of intense prayer. When she emerged, she began to dedicate herself to care for the sick and poor. Her joyful spirit attracted a number of followers. After a series of mystical experiences, Catherine felt compelled to write letters to those in secular and Church authority. We can look to Catherine as an example of a person who dialogued with Jesus in prayer, loved those he loved, and built bridges of reconciliation and trust. *Patronage:* Europe

April 30 - St. Pius V, pope (1504-1572)

St. Pius V was a Dominican theologian, elected pope in 1566. His primary task as pope was to implement the reforms of the Council of Trent, which had concluded three years before. During his pontificate, seminaries were reformed, a new Missal was published, and the Catechism and Breviary were revised. Pius retained his white Dominican habit when he became pope; since that time all the popes have worn white.

May 1 - St. Joseph the Worker


The Memorial of St. Joseph the Worker is a relatively new addition to the calendar, established by Pope Pius XII in 1955 in order to Christianize the concept of labor and give to all workmen a model and a protector. By the daily labor in his shop, offered to God with patience and joy, St. Joseph provided for the necessities of his holy spouse and of the Incarnate Son of God, and thus became an example to all laborers.

May 2 - St. Athanasius, bishop, doctor of the Church (c.295-373)

Athanasius kept the orthodox beliefs of the Church and fought against Arianism, the heretical belief that God created a son who was neither coeternal nor coequal with the Father. He persevered in right teaching, even when the majority was participating in heresy.

May 3 - Saints Philip and James, apostles (d. 1st century)

As apostles, Philip and James were part of Jesus' inner circle. Philip introduces his friend Nathaniel to Jesus, and points to Jesus as the source of nourishment in the feeding of the five thousand. Both Philip and James died as martyrs, shedding their blood for the sake of the Gospel.

Commemorating 100th Anniversary of Benwood Mine Disaster in Prayer

Sunday, April 28 at 4:00 pm

Mt Calvary Cemetery, Wheeling

The Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston invites the public to a special prayer service at 4pm, Sunday, April 28, at Mt Calvary Cemetery, 1685 National Road, Wheeling, to commemorate the 100th anniversary of the Benwood mine disaster.

The event will honor the lives of 119 men and boys, who lost their lives as a result of two explosions within the Wheeling Steel Coal Mine in Benwood on April 28, 1924.

While the miners were from the surrounding communities on both side of the Ohio River, the majority were immigrants from Poland, Greece, Italy, Hungary, Russia, Serbia, Croatia, Lithuania, and Ukraine. Notably many were also Catholic, belonging to St. John Parish in Benwood and St. Ladislaus in South Wheeling. The memorial on April 28th this year will take place at the site at Mt. Calvary, where the largest mass burial in Wheeling ever took place. On May 5, 1924, 22 miners were buried during a service that was conducted in three languages. Others were later buried at Mt. Calvary, but in different areas.

Victims of the disaster including those miners who were burned beyond recognition were buried in a mass grave at Greenwood Cemetery across the street.

WHY DO WE DO THAT? Catholic Life Explained:

Canonized Saints

Question:

How does a person become a canonized saint?

Answer:

It is important to remember that all the saints are people, real people who lived just as we do! The first saints of the Church were martyrs or theologians known for a holy life. Over time, the Church has established a set process to investigate the causes of saints.

After a holy person's death, the bishop of their diocese initiates the canonization process with the Vatican. Typically, they must wait five years to ensure any false enthusiasm has lessened. With Vatican approval, the process begins and the person receives the title "Servant of God." The first phase involves collecting information about the person's life and scrutinizing it carefully. One person has the specific role of raising doubts — this is the origin of the phrase "devil's advocate!" When it is clear the person truly lived a heroically holy life according to Church teaching, they are declared "Venerable."

If the person is a martyr for the faith, they will also be declared "Blessed." If the person is not a martyr, they must be credited with a miracle. This is also closely examined for authenticity. Once the miracle is authenticated as truly a miracle performed by God through the person or through their intercession, they are beatified. An additional authenticated miracle is required before canonization, and we can call them "Saint."
