On this Third Sunday of Advent, the readings sound the note of joy. But we could ask what is there to be happy about. After all there are so many things that depress us and make us sad. Yet we are asked to rejoice, to be a Christian we have to have joy in our lives. Isaiah will point



out that we should rejoice in the Lord! Isaiah believes he has been chosen to bring good news to the poor, to heal the brokenhearted, to bring liberty to captives, freedom to those in prison, to proclaim the joyful news that God will do all these things for us. He is coming, He will not delay, He is faithful to his promises. He will come! Whatever your situation, He will come!

The second reading taken from St. Paul's first letter to the Thessalonians, is among the closing verses of this letter and St. Paul gives us a 4-point formula for living life. In line with the theme of Gaudete Sunday, the first point asks us to Rejoice always. Rejoicing is not to be done only when things are going our way but even when the going gets tough. In his own life, going through various challenges, Paul demonstrated that it is, indeed, possible to rejoice amid adversity. The second point is to pray without ceasing. More than a mere tool to obtain what one desires; prayer establishes and strengthens one's relationship with God. The closer we are to God the better we can discern His will for us. The last point is perhaps the most difficult. Paul asks us to give thanks in all circumstances. To be able to do this demands a very strong faith and trust in God's plan and love for us. In the Gospel we have John pointing out to the people that he is not the messiah, he is not the prophet, he is not Elijah but the voice of one crying out in the wilderness. He reminds them that there is one person in their midst who is greater than he is, but they do not recognize Him. John is merely a witness, pointing out to the one who is coming so that they might not miss him. He is the light, He is their hope. He is the promised one! If we do not see him, accept him, believe in Him, then the source of our joy is lost. We have missed the one who can bring meaning into our lives! We did not know He was in our midst. He came unto his own and his own did not recognize Him. God comes in strange ways!

As we come closer to Christmas, let us spend some time this Gaudete Sunday and reflect over what is the manifesto of our lives. How can I follow the 4-point formula of St. Paul and lastly focus on carrying, reflecting and recognizing the light of Jesus in our daily lives. May we be joyful witnesses of God's love in the world today!

This year is unique in that the Fourth Sunday of Advent and Christmas Eve fall on the same day; this happens about every six or seven years although a leap year might render a longer interval. According to the law of the Church, which is based on divine law, Catholics are required to participate in the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass on Sundays and on other days of precept which we know as holy days of obligation. Christmas is a day of precept whose obligation is never lifted, the same as Sunday. Therefore, all Catholics must attend Mass the weekend of December 23/24 for the Fourth Sunday of Advent and also for the Solemnity of Christmas on December 24/25.

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Third Sunday of Advent 3



The "O" Antiphons

Each year on December 17, the Church begins a series of seven short verses sung before the Magnificat during Evening Prayer or Vespers, on the seven days before the vigil of Christmas. They each begin with the exclamation "O" and are therefore called the "O Antiphons." The antiphons were composed in the seventh or eighth century when monks put together texts from the Old Testament which looked forward to the coming of our salvation. The first letter of the Messianic titles: Emmanuel, Rex, Oriens, Clavis, Radix, Adonai, Sapientia—all spell out Latin words ERO CRAS, meaning, "Tomorrow, I will come."

December 17 - O Wisdom of our God Most High, guiding creation with power and love: come to teach us the path of knowledge!

December 18 - O Leader of the House of Israel, giver of the Law to
Moses on Sinai: come to rescue us with
your mighty power!

December 19 - O Root of Jesse's stem, sign of God's love for all his people: come to save us without delay!

December 20 - O Key of David, opening the gates of God's eternal Kingdom: come and free the prisoners of darkness!

December 21 - O Radiant Dawn, splendor of eternal light, sun of justice: come and shine on those who dwell in darkness and in the shadow of death.

December 22 - O King of all nations and keystone of the Church: come and save man, whom you formed from the dust!

December 23 - O Emmanuel, our King and Giver of Law: come to save us, Lord our God!



Advent is a most advantageous time to go to confession! The Sacrament of Reconciliation figuratively wipes the slate clean in any liturgical season, but Advent provides a poignant time to experience the joy of reconciling with God and the Church, being one with Christ in the here and now, while celebrating His First Coming in His birth in Bethlehem and preparing for His Second Coming and all eternity. As you prepare for Christmas, take time to truly prepare your hearts and minds by taking advantage of our additional times for Confession during this holy Season.



Each one of us has a responsibility to evangelize - to share the Good News of Jesus Christ. How can we reach out to our friends, family members, and those we work with who are not practicing their faith? Consider inviting them to join you for Christmas Mass this year. Pray that the peace and joy of the Christ Child may enlighten their hearts and minds to accept His grace in their lives.

Our faith sharing book club meets monthly to explore topics of the spiritual life, literature, and culture in a communally enriching way.




Christmas Caroling

SAINTS OF THE WEEK

December 21 - St. Peter Canisius, priest, doctor of the Church (1521-1597)

St. Peter Canisius wrote a German-language catechism and founded the Jesuit College in Fribourg, Switzerland, as a response to the errors of the Reformation. He avoided polemics and direct debate with Protestant theologians, believing that it was better to attract people with solid orthodox teaching and let the truth speak for itself.

December 23 - St. John of Kanty, priest (d.1473)


Also known as John Cantius, St. John of Kanty was a theologian and professor of Sacred Scripture at Krakow. In addition to his theological work, he was also a physicist and anticipated the work of Galileo and Newton. He was known for his spirit of poverty and humility and gave most of his professor's salary to the poor, keeping just enough to live simply.

WHY DO WE DO THAT? Catholic Life Explained:

Preparing for Christmas

Question:

With Christmas fast approaching, can you give me some practical tips to prepare myself and my family that will help us stay grounded in what this holiday is really about? With all the commercialism, it's easy to stray.

Answer:

Happy times and events bring fond memories and a renewed sense of love and kinship with others. The anticipation is half the joy of the event itself. The coming of the Lord is that kind of event that people have been looking forward to for generations with fervent hope and desire. It gave them strength and courage as they waited for the coming of the Lord

We know that Christmas is rushed. Sales begin in August and carols blare long before the season begins. Everyone laments the commercial aspects of the season, but there is still time this Advent to do something to help you be more mindful of the Lord's coming. Use an Advent wreath, or enthrone the Bible prominently, or read the readings from the Bible assigned to each day. Establish new family rituals, customs and prayers that help remind everyone that we are preparing to celebrate the birth of Jesus. Fasting, daily Mass, a special celebration of reconciliation, reaching out to those alienated from family or society, and visiting the homebound manifest the love of the Christ Child and the Holy Family. Resist the temptation to rush the season. In his own time and in his own way, God will come. Our task is simply to be watchful and ready.
