"Rejoice, for God is revealed to all who search for Him!"

A great part of life is spent searching, searching for small as well as big things. We search for answers to the many questions we have. We search for things that we believe will make us happy. We search for soul mates and life part-



ners. We search for the right job. We search for friends. Do we search for God? What is guiding our search? Even if we have not found God the search itself is worthwhile, for God will reveal Himself along the way!

In today's first reading the prophet Isaiah reminds the Jews that salvation is for all peoples. It is true that the Messiah would be born of David's stock. It is true that the light had shone on them, but this light would shine in the darkness, for all the peoples. At the sight of the light, everyone, even those living in the farthest regions of the world, would flock to Jerusalem.

In the Gospel we realize that the prophecy of Isaiah started being fulfilled when the star led the wise men to the newborn king. God in his goodness caused a star to appear in the sky, a sign the wise men understood, as a sign that the Savior was born. Though the star guided them, the wise men had to still search for the newborn king. They thought that Jerusalem was the obvious place for the king to be born, but on reaching there, the star disappeared as though signaling that they were looking in the wrong place.

The wise men are like so many of us looking for God led by our own expectations, often leading us to disappointment. We have to ask for help as the wise men did, as we cannot manage the faith journey on our own. They had put in their efforts to seek the Lord and now their eyes are opened with enlightenment. Though they saw just a helpless babe wrapped in swaddling clothes, they recognized him as the Savior of the world. It is easy to get bogged down with things not being the way we expect them to be. It is only the light of faith that helps us to see what God wants to reveal to us.

We cannot approach God empty-handed - even the simplest of offerings is acceptable to God and in return we ourselves are doubly blessed. Like the Magi, when we have this vision of God, we ourselves are changed, we are blessed, and we can no longer return to the same way of life. The Gospel narrative tells us that the wise men, being warned in a dream returned by another way back home. May we find God in all things and see all things in God!



# Wheeling's MLK Celebraton weekend will feature two religious services

Wheeling's annual Martin Luther King observation will include two faith services as part of the celebration -- a Shabbat Service on Friday, Jan. 12 at Temple Shalom and an Interfaith Prayer Service on Sunday, Jan. 14 at Wayman AME Church. All are welcome.

The Shabbat Service will be conducted by Rabbi Joshua Lief at 7 pm Friday at Temple Shalom, 23 Bethany Pike, Wheeling. The Interfaith Prayer Service will begin at 6 pm Sunday, Jan. 15 at Macedonia Baptist Church, 105-12th Street, Wheeling.

This year's featured speaker is Judge Terri Jamison of the Tenth District Court of Appeals for the State of Ohio. Judge Jamison is a West Virginia native who is also a senior pastor in the Divine Kingdom Builders church in Columbus, OH.

This year's MLK Celebration also includes a 1 pm discussion for high school and college students at Wheeling University's Troy Theater on Saturday, Jan 13, and children's programming at Laughlin Memorial Chapel on Monday, Jan. 15.

The MLK March will begin at 2:15, Sunday, Jan. 14 at the Windmill atop Martin Luther King Boulevard. It will be followed by an awards presentation at 3 pm at West Virginia Northern Community College B&O Auditorium at 1704 Market Street, and a dinner immediately afterwards at the college's Mult-Purpose Room at 10-17th Street.

Throughout the month of January, we give special honor to the Most Holy Name of Jesus. Saint Paul wrote to the Philippians: "At the name of Jesus every knee should bend, in heaven and on earth and under the earth, and every tongue should confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father" (Philippians 2:10-11). We hold the name of Jesus in special reverence. The very name of Jesus is a prayer.

#### A Way to Honor the Holy Name

Adopt the pious practice (that used to be more widely practiced and is so meaningful and fitting) of bowing your head whenever you say or hear the name of Jesus (just as we should bow or genuflect before the Real Presence in the tabernacle or make a sign of the cross as we pass a Catholic Church). The Council of Lyons in 1274 stated: "Each should fulfill in himself that which is written for all, that at the Name of Jesus every knee should bow; whenever that glorious Name is recalled, especially during the sacred Mysteries of the Mass, everyone should bow the knees of his heart, which he can do even by a bow of his head." This devotion also helps to make amends for blasphemous use of the Holy Name.

## **Pro-Life Corner**

At all stages of life, we believe life is sacred. Whether it's at a child's conception to a senior on their last breath, life is a blessing that should be preserved as God intended.

In 2021, Planned Parenthood took the lives of 374,155 preborn children through abortion. Since most Planned Parenthoods are closed on Sundays, this means they killed roughly 1,200 children every single day in 2021.

## **SAINTS OF THE WEEK**

#### January 13 - St. Hilary (315-368)

Saint Hilary was the bishop of Poitiers, France, during the era of the Arian heresy, and he fought for the correct understanding and expression of the divinity of Christ. He was known as the "hammer against Arianism" and the "Athanasius of the West," after the bishop of Alexandria who fought the heresy in the East. The Christian world was so divided by Arianism that Hilary was exiled twice. His great contribution was the successful expression in Latin of the theology about Christ, or Christology, that had been developed in Greek.

#### January 8 - The Feast of the Baptism of the Lord

This Monday, the Church celebrates the Feast of the Baptism of Our Lord. This brings to an end the season of Christmas. The Church recalls Our Lord's second manifestation or epiphany which occurred on the occasion of His baptism in the Jordan. Jesus descended into the River to sanctify its waters and to give them the power to beget sons of God. The event takes on the importance of a second creation in which the entire Trinity intervenes.

Christ did not need the baptism of John. Although He appeared in the "substance of our flesh" and was recognized "outwardly like unto ourselves", He was absolutely



sinless and impeccable. He conferred upon the water the power of the true Baptism which would remove all the sins of the world: "Behold the Lamb of God, behold Him Who takes away the sin of the world".

Many of the incidents which accompanied Christ's baptism are symbolical of what happened at our Baptism. At Christ's baptism the Holy Spirit descended upon Him; at our Baptism the Trinity took its abode in our soul. At His baptism Christ was proclaimed the "Beloved Son" of the Father; at our Baptism we become the adopted sons of God. At Christ's baptism the heavens were opened; at our Baptism heaven was opened to us. At His baptism Jesus prayed; after our Baptism we must pray to avoid actual sin.

## WHY DO WE DO THAT? Catholic Life Explained:

Wedding Feast & Epiphany

#### Question:

How are the feasts of the baptism of Jesus and the account of the wedding feast of Cana related to the Epiphany celebration?

#### Answer:

The Epiphany season focuses on revealing Jesus to the world. Following the Christmas celebration, the liturgical year lays out a series of manifestation points in which Jesus is made publicly known. From its very beginning, the Christian community highlighted three events in the life of Jesus. These are the Epiphany, the Baptism of the Lord and the wedding feast at Cana.

The Epiphany discloses Jesus to the world of the Gentiles, represented by the magi from the East. The accounts of Jesus' baptism reveal his identity and mission, along with exposing him to those to whom he was sent to minister. The miracle of turning water to wine at the wedding feast of Cana, unique to John's Gospel, is the first public sign that Jesus performs, thus manifesting his public identity and his powers.

Today in the Roman Church, these are usually celebrated on three successive Sundays: Epiphany, the Baptism of the Lord which is usually the next Sunday, and the wedding feast of Cana, which is proclaimed on the 2nd Sunday of Ordinary Time in lectionary year C. These feasts connect around the concept of epiphany, public manifestation of Jesus to the world. They help us get to know more intimately who Jesus is and what he is about. Spend some time delving more deeply into your understanding of who Jesus is. Continue to cultivate these "epiphany" moments in your life.
