"Prepare the way for the Lord!"

We are used to announcements that inform us that something is going to happen, or someone expected is arriving. At airports, we hear announcements of the arrival of a plane that we are awaiting. If there is someone whom we love arriving, that announcement fills us with



joy, and we get all excited because we will soon see the one we are waiting for. The good news given to us is that God is coming soon! Do we look forward to his arrival? Are we prepared to welcome Him?

In the first reading the prophet Isaiah assures the people that the period of harsh discipline is over, and God will come with forgiveness for his people. He will lead them back to their homeland and the difficulties along the way will disappear as God himself will journey back with his people.

In today's Gospel, Mark highlights the example of John the Baptist, who prepared the way for the coming of the Lord. His role was to be the messenger announcing the coming of the Messiah. He would be the voice crying out in the wilderness, "Prepare a way for the Lord, make his paths straight." His message was one of repentance, proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins. He invited everyone to change and repent and experience a conversion of heart.

As we prepare the way for the Lord, let us be aware of the emotional hills and valleys that are giant speed breakers on the way for the Lord - vengeance, arrogance, hatred, malice, and addictions are some emotional hills that we need to level down. Insecurity, love of positive image, and unnecessary fears are a few emotional valleys which we need to level up, thus make the path straight and level. May we prepare well for the coming of the Lord.






The Church throughout America (North, Central, and South) celebrates on December 12 Our Lady of Guadalupe, Patroness of the Americas. It is a feast in the United States of America, but in many Hispanic countries, such as Mexico, it is raised to a solemnity.

The story of the origins of the miraculous image of Our Lady of Guadalupe is well known. Juan Diego Cuauhtlatoatzin was a quiet, humble man, a poor peasant. When the Blessed Virgin Mary appeared to him and asked him to tell the local bishop to build a church in her honor, Juan Diego became a very reluctant messenger. The bishop would not believe him. So Mary filled Juan Diego's tilma, or cloak, with roses in December, and when he emptied out these beautiful flowers at the bishop's feet, there, imprinted on his tilma, was a wonderful image of the Virgin, dressed like a young Aztec woman.

The Virgin Mary proclaims that her service is to God, and that his will should be done. We too are called to serve God's Kingdom in the teaching of Jesus Christ, Son of Mary and Son of God.

SAINTS OF THE WEEK

December 11 - St. Damasus I, pope (305-384)

Pope Damasus presided over the Council of Rome, which codified the canon of Scripture and commissioned the Vulgate translation of the Bible from St. Jerome. His vision and patronage helped preserve and transmit the Word of God to later generations.

December 13 - St. Lucy, virgin and martyr (c.283-304)

St. Lucy dedicated herself to Christ at a young age, but was denounced as a Christian and martyred after she resisted a would-be rapist. One version of the story said that Lucy, whose name means "light," blinded herself to deter her attacker, entrusting herself to the Light of Christ. *Patronage*: blind

December 14 - St. John of the Cross (1542-1591)

St. John of the Cross was a Carmelite priest, spiritual director, writer, mystic, and reformed who lived during the early years of the Counter-Reformation. His efforts at reform met with opposition, misunderstanding, and even imprisonment. *Patronage*: contemplatives

WHY DO WE DO THAT? Catholic Life Explained:

Can Catholics Gamble?

Question:

The Bible says that Jesus condemned gambling, but I notice that so many parishes have them at festivals and other events. What's correct?

Answer:

Although Jesus speaks of our relationship with material wealth and the very human struggle with greed, the gospels do not include any specific instructions related to gambling. At the same time, the Church is very sensitive to the needs of those who might struggle with an addiction to gambling, and pastoral care should always be offered to those who struggle with this reality in their life.

While it is true that many parish or school communities include gambling or games of chance in festivals and fundraisers (e.g. bingo, roulette, ring tossing, dunking booths, etc.), there is nothing inherently wrong these sorts of events, given they are played fairly and within the limits of reason are not morally objectionable. As the Catechism of the Catholic Church reminds us: "Games of chance (card games, etc.) or wagers are not in themselves contrary to justice. They become morally unacceptable when they deprive someone of what is necessary to provide for his needs and those of others" (no. 2413).

As in all things, moderation and a sense of healthy limits should be applied to gambling and games of chance. For those who find themselves living with addiction to gambling, help is available in various 12-step and addiction recovery programs.
