From Father Sateesh

"Jesus, Mary, and Joseph, guide us!"

Isn't it easy for us to forget sometimes that the Holy Family of Joseph, Mary, and Jesus, whose feast we celebrate today, was a real family. We have all seen paintings and holy cards that depict them in a super-pious, unrealistic, sometimes surrealistic, way. But they were real



human beings, just like us, and they lived in the real world, the fallen world, just like us. The fact that Mary and Jesus were unaffected by original sin and that Joseph was a saint doesn't change the reality of their family life and their struggles.

As we celebrate this Feast of the Holy Family, let us thank God for our natural family and our supernatural family, and ask for the grace to be as faithful to each of them as Jesus was, so that by learning to keep our priorities straight, by trusting that God can handle the storms of life, and by striving to overcome the temptation to selfishness, we may be good members of both families here on earth in order to merit to rejoice with the Holy Family in the kingdom of heaven.

We must remember that nothing, not even the strong, deep ties of family affection and loyalty, should interfere with our obedience to God. When St. Francis of Assisi discovered God's call in his heart and decided to dedicate his life completely to God's service, his father, a successful businessman, threatened to disown and disinherit him. His father did everything possible to discourage his son from following God's call in his life. And in order to be faithful to his heavenly father, St. Francis was forced to live with the violent rejection of his earthly father.

In our lives too we sometimes feel the opposition between what would please our family members and what we know God is asking of us. We can face this opposition in little things, like the inconvenience of coming to Mass on Sunday mornings, or of taking time to pray together as a family, for example. Or we can face the opposition in big things, like the apparent inconvenience of adhering to solid moral truths in the Faith. It is not always easy to follow God's wisdom when those closest to us don't agree with it, but it is always the best and surest path to peace of mind and interior freedom. Staying close to our heavenly Father must be our first priority.

As we reflect on this past year, please know how grateful we are for your dedication, service, and generous support of our Cathedral parish! Let us look to the New Year with renewed faith, hope, and love, placing our trust in God's love for us made visible in His Son, the Word Made Flesh. May the peace, love, and joy of the Holy Family of Nazareth be with you and your family this Christmas Season and throughout the New Year, 2024! Jesus, Mary, and Joseph, guide us and help us to be more like you!



## **New Year's Resolutions**

In 2024, resolve to let the Gospel penetrate your heart through community, faith, and study.

Here are some ideas for New Year's resolutions:

Resolve to build community in 2024 — in your family, in your parish, in your neighborhood.

Resolve to sacrifice computer or smart-phone time once a week and call a family member instead — especially, but not limited to, those family members who encourage, rather than discourage, your faith. If possible, go beyond a call and arrange a visit with them.

Resolve to find a parish opportunity for face-to-face contact: a women's group, men's group, young adult group, PrimeTimers, book club. Then make friends with whoever shares your journey.

Being committed to people who are hard to be committed to is the New Evangelization.

## Resolve to build your faith life in 2024.

Resolve to pray morning prayer and/ or evening prayer from the Liturgy of the Hours (you can easily find the prayers for free online or on a smartphone app, such as iBreviary).

Resolve to meditate daily, first thing, before anything else, or at whatever better time you can keep sacred.

Resolve to pray a daily Rosary; lots of aids are available to make it easier.

Resolve to visit the Blessed Sacrament once or more per week. As the National Eucharistic Revival prepares



to climax with the very exciting National Eucharistic Congress in Indianapolis this July, pray for the success of the Revival, that more people may come to know, love, and live out Jesus Christ truly present in the Eucharist!

## Resolve to bolster your intellectual life in 2024.

Resolve to sign up for and use whatever best feeds your faith: videos by Bishop Robert Barron or Father Mike Schmitz or materials from the Augustine Institute, Catholic Answers, EWTN, etc.

Resolve to read some of the great books available for the faith: Books by Brant Pitre (especially The Case for Jesus) and Jennifer Fulwiler (Something Other Than God) and Scott Hahn.

## Lastly, and most importantly, on January 1, put all these resolutions in the hands of the Blessed Mother.

We begin the year with her for a reason: She is the expert in building community, nurturing faith, and growing in wisdom. And, as St. John Paul II said, she will transform culture in America.

Throughout the month of January, we give special honor to the Most Holy Name of Jesus. Saint Paul wrote to the Philippians: "At the name of Jesus every knee should bend, in heaven and on earth and under the earth, and every tongue should confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father" (Philippians 2:10-11). We hold the name of Jesus in special reverence. The very name of Jesus is a prayer.

#### A Way to Honor the Holy Name

Adopt the pious practice (that used to be more widely practiced and is so meaningful and fitting) of bowing your head whenever you say or hear the name of Jesus (just as we should bow or genuflect before the Real Presence in the tabernacle or make a sign of the cross as we pass a Catholic Church). The Council of Lyons in 1274 stated: "Each should fulfill in himself that which is written for all, that at the Name of Jesus every knee should bow; whenever that glorious Name is recalled, especially during the sacred Mysteries of the Mass, everyone should bow the knees of his heart, which he can do even by a bow of his head." This devotion also helps to make amends for blasphe-

mous use of the Holy Name.

## **SAINTS OF THE WEEK**

## January 2 - St. Basil the Great (d. 379) & St. Gregory Nazianzen (d. 390), bishops and doctors of the Church

Saints Basil and Saint Gregory Nazianzen became close friends as students in Athens. Together they fought against the Arian heresy, which denied the full divinity of Christ. Their writings also aided the Church's understanding of the Holy Spirit and the Trinity. Gregory is known as "the Theologian" by the Eastern Churches. Basil is known as the father of Eastern monasticism and had a great influence on the development of liturgy, East and West.

#### January 4 - St. Elizabeth Ann Seton, religious (1774-1821)

St. Elizabeth Ann Bayley Seton was born into an Episcopalian family and later in life joined the Catholic Church. She was married, a mother of five, and a founder of a religious order, the Sisters of Charity. At the invitation of the Archbishop of Baltimore, Elizabeth founded a girl's school which gave rise to the parochial school system in the United States. She was canonized by Paul VI in 1975, the first native born United States citizen to be canonized.

#### January 5 - St. John Neumann, bishop (1811-1868)

St. John Neumann came to the United States from what is now called the Czech Republic with the dream of being a priest and missionary. Received with open arms by the bishop of New York, he was ordained and immediately asked to help build churches and schools for German immigrants and Native Americans. While bishop, he was an avid supporter of the work of religious orders, a proponent of Catholic education, and an advocate for the needs of immigrants. He is the first American bishop to be canonized.

#### January 6 - St. Andre Bessette, religious (1845-1937)

St. André Bessette modeled his life on that of St. Joseph, to whom he had a great devotion. As a brother of the Congregation of the Holy Cross in Montreal, he was given the post of doorkeeper at Notre Dame College, a post he kept for forty years. A simple, holy man, André had a special gift of praying over the sick. His prayers were answered, sometimes in miraculous ways, and people began to come to him in large numbers. He gave all the credit to St. Joseph, and he dreamed of a shrine to St. Joseph on Mount Royal. He lived to see the building of the magnificent Oratory of St. Joseph begun.

## WHY DO WE DO THAT? Catholic Life Explained:

Servant Songs

#### Question:

What are the servant songs of Isaiah? How do they relate to Jesus' life and ministry?

#### Answer:

The four servant songs (Isaiah 42:1-4, 49:1-6, 50:4-9, and 52:13—53:12) are strategically placed in Second Isaiah to offer hope and consolation to a suffering Israel during its Babylonian Exile.

Israel had been defeated by the Babylonians, who destroyed their temple, killed the last of the kings in David's lineage, exiled them from their land, and transported them to Babylon. This is the context in which Second Isaiah composes his powerfully poetic book of hope and consolation. A significant part of that message is the portrait of God's servant, who is called to be a source of hope and encouragement for the people.

Each of the four poems emphasizes God's choice and election of the servant. The last poem stresses the suffering and rejection of God's servant, along with his eventual death. Isaiah is certain that God will use the servant's innocent suffering as a way to redeem and remove the guilt and sin of others. Thus, the servant becomes a source of salvation for himself and for others.

Who is this servant? Many suggest that Isaiah was referring to Israel herself, as she underwent exilic suffering which would ultimately prove to be redemptive. Jesus' followers, including those for whom Mark wrote his Gospel, understood Jesus' ministry in terms of Isaiah's suffering servant whose innocent suffering and death became the means of salvation for all.
