## From Father Sateesh

"Speaking with authority and cleansing evil spirits."


We have all come across people whom we accept as authorities on some subject or topic. Most often we accept them not merely because they have a string of degrees attached to their name but because we have personally heard them speak or seen their work. Do we truly



accept the authority of our religious leaders and preachers? Do we speak about our faith with authority? Do we believe what we are talking about?

In the Gospel of Mark, we are introduced to the two activities that characterized the ministry of Jesus: preaching the good news and the casting of demons. We note that as soon as the Sabbath came Jesus preached and his preaching made a deep impression. He spoke with authority and his authority came not from other authorities he quoted but from his own convictions and experience. The man himself was the message. But while the people listened to the message of Jesus there was not full acceptance of his message by all. In the synagogue there was a man possessed by an unclean spirit, which tried to disrupt the preaching of Jesus. This struggle continues to take place every time goodness confronts evil.

Now in the synagogue itself they see that the evil spirits are threatened by the presence of goodness in the person of Jesus. Jesus' response was: "Be quiet." God's power is gentle, for he is the source of peace. With authority he urges the evil one to leave the possessed man. And the spirit with a loud cry went out of him. God's word is always efficacious and has a profound effect on us. The people in Capernaum were deeply impressed and astounded at what they heard, saw, and started asking what it all meant. The journey of faith often begins in an honest search for meaning or in that openness of mind that sees the wonders of everyday life. The heart of today's gospel is that Jesus liberates us, as he did the man in the synagogue. If we wish to be free from anxieties and worries, we need to be liberated from our captivities. May we acknowledge God's authority over us and be transformed by it!

Forty days after Christmas, we celebrate the Feast of the Presentation of the Lord, which recalls the event described in the Gospel according to Luke: "When the time came for their purification according to the law of Moses, they brought him up to the Lord (as it is written in the law of the Lord, 'Every firstborn male shall be designated as holy to the Lord')" (Luke 2:22). Joseph and Mary bring Jesus to the Temple and while they are there, they meet two extraordinary people. First they meet Simeon, who, taking Jesus in his arms, recognizes him as the long-awaited Messiah. They also meet Anna, a widow, who prays and fasts in the Temple night and day.

Jesus is the light to the nations, and from the moment of his birth, people are drawn to his light. That is why on this Feast of the Presentation of the Lord, the Church blesses candles to be used in the celebration of the Mass during the coming year.

## **SAINTS OF THE WEEK**

#### January 31 - St. John Bosco, priest (1815-1888)

St. John Bosco, founder of the Salesians, saw great potential in the young men of the slums of Turin, and he determined to provide them with positive places to grow in knowledge and virtue taught with kindness and loving example. *Patronage*: young people; editors

#### February 3 - St. Blaise, bishop, martyr (d.316)

While serving as Bishop of Sebaste in Armenia, St. Blaise was a visible witness of the Gospel, which eventually led to his martyrdom. His feast day is commemorated with a blessing of throats because legend says that he cured a young boy choking on a fish bone. Patronage: against throat diseases

#### **St.** Ansgar, bishop (c.801-865)

St. Ansgar became a missionary in Denmark and Sweden during the tumultus period following the death for Charlemagne. His piety and devotion impressed local rulers, who allowed him to establish missions, monasteries, and churches across Scandinavia.

## WHY DO WE DO THAT? Catholic Life Explained:

Communion and Mortal Sin

#### **Ouestion:**

I have a friend who receives communion, but who I know for a fact is in a state of mortal sin. Should I tell our priest? Is it my responsibility to say something?

#### Answer:

While we may always want to do what is best for our friends and family members, we have a responsibility to respect their privacy and their conscience. In its reflections on the Eighth Commandment ("You shall not bear false witness against your neighbor"), the Catechism of the Catholic Church states, "Respect for the reputation of persons forbids every attitude and word likely to cause them unjust injury. [One] becomes guilt: -of rash judgment who, even tacitly, assumes as true, without sufficient foundation, the moral fault of a neighbor; -of detraction who, without objectively valid reason, discloses another's faults and failings to persons who do not know them; of calumny who, by remarks contrary to the truth, harms the reputation of others and gives occasion for false judgments concerning them" (no. 2477).

We will never truly know what is in a person's mind, heart, and soul; only God knows those things. We should, of course, take our concerns to God and entrust the person about whom we are concerned to God's grace and mercy. If we have concerns about the spiritual wellbeing of someone with whom we are close, we should go to the person themselves and talk about our fears and concerns. Unless it is a case of abuse or endangerment (which we have a moral and even legal responsibility to report to the appropriate authorities), we ultimately do not have the freedom to share another's persons faults or sins, however good we think our intentions might be.
