

"My Lord and my God!"

Everything that happens evokes a response. What is your personal response to the Resurrection? A man fell in a ditch. Realist: That's a ditch. Optimist: Things will get better. Pessimist: Things will get worse. Newspaper reporter: I will pay you for an exclusive story about life in the




ditch. City: Did you get a permit for your ditch life? Mathematician: I will calculate the length and depth and width of the ditch. Income tax agent: Have you paid your taxes for the ditch? A Man: "Give me your hand!" and his name is Jesus of Divine Mercy.

The first reading from the Acts of the Apostles describes the salient features of the early Christian community. The Acts tell us that soon after the resurrection more and more believers were added to the Lord. It should be noted that the text says, 'these were added to their number', which suggests that it was not the apostles, but God who added to their number. It was God's work and not men's efforts that caused the multitude to join their ranks. Many signs and marvels were worked at the hands of the apostles not by their own power but by the Risen Lord who was alive in their midst. Jesus is always alive in His Church, and it is He who grants the increase and He who is the heart of the living Church. It is said an empty tomb proves Christianity; an empty Church denies it.

The episode of Thomas missing the first apparition of the risen Lord is exclusive to the gospel of John. Everyone tends to focus on Thomas the doubter, but the fact is that almost everyone had doubts about the risen Lord and was as doubting as Thomas! They could not believe that he was alive, so Jesus had to be patient with them and give them signs in his many apparitions to them. In this episode Jesus comes to the frightened disciples and shows his pierced hands and feet and offers them his peace. The apostles are filled with joy but still have their doubts and fears, so he reassures them, "Peace be with you!" After giving them his Spirit of peace the risen Lord sends them out on a mission to go and share his peace and forgiveness with others. We are all called to be his witnesses and channels of peace and forgiveness. If we cannot forgive others, we cannot receive his peace. Thomas, we are told, was not present when the Lord appeared to the disciples and when told of the Lord's appearance, he voices his doubts strongly. "Unless I see the holes that the nails have made and put my hand into his side I refuse to believe!" We may judge Thomas harshly for his doubts but often we do the same and put terms and conditions for our belief. The risen Lord was patient and took Thomas at his word and appeared to him and asked him to see and feel for himself. "Doubt no longer but believe." God treats us likewise. He comes down to our level and acts on our terms. But the challenge is to believe without proof, for that after all is the basis of faith. God gives us no proofs but plenty of signs of his presence and love. Can we like Thomas cry out: "My Lord and my God!" May the Risen Lord help us to doubt no longer but believe!



Second Sunday of Easter 3



The Solemnity of the Annunciation was first celebrated in the fourth or fifth century. Its central focus is the Incarnation: God has become one of us. From all eternity God had decided that the Second Person of the Blessed Trinity should become human.

Mary has an important role to play in God's plan. From all eternity, God destined her to be the mother of Jesus and closely related to him in the creation and redemption of the world. We could say that God's decrees of creation and redemption are joined in the decree of Incarnation. Because Mary is God's instrument in the Incarnation, she has a role to play with Jesus in creation and redemption. It is a God-given role. It is God's grace from beginning to end. Mary becomes the eminent figure she is only by God's grace. She is the empty space where God could act. Everything she is she owes to the Trinity.

The Solemnity of the Annunciation of the Lord is normally celebrated on March 25 - nine months before Christmas; however, it was transferred this year because that date fell during Holy Week.



Month of the Holy Eucharist

The month of April is dedicated to devotion to the Holy Eucharist. This tradition has developed because Easter Sunday often falls in April, and when it does fall in March, the Easter season continues on through all of April. In essence, April is a month of Easter, and during the Easter celebration we remember the Eucharistic sacrifice Christ gave us and the baptism in the Holy Spirit, which would come after Jesus's resurrection.

At the Last Supper, surrounded by His Apostles, Jesus gave to the world the most sublime gift of His Real Presence by instituting the Sacrament of the Eucharist – His Body, Blood, Soul, and Divinity. Jesus took bread and pronounced the words: "Take and eat, this is my Body"; then He took a cup of wine and said: "Take and drink, this is my Blood. Do this in memory of me." With these words Jesus instituted the greatest of all of the Sacraments, the Sacrament of the most Holy Eucharist.

Ways to Honor the Holy Eucharist

- Truly prepare yourself to receive Christ in the Holy Eucharist by arriving early to Mass and spending time in prayer.
- If you are not in the state of grace before receiving Holy Communion, go to confession
- Spend time in Eucharistic Adoration

SAINTS OF THE WEEK

April 11 - St. Stanislaus, bishop and martyr (1030-1079)

Noted for his concern for the poor, St. Stanislaus was bishop of Krakow. He was martyred for declaring that an unjust king had no place in the Church. *Patronage:* Poland

April 13 - St. Martin I, pope and martyr (598-655)

St. Martin I was a Roman of noble birth and had a reputation for intelligence, learning, and charity. He fought against the Monothelite heresy, which claimed that Jesus had two natures—human and divine—but only one will.

WHY DO WE DO THAT? Catholic Life Explained:

Divine Mercy Sunday

Ouestion:

Where did the feast of Divine Mercy come from?

Answer:

If you were born well before the year 2000, you know the feast of Divine Mercy has not always been celebrated in the Church. In the early 1900s, a young Polish nun began receiving private revelations. Jesus appeared to her during her times of prayer, speaking a message of mercy and love for the world. She received a set of prayers — the Divine Mercy Chaplet — and the request to have a feast day established to remind the Church of the mercy of God. St. Faustina died in 1938, on the cusp of war and in the midst of one of the most violent centuries in the history of the world.

Her story and her diaries began circulating in Poland and beyond. It quickly became apparent that this was a holy young women, and the cause for her canonization opened. In the year 2000, she was canonized by the first-ever Polish pope, St. John Paul II. On her canonization day, he established the second Sunday of Easter as Divine Mercy Sunday, "a perennial invitation to the Christian world to face, with confidence in divine benevolence, the difficulties and trials that mankind with experience in the years to come."
