"May we proclaim the Father, Son and Spirit in our lives!"

The first reading treats of God as he manifests himself to his people. He reveals that his name is Yahweh, which means 'I am who I am.' The God of Sinai is not the fearsome God he too often is made out to be. When Israel sinned by the



worship of idols and had broken the covenant, he does not abandon them but shows himself as one who loves and forgives. He is forever the God of Israel and has bound his destiny to them, no matter what they do, no matter how often they abandon him. Moses, his faithful servant, pleads on behalf of the people: "Lord if we have found favor come with us! True, we are a headstrong people but forgive us our faults and our sins and adopt us as your heritage." God has made us forever his people, members of his household. He reveals himself as the Father-God, our Abba forever.

The short reading of today's gospel speaks of God's plan of salvation in and through Jesus Christ. It is the father who initiates the salvific plan. He is always the Creator from whom all good things come. It is the Father who sends his beloved Son Jesus Christ into the world. The Father loves the world because of His Son, whom he sends into the world to reveal himself and his goodness to all humankind. He sends His Son not to condemn but to save the world. The mission of Jesus is to save the world and the one condition that must be fulfilled to be saved, is to believe in Jesus Christ. We must believe totally in Jesus, failing which we stand condemned. Eternal life begins here on earth itself when we believe and accept Jesus as our Lord. Thus, in this passage from John we see the father initiates the plan of salvation out of his love. His Son Jesus Christ who carries out the Father's will becomes the instrument of our salvation.

Later on, in the Gospel John speaks of the Spirit as the Advocate that will remain in man and guarantee God's presence and power for salvation. Today's passage shows how God lives as a community united and abiding in love. Out of love the Father creates and shares his love with humankind; this love is concretized and made real, incarnate in His Son Jesus Christ and the mutual love of the Father and the Son, the bond between them is the Holy Spirit, which is given to us. We live the life of God, the Trinitarian life, when we live in love. We can live with others only if we live for others. If we live for others, we constantly desire to be united and share our gifts, our love with others.

Many people believe that their religion and their faith is a private affair between themselves and their God. Yet, just as no human being can be fully human without interacting and relating with others, so no one can live a committed religious life without living with and for others. To be a Christian is to be ready to live in a community. For many the toughest challenge, the litmus test of Christian faith is living with others. Have a "living with and living for others" Godfilled weekend!



St. Marcellin Champagnat Feast Day: June 6

St. Marcellin Champagnat, a Marist Priest, dreamed of a worldwide community of brothers whole-heartedly devoted to making Jesus Christ known and loved among children and young people, especially the least favored. He embraced God's call to found the Marist brothers, the religious congregation that continues to pursue his dream today.

When seeing children and young people without schooling and knowledge of their faith, Marcellin would say, "We need brothers!" On January 2, 1817 he set in motion his plan for the Congregation of "the little brothers of Mary" with two young recruits.

At a ceremony and Mass in St. Peter's Square on April 18, 1999, Pope John Paul II declared that Marcellin is a Saint of the universal Church.

LITURGICAL LIFE

Celebrating Corpus Christi

Each year, on the second Sunday after Pentecost, the Church celebrates the Feast of the Body and Blood of the Lord (Corpus Christi). This is a liturgical celebration, embedded deeply in Catholic belief and practice. It is part of our sacramental, theological and devotional life. While a central truth of our Catholic faith, it encompasses many levels of meaning. It presupposes an understanding of elements and realities such as: celebrating the Eucharist, Holy Communion, and adoration, as well as discipleship and mission.

The roots of this belief stretch back to the saving event of the Passover, in which God was acting on behalf of enslaved Jewish people in Egypt. Marking this event brought Jesus together with His disciples on the night before He died, when He took bread and wine and uttered those words: "This is my Body" and "This is my Blood." Addressing His disciples, He adds, "Do this in memory of me." In obedience to the Lord, the earliest Christians met for this "breaking of the bread" in His memory. The celebration of the Eucharist goes back that far.

Our deepest human response should be that of adoration and thanksgiving. From the earliest days, following the celebration of the Eucharist, the remaining Eucharist was placed in a sacred vessel near the altar. It remained there for those who were ill, to whom the Eucharist would be taken afterwards. Another reason the Eucharist was reserved in this vessel. called a tabernacle, was for the faithful to express devotion in gratitude for what they had just received and anticipated receiving again. In this way, devotion to Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament has a long history but was always related to the act of celebrating the Eucharist.




Celebrating the Eucharist is also an experience of building up the Body of Christ. Many health writers have told us that "we are what we eat." As we receive Holy Communion, we ever more deeply become the Body of Christ. In writing to the Christians at Corinth, Saint Paul says so as he writes: "You are the Body of Christ..." (I Cor. 12:27)

This is one of the central themes of an encyclical letter written by Pope Pius XII on June 29, 1943: *Mystici Corporis Christi*. There, the pope describes the "mystical" Body of Christ as the worldwide reality "... of all those united by faith and incorporated into the Body of Christ." It is in this way, he wrote, that Saint Paul could write to the Corinthian Christians and tell them: "Now you are Christ's body, and individually parts of it..."

As we celebrate the great feast of Corpus Christi, we must also realize that we are uniting ourselves to a sacramental reality that calls us beyond the tabernacle to the wider world in which Jesus is also present in those who believe. The Eucharist is truly sacramental food to nurture us as we pursue the mission Jesus gave us. Keeping all the elements of this great feast together provides the full depth of the lived reality of the Body and Blood of the Lord.

SAINTS OF THE WEEK

June 5 - Saint Boniface, bishop, martyr (c.675-754)

Boniface was an Anglo-Saxon Benedictine monk. He was first sent as a missionary to Frisia, which is in the vicinity of the Netherlands, but he failed because of wars between the local tribes and the Frankish king Charles Martel. Boniface then went to Rome and was commissioned by the pope to evangelize in Germany. He started by chopping down an oak tree dedicated to Thor, and when he was not immediately struck down, the people believed and became Christians. Boniface return to evangelize the Frisians but was killed by them. He is buried in the cathedral in Fulda. Boniface is known as the "Apostle of Germany".

June 6 - Saint Norbert, bishop (1080-1132)

Norbert was a subdeacon and canon in the Rhineland, had a conversion experience similar to St. Paul, in which he was thrown from a horse during a violent thunderstorm. Following this event he had a change of heart. He became increasingly aware of the need to renounce the trappings of the world and to preach reform to the canons. His preaching led him to the valley of Premontre where he laid the framework, along with thirteen disciples, for a reform movement that became known as the Canons Regular of Premontre, the Premonstratensians, or Norbertines.

June 9 - Saint Ephrem, deacon, doctor of the Church (306-373)

After serving as head of a cathedral school in Syria, Saint Ephrem fled to a cave near Edessa to take up the life of a monk. While devoting himself to an austere life marked by solitude and fasting, he earnestly wrote hundreds of hymns and commentaries on Sacred Scripture. His hymns and discourses on scripture provided deep insight into the paschal Mystery of Christ and opposed Gnostic tendencies among various sects. Crowds were attracted to his eloquent preaching; therefore he became known as "The Harp of the Holy Spirit." Later in life he was ordained a deacon and helped the people of Edessa weather a terrible famine. He died in this city in 373, a victim of the disease he contracted while caring for those infected with the plague.

WHY DO WE DO THAT? **Catholic Life Explained:**

Role of Catholics in Society

Ouestion:

We live in a country that upholds the separation of Church and state. What is the role of Catholics in society?

Answer:

The role of the Church in the world has taken different forms over time, but the theme is the same. Be disciples in it! As the lay faithful — that is, not vowed priest or religious — we are called to live and love in the circumstances of our daily lives. St. John Paul II wrote a document about the laity. In it he wrote, "In their situation in the world God manifests His plan and communicates to them their particular vocation of seeking the Kingdom of God by engaging in temporal affairs and by ordering them according to the plan of God" (On the Lay Members of Christ's Faithful, 15).

God wants us in the hospitals, the board rooms, the law offices, the food pantries, and the little league games! We are to engage in the affairs of the world. But when we're there, we should live the plan of God. We need to respect those around us, engage in just business and legal practices, and love our children. We should care for the earth, use our money wisely, and get to know our neighbors. We must advocate for social policies that respect human dignity and human freedom. No matter our state in life, we are invited to build the kingdom of God!
