

"Go and Proclaim: be compassionate missionaries."

My dear friends on this 11th Sunday in Ordinary Time the readings highlight the link between being chosen by God and being sent as missionaries. The first reading taken from the book of Exodus presents before us a very beautiful imag-



ery –an eagle carrying its young on its wings. After they escaped from Egypt the Israelites gradually made it to the wilderness of the mount of Sinai. Now this wilderness was a desert and there was little in the desert to sustain life. The Israelites were now completely dependent on Yahweh, who led the nation of Israel just as an eagle care for its young one.

In the second reading taken from St. Paul's letter to the Romans, Paul highlights the importance of faith in our being reconciled with God. Reconciliation presupposes an estranged relationship. God takes the initiative to restore the relationship by sending His own son with a mission. The son dies for a cause and with his blood reunites us with the father. Paul further highlights the extent of God's love by pointing out Jesus' rather bizarre behavior. He died for sinners, for people who could not appreciate his death, and for people who would time and again continue to fall into sin. Having been reconciled to God, all humanity is free from the bondage of sin and free to be participants in God's creative movement. The church and its members are called to be channels of reconciliation in the world.

In the gospel taken from Matthew, we get a closer look into the loving nature of God in the person of Jesus. Jesus sees the harassed and helpless crowds and is filled with compassion. Recognizing the need, he chooses and sends out the 12 apostles. We are chosen to be sent. The Church too is missionary in nature as it participates in and continues the mission of Jesus. It is the fact that by virtue of our baptism and confirmation, we all are called to be missionaries.

We all are sent on mission just like the twelve apostles were. The apostles were called to cure the sick, raise the dead, cleanse the lepers and cast out demons. Though we might not have all these gifts we still can be missionaries today. Perhaps we cannot cure people physically but surely, we can reach out to people who need someone to talk to, spend time with the sick and give a shoulder to someone to cry on. We might not be able to raise the dead physically but surely, we can uplift people emotionally and spiritually by giving them hope and love. Leprosy is curable today, but we still treat people as lepers when we purposely shun them due to their physical appearances or financial status. We all are not exorcists but definitely, we all can exorcise the demons of gossip, pride and hatred from our lives. Just as God led and protected Israel, He leads and protects each one of us in our lives. Unfortunately, quite often we fail to recognize Him. Let us spend some time this week reflecting on some of the important events of our life, not only the joyful ones but also the difficult ones and ask for the grace to be able to experience the presence of God in those moments. I pray that each of us may realize that we are God's children, his treasured possession and that this realization may lead us to be compassionate missionaries in our day-to-day lives. May God bless us all.

## **Bishop Brennan Installs New Acolytes**

Bishop Brennan instituted 20 men preparing for the Permanent Diaconate as new Acolytes for the Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston on Sunday, June 4 at the Basilica of the Co-Cathedral of the Sacred Heart in Charleston! Prayerful congratulations to each of them and their families, in particular our own parishioner Mr. Jacob Manning! Please pray that in this final year before Ordination, they may grow in deeper prayer, confidence and humility, in the person of Jesus, who came to serve, not to be served.

### What is an acolyte?

The word "acolyte" comes from the Greek word "akolouthos". The definition is "he who comes, a follower, an attendant". According to the Church's law and practice, the instituted acolyte is called to serve at the altar, including assisting the Priest and Deacon with the care of the sacred vessels and distributing Communion as an extraordinary minister if needed (GIRM #98). Acolytes are typically chosen as the first extraordinary minister to distribute Holy Communion when the ordinary minister is not available and can publicly expose and repose the Blessed Sacrament for adoration, but without blessing the people. Acolytes are often entrusted with leading altar server trainings. We are blessed to now have two installed acolytes at the Cathedral - Mr. Jacob Manning and Mr. Martin Imbroscio, our sacristan!



As we remember our fathers who gave us life both past, present and even fathers-to-be, we remember their strength to protect us, their love to teach us, their words to guide us and the skills they taught us, we are reminded of how good God, Our Father, has been to each us. Being part of a family of grace, these men have reflected, in their own individual ways, the goodness of God. We pray that we may always learn from them and cherish their presence. We ask God to grant them wisdom and understanding to guide us all our days. And we thank God for the gift of our fathers who taught us that we belong to a family and he will always be there for us. # STEWARDSHIP REFLECTION

### Live & Give in Gratitude

The theme of today's readings is God's great love for His people. In the Book of Exodus, God calls Moses to remind the ancient Israelites of the blessings He bestows on those who keep His covenant. St. Paul, in his Letter to the Romans, describes God's love in how we are reconciled to Him through the death of His son, Jesus Christ. And in St. Matthew's Gospel, Jesus sends the Apostles out to the people of Israel to Proclaim the Kingdom of Heaven. Even that long ago, Jesus was concerned there was a shortage of messengers to carry the Good News when He said: The harvest is plentiful but the workers are few. Ask the Lord of the harvest, therefore, to send out workers into his harvest field." Let us pray daily that men answer their call to Christ's priesthood.



# Month of the Most Sacred Heart of Jesus

On the Friday following the Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ, we celebrate the Solemnity of the Most Sacred Heart of Jesus. Because this solemnity usually falls in June, this month is also known as the "Month of the Sacred Heart." Devotion to the Sacred Heart of Jesus is of great antiquity in the Church. It was Saint Margaret Mary Alacoque, however, who made this devotion widespread. # **SAINTS OF THE WEEK**

### June 19 - Saint Romuald, abbot (951-1027)

Aristocratic-born Saint Romuald led a wild life as a young person in tenth-century Italy. This changed at age twenty when he saw his father murder another man. Filled with horror, Romuald fled to a Benedictine monastery to do penance for his father's actions. Even monks found him uncomfortably holy, so he left and wandered throughout Italy, establishing his own monasteries and hermitages along the way. He eventually formed the Order of Camaldoli, a religious group of men who combined the cenobitic tradition of communal living with the eremitical (hermit) life of the Eastern monks. He lived a long life, dying of natural causes in 1027.

### June 21 - Saint Aloysius Gonzaga, religious (1568-1591)

Raised in a wealthy aristocratic family in Italy, Saint Aloysius Gonzaga became aware at the age of seven that treasures in this lifetime can't satisfy the longings of the heart. Much to the disappointment of his father, Aloysius renounced his inheritance to join the Society of Jesus. His short life as a Jesuit was marked by austere piety, theological study, and service to the sick in a Jesuit hospital, he contracted a plague which led to his death. *Patronage:* Catholic youth; Teenagers; Jesuit students

### June 22 - Saint Paulinus of Nola, bishop (c.354-431)

Saint Paulinus of Nola was raised in a family of wealthy politicians in Bordeaux. His interests were varied: everything from practicing law to writing poetry, from traveling to governing. After the death of a newly born son, he and his wife, Therasia, gave away the family fortune to the poor and to the Church. Saint Paulinus and Therasia moved to Italy where they began to live, along with some other friends, a life of prayer and service. They lived in a two-story building in which the first floor provided a place of rest for the wayward and the lost, and the second floor was their place of residence based on the rhythms of monasticism. Gaining a reputation for holiness, Saint Paulinus was ordained a priest and was eventually made a bishop of Nola.


### June 22 - Saint John Fisher, bishop (1469-1535), and Saint Thomas More (1478-1535), martyrs

Also on June 22, Saints John Fisher and Thomas More, who lived during a time of great upheaval and reformation. Both were friends and consultants of King Henry VIII, and both were executed because they would not declare the king's supremacy over the Church. Saint John Fisher, born in Yorkshire, was an astute scholar recognized for his profound insight into the complex questions of life. He held many positions of esteem, including tutor to the young Henry VIII, Chancellor of Cambridge University, and bishop of Rochester. Saint Thomas More, born in London, was a family man characterized by a deep affection for his wife and three daughters. He, too, held many powerful positions in the Church and in society, in particular, a Parliament lawyer, Speaker of the House of Commons, and Chancellor England. *Patronage:* Lawyers, Civil Servants, Politicians

Courage Apostolate is a ministry for Catholics with same-sex attraction who are striving to live faithfully to the teachings of Christ and His Catholic Church. Courage meets monthly in Morgantown for prayer, fellowship and support. The heart of Courage is the belief



that sanctity is possible in everyday life. Through the Courage Apostolate those persons experiencing same-sex attractions are encouraged to deepen their Christian disciple-ship through participation in the sacramental life of the Church, particularly through the frequent reception of the Eucharist and frequent confession, as well as through a regular prayer life, witness, counsel, service, and self-giving. # WHY DO WE DO THAT? Catholic Life Explained:

Mass

### **Ouestion:**

I've noticed that when I go to Mass at different parishes, sometimes people say and do different things. Why is that?

### **Answer:**

The Mass in its current form has taken shape over the course of 2,000 years. Over time, traditions, structures, and prayers have been put into place. There are certain rubrics for the Mass that are normative wherever you go. This means you could attend Mass in Malawi or Thailand or Italy and still watch the same basic liturgy unfold, even if you don't understand the language. There may be some cultural differences from place to place, things that aren't specifically listed. For example, in the United States most people go up for Communion in a nice neat line. In Europe, everyone gets up around the same time. It's a bit of a free-for-all!

Some people might take it upon themselves to change things individually. People may not like something that feels too "liberal" or "conservative," and they may take a well-meaning stance in the opposite direction. When people (including the presiders) do things that are distracting or change the liturgy, it introduces an element that breaks the unity of the assembled community. The important thing to remember is that we gather as the Body of Christ to celebrate the Eucharist. If you are confused, ask! If you are frustrated, pray for the spirit of charity.
