"Coping with the ups and downs of life and moving on!"

One of the things that bring good projects to a bad end is when divisions occur. Many a good work begun with the best of intentions is given up because people knowingly or unknowingly begin to impute motives and people begin to



question and doubt. Jesus came to do the Father's will and reveal the goodness of God. He went about doing good, but the Scribes and their followers questioned him. Are we builders of God's kingdom or do we sow seeds of division wherever we go? May we keep on spreading God's love with our lives!

The first reading describes the pathetic efforts of Adam and Eve to shift the blame of their sin from themselves on to the serpent and even to God himself. Whenever we do wrong, we tend to make excuses for ourselves. We do not like to take responsibility for the wrong we have done. We also see the consequences of sin: loss of intimacy with God and a breakdown between man and woman – the man betrays the woman. However, this sad scene ends with a promise of salvation. The Gospel shows this promise as fulfilled in Jesus who overthrows the kingdom of Satan and establishes the kingdom of God.

In today's gospel passage we see some of the frustrations Jesus had to contend with. He had to contend with the constant opposition from his enemies and sometimes even misunderstandings from his own family. News of people's reactions to him reached Nazareth and worried about the direction of his life his relatives set out to rescue him and bring him back home. Many great people were at times believed to be mad by their contemporaries. When they reached the house where he was preaching, they sent him a message: "Your mother and brothers and sisters are outside asking for you." On hearing this Jesus replied. "Who are my mother and my brothers?" "Anyone who does the will of God, that person is my brother and sister and mother." When Jesus left Nazareth, he 'lost' his natural family. But gained another family- the family of his disciples. He was calling people a spiritual family, built not on bonds of blood and nation. Blood relations are important, but it is not everything. Jesus refused to go back home with his relatives. Though his mission was proving to be frustrating, he refused to quit. He had a mission to accomplish. Jesus gives us an example of faithfulness in a time of darkness. Jesus was calling people to a new community, into a spiritual family. Belief in Jesus and the practice of God's will are what create community. With his example to inspire us, and his grace to strengthen us, we too can be faithful to our vocation as his disciples. "No one who puts his hand to the plough and looks back is fit for the Kingdom of heaven." May we live like the family of God, reaching out and doing good always!

Join Bishop Brennan and the Perpetual Pilgrims for Morning Mass followed by a Eucharistic Procession from the Cathedral through the streets of downtown Wheeling to St. Alphonsus Church.

A free breakfast will be served after the procession.

The National Eucharistic Pilgrimage is a major prelude to the National Eucharistic Congress, which expects to bring together tens of thousands of Catholics July 17-21 in Indianapolis' Lucas Oil Stadium for worship, speakers and Eucharist-centered events. The pilgrimage and the congress are part of the National Eucharistic Revival, a three-year initiative of the U.S. Catholic bishops that began in 2022 with the aim of deepening Catholics' love for the Eucharist.

This is one of the largest Eucharistic pilgrimages in history. Just as throngs followed Christ throughout his earthly ministry, our nation is processing with our Eucharistic Lord through cities, along highways, past rural towns, and even down the Ohio River on His way to the 10th National Eucharistic Congress.

The four routes of the National Eucharistic Pilgrimage, named for saintly significance corresponding to the geographical starting point, will pass through many major U.S. cities beginning in San Francisco, CA (Serra Route); Bemidji, MN (Marian Route); New Haven, CT (Seton Route); and Brownsville, TX (Juan Diego Route). The eastern arm of the Pilgrimage, named after St. Elizabeth Ann Seton, began near the Atlantic coast and will journey through our nation's oldest diocese and cross the Appalachian Mountains.

The National Eucharistic Pilgrimage will arrive at the Cathedral on Sunday, June 23. Following the 7:30 p.m. arrival ceremony by Bishop Brennan, Eucharistic Adoration will be held throughout the night, concluding with a Mass and Procession on Monday, June 24 at 8:30 a.m. We are in need of at least two adorers for each hour of Eucharistic Adoration. Please consider signing up by using the sheet in the back of the Church or by visiting saintjosephcathedral.com.

Shortly after His Resurrection, Jesus accompanied two disciples on their journey from Jerusalem to Emmaus—walking with them in their grief, offering hope, and finally revealing himself through the breaking of the bread. 

The Shrines of Pittsburgh offer five stunning sites in the heart of Pittsburgh: Saint Anthony Chapel in Troy Hill - one of the largest collection of relics in the world, Saint Nicholas in Millvale, Immaculate Heart of Mary in Polish Hill, and Saint Patrick and Saint Stanislaus Kostka in the Strip District.

SAINT PAUL OF THE CROSS MONASTERY, TOMB OF SERVANT OF GOD FATHER THEODORE FOLEY

The church at Saint Paul of the Cross Monastery on the South Side Slopes, best known for its retreat center, holds the tomb of a 20th century Pittsburgher on the path to sainthood. Servant of God Theodore Foley was a confessor to both the homeless and Pope St. Paul VI. He was also an advisor at Vatican II and worked to heal divisions in the Church following the council.

BASILICA OF SAINT MICHAEL THE ARCHANGEL, TOMB OF SERVANT OF GOD FR. DEMETRIUS GALLITZIN

In the mountains of Cambria County lies the tomb of a great missionary who renounced wealth and a royal title to become first a Catholic, then a priest. He brought the gospel to immigrants in the wilderness outpost of western Pennsylvania.



NATIONAL SHRINE OF SAINT ELIZABETH ANN SETON

Saint Elizabeth Ann Seton, the first canonized saint born in the United States, established the Sisters of Charity of Saint Joseph and a school here in 1809. She is entombed in the basilica, near the modest buildings where she lived with her sisters. A small museum tells her story, and recounts her sisters' later service in the Civil War. Tours and activities for all ages are offered regularly.


NATIONAL SHRINE GROTTO OF OUR LADY OF LOURDES

A short drive from the Seton shrine is the National Shrine Grotto of Our Lady of Lourdes. A priest built a chapel on Saint Mary's Mountain in 1806. He was attracted to the wildflowers and stream that flowed around a natural grotto. In 1879, seminarians from Mount Saint Mary Seminary transformed the grotto into a replica of the grotto at Lourdes. The shrine received a stone from the Lourdes grotto in 2007, which visitors can see and touch in the Emmitsburg grotto. Memorials to many saints line its walkways.

SAINTS OF THE WEEK

June 11 - St. Barnabas, apostle (1st century)

St. Barnabas was an influential early Christian who traveled with St. Paul, and later with John Mark, spreading the Gospel throughout Asia Minor. He played such an important role in the establishment of the early Church that St. Luke gave him the title of Apostle.

June 13 - St. Anthony of Padua, priest, doctor of the Church (1195-1231)

Anthony of Padua, a member of a noble Portuguese family, joined the Canons Regular of St. Augustine at a young age, but later joined the Franciscans to engage in missionary work. Although his missionary dreams were halted due to illness, he received public acclaim for his preaching style, which led to the conversion of many from heresy, earning him the title "the Hammer of the Heretics." *Patronage*: Portugal, poor, harvests, lost articles

WHY DO WE DO THAT? Catholic Life Explained:

God in Daily Life

Question:

How do I bring God into the work of my daily life?

Answer:

Whatever your daily work, you have an opportunity to encounter God and to follow His commandments in love. In the New Testament, we see that most of the Apostles didn't have a previous religious position. They were fishermen, tax collectors, and political activists. St. Paul was a tentmaker. Among the saints, we have doctors, lawyers, farmers, and stay-at-home moms. No matter your daily tasks, God can be present there!

One way concerns behavior. Start with an examination of conscience. Look at areas where you tend to struggle to imitate Christ at work. Do you gossip? Does brimming frustration become impatience at home? Pick one sin you struggle with, then choose a virtue to strengthen that area. If you tend to speak poorly of your co-workers, resolve to stop and to say one kind thing a day instead.

Another way relates to perspective, particularly your perspective of others. Jesus' incarnation reminds us of the value of every human being. Jesus is God, and each of us is created in God's image. When you encounter another person, you have an opportunity to see God in a new place and a new way — in that person in front of you. Genuinely listen to them and be present to their concerns. Loving your neighbor is loving God! Our relationship with God and the love He inspires in our hearts shouldn't remain only at church on Sunday. We can — and should — let our faith animate our lives!
