From Father Sateesh

"Live as children of the Light! Lord, I believe!"

In the first reading from the Book of Samuel we have the story of Samuel journeying to the house of Jesse to choose the successor of King Saul. Samuel thought that the chosen one was Eliab, because he was the eldest, the tallest and the most handsome of all the sons of Jesse. But



the Lord rejected Eliab and all the seven sons presented as worthy candidates to him. "God does not see as man sees; man looks at appearances, but God looks at the heart." Finally, the youngest son David arrives, he is not handsome and lacks experience, but he has a good heart. David is anointed King because God goes beyond appearances and sees David as the shepherd King of his people.

The Gospel gives the account of the cure of the blind man on the Sabbath and how, as he progressively sees more and more, the Pharisees who believe they have spiritual insight, see less and less. It starts with the disciples of Jesus, who sees the blind man as a subject of an interesting debate on the cause of blindness. Jesus spat on the ground, made a paste, rubbed it into his eyes and asked him to wash into the pool of Siloam. Incidentally, receiving sight does not come easy. It is a slow process.


The focus shifts from the blind man who can now see, to the Pharisees who refuse to see the truth. They question the blind man, they question whether it is proper to heal on the Sabbath, they question whether Jesus is acting with the power of God or the power of evil. The more they try to distort the truth the more the man is adamant in witnessing to Jesus. "How could a sinner produce signs like these?" Not only is his physical sight restored but he grows in faith in Jesus. Initially, he merely states, 'the man called Jesus did this for me. Next, he says, "He is a prophet". Later he proclaims, "This man is from God". And when Jesus reveals that he is the Son of man, he finally professes his faith: "Lord, I believe." In contrast the Pharisees progressively deny the truth and refuse to be open, no matter what the evidence. Jesus said: "I have come into the world so that those without sight may see and those with sight turn blind." We have to judge which is worse, being blind or pretending to see when in fact we are blind. When we accidentally bump into something or someone, some people ask: "Are you blind? Can't you see?" We get angry at these remarks because we believe we can see very well. Yet there are times we have to admit we are blind, that we don't see as well as we should, that we don't see the obvious, that we can't see beyond the physical. May His Word open our eyes! May we acknowledge our blindness so that we may see anew! Have an insightful Lenten weekend!

As we prepare to begin the distribution of the Precious Blood, we will start to schedule Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion for all the weekend Masses after Holy Thursday. **If you have served in this ministry in the past and would like to continue doing so or if you are new and would like to sign up, please use the sign up sheet in the back of the Church or contact the parish offices. There will be a mandatory training session for Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion on Thursday, March 23 at 7:30 p.m. in the Cathedral.**

Two smaller meals are permitted, if necessary, to maintain strength according to each one's needs, but eating solid food between meals is not permitted.

All Catholics ages 14 and over are bound to refrain from eating meat on Ash Wednesday and all Fridays of Lent.

CELEBRATING SAINT JOSEPH

Even during Lent, there are special days that the Church designates for celebration. The Solemnity of St. Joseph is one of those days. This day is particularly important in Sicily, Italy where San Giuseppe (St. Joseph in Italian) is the patron. The traditions continue in the United States with many Italian-Americans.

The spouse of Mary the mother of Jesus and the legal father of Jesus according to Jewish law, Joseph is a model of humility and obedience to God's will. He followed God's instructions, given by angels in his dreams, and took the pregnant Mary into his home as his wife, protected her and lesus at the child's birth in Bethlehem through the family's sojourn in Egypt, and provided for them as a carpenter in Nazareth. Pope Pius IX named St. Joseph Patron of the Universal Church in 1870; he is also the patron saint of carpenters, the dying, and workers.



The month of March is dedicated to St. Joseph. We don't know much about him except what is mentioned in the Gospels. Joseph was the husband of the Blessed Virgin Mary and the foster-father of Jesus. Holy Scripture proclaims him as a "just man," and the Church has turned to Joseph for his patronage and protection.

Pope Saint John Paul II, in his 1989 Apostolic Exhortation Redemptoris Custos (Guardian of the Redemeemer), hopes "that all may grow in devotion to the Patron of the Universal Church and in love for the Savior whom he served in such an exemplary manner ... In this way the whole Christian people not only will turn to St. Joseph with greater fervor and invoke his patronage with trust, but also will always keep before their eyes his humble, mature way of serving and of "taking part" in the plan of salvation." St. Joseph is invoked as patron for many causes. He is the patron of the Universal Church. He is the patron of the dying because tradition holds that Jesus and Mary were at his death-bed. He is also the patron of fathers, of carpenters, and of social justice. Many religious orders and communities are placed under his patronage, including the Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston.

SAINTS OF THE WEEK

March 19 - St. Joseph, Spouse of the Blessed Virgin Mary (1st century)

Saint Joseph was the foster father of Jesus, the man entrusted with his care and upbringing. We know that loseph was a "righteous man" who protected Mary from disgrace after she was found to be pregnant with Jesus (Matthew 1:19). Like the earlier Joseph in Genesis, he received an instruction and reassurance from God through dreams. The Gospel gives little information about him, save that he was an artisan who lived in Nazareth, was a descendant of David, and went to Bethlehem for a census, causing lesus to be born there in fulfillment of the prophecies.

When warned in a dream that Jesus was in danger because of the evil intentions of King Herod, Joseph took Jesus and Mary to live in exile in Egypt until he learned that Herod had died. As a result, lesus was spared the fate of the Holy Innocents.

After the account of Jesus' being lost and found in the Temple during a pilgrimage, Joseph is not mentioned again. We can infer that he had died before lesus began his ministry; he was certainly not alive at the time of Crucifixion, because he would have most likely been the one to claim Jesus' body, not Joseph of Arimathea. Catholic tradition describes him as dying in the arms of Jesus and Mary, and so he is invoked as the patron of a happy death.

Because he was a man who worked with his hands, he is the patron of works and especially carpenters. Devotion to Saint Joseph was developed rather late, and was popularized by St. Bernardine of Siena during the fifteenth century. Saint Joseph has been honored on March 19 since the end of the tenth century. Pope Pius IX declared him Patron of the Universal Church in 1870.

Patronage: workers, carpenters, fathers, Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston

March 23 - St. Turibius Mogrovejo, bishop (1538-1606)

Saint Turibius of Mogrovejo was born into the Spanish nobility and dedicated his life to bringing Christianity to the native peoples of Peru as the missionary archbishop of Lima. He traveled the whole of his enormous diocese, usually on foot, evangelizing and baptizing as he went. Among those he baptized and confirmed were St. Rose of Lima and St. Martin de Porres. St. Turibius also founded the first seminary in the Western hemisphere and built roads, schools, chapels, hospitals, and convents. He is remembered for his defense of the native peoples against the injustices of the Spanish government.
