"Those who humble themselves will be exalted by God!"

When we read the scriptures or listen to a teaching, we try to make connections with daily life and our own experiences. But when we are confronted by a teaching that seems to be too close to home for comfort, we quickly find some-



one whom we know to whom it seems to fit: the neighbor next door, the boss, the parish priest, the bishop or.... This Sunday's readings would seem to apply to them... not to us! Maybe, but if we are all followers of Christ, then all of us are called to be authentic Christians.


The prophetic book of Malachi was written after the return of the exiles and is directed against the abuses that marked the restoration of the sacrificial system. The priests were particularly at fault in this matter as they were preoccupied with the performances of the rituals and temple sacrifices and neglected religious instructions. Malachi lays greater stress on instruction. Despite the opening statement addressed directly to priests, this reading was chosen because of the final paragraph and its opening question: "Why then are we faithless to one another, profaning the covenant of our ancestors?" If we all have one Father, one God, all of us are called to instruct others, not so much only by words but more by deeds.


On several occasions Jesus found himself in opposition with the teachings of the scribes and Pharisees and their interpretation of religion, but in today's Gospel he does not confront their preaching but their very lives that contradict what they preach. Their actions make a mockery of their preaching and often their religious practices are done to impress people rather than to praise and worship God. Consequently, religion, which should be uplifting and inspirational, to help carry the burden of daily hardship, has added to their burden.


Jesus used strong words of condemnation for the Pharisees and all those who believe that in serving God they could use religious leadership for their own advancement; he called them hypocrites. Jesus puts his finger on three types of hypocrisy. First is a tendency not to practice what we preach. The second tendency of hypocrisy is to lay heavy burden on others while not attempting to lift them ourselves. The third weakness of the hypocrite is to depend on marks of honor and people's attention.

The last part of the gospel refers to Jesus' advice to his followers about their code of conduct in carrying out their religious duties. What Jesus is at pains to point out is that the teacher is the minister and servant of God's word to the people. As followers of Jesus, we cannot make distinction among ourselves, we cannot see ourselves as superior to others, we cannot usurp God's leadership of his people. We have only one Master, one Teacher, one Lord, and all the rest of us are servants of the Lord. May our every deed reveal our desire to be servants of our God and of one another!



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The Basilica of St. John Lateran is one of the four major basilicas in Rome, with St. Peter, St. Mary Major, and St. Paul Outside the Walls. It is unique among the four since it (not St. Peter's) is the cathedral church of the Bishop of Rome, the pope. It the oldest church in the West, built in the time of Constantine and was consecrated by Pope Sylvester in 324. "Lateran" was the name of a Roman family whose lands were seized for the Church by the Emperor Constantine, and which then became the site of a great basilica dedicated in honor of St. John the Baptist. For centuries, the old Lateran palace was the residence of the popes. It was only when the popes returned from the Avignon exile in the 14th century that they took up residence at the Vatican. The basilica now has a triple dedication in honor of St. John the Baptist, St. John the Evangelist, and our Lord. Across the front of the basilica is a Latin inscription that says, "This is the mother and head of all churches in the whole world." It is a reminder of why the dedication of this one church is celebrated by the universal Church: we are one family, one flock, and we are led by one shepherd, the successor of Saint Peter.

## **40-Hours Eucharistic Celebration**

Our 40-Hours Eucharistic Devotion was truly inspiring as we witnessed so many people from local parishes visit our Cathedral to worship, adore, celebrate, and praise Jesus in the Holy Eucharist! The celebration began on October 26 with an Opening Mass celebrated by Fr. Justin Golna of St. John, Wellsburg. At the conclusion of the Mass, the Blessed Sacrament was exposed on the main altar for continuous adoration, where it remained until the Closing Mass with Bishop Mark Brennan on October 28.



## **STEWARDSHIP REFLECTION**

### Live & Give in Gratitude

A theme of humility links today's Scripture passages. The prophet Malachi warns priests of his day that they have strayed *from the way*, which has caused many to falter. Their pride prevents them from humbly *hearing the Lord of hosts*. Jesus proclaims through St. Matthew's Gospel: "The greatest among you will be the one who serves the rest. Whoever exalts himself will be humbled; but whoever humbles himself will be exalted." This proclamation is a model of humility and service for faithful stewards. What is the Lord asking you to do with your abundant gifts and talents to build His Kingdom? Is pride blocking you from humbly doing His will instead of your own? What is Jesus calling each of us to do for our parish? What vocation is He presently calling you to for His glory? Evaluate your service to your parish and the greater Church, and consider taking a spiritual retreat to renew or further discern God's call.



"It is a holy and a wholesome thought to pray for the dead that they may be loosed from their sins," observes the writer of Maccabees in the Old Testament (2 Maccabees 12:45-46; guoted in the Catechism of the Catholic Church, 958). Intercession on behalf of those who have died is a cherished tenet of our Catholic faith, springing from our belief in the resurrection of the body and the communion of saints. "Though separated from the living, the dead are still at one with the community of believers on earth and benefit from their prayer and intercession (Order of Christians Funerals, 6). Trusting in God's mercy, we continue to pray for them, knowing that this spiritual bond with our brothers and sisters who have died can never be broken. In the month of November, when we celebrate All Souls, we pray in a special way for those who have died — those who are known to us, and those known only to God.

#### Ways to Honor the Holy Souls

- Visit a cemetery and pray for the deceased
- Pray for the souls in purgatory with St. Gertrude's Prayer (see page 7)
- Perform acts of charity and sacrifices for the holy souls

## **SAINTS OF THE WEEK**


#### November 10 - St. Leo the Great, pope, doctor of the Church (d.461)

As pope and doctor of the Church, Saint Leo the Great strongly supported the teachings of the Council of Chalcedon, especially on the humanity and divinity of Christ. He advocated papal authority by moving from the traditional approach that the pope is a successor to Saint Peter's chair to the pope as Saint Peter's heir. Under his leadership, uniformity of pastoral practice was encouraged, liturgical and clerical abuses were corrected, and priests were sent on a mission to extinguish Priscillianism, a heresy that claimed the human body was evil. Saint Leo is recognized as a "protector of the people" because he persuaded Attila the Hun to not invade the city of Rome, and later prevented the Vandals (East German invaders) from torching the city of Rome and massacring its people.

#### November 11 - St. Martin of Tours, bishop (316-397)

St. Martin of Tours was forced by his father, a pagan officer in the Roman army, to join the military. While serving in the military, he had a life-changing event in which he cut his cloak in half to clothe a freezing beggar. Following this encounter he had a vision of Christ wrapped in the cloak. As a result of this experience, St. Martin chose to be baptized and declared himself a soldier of peace for Christ, refusing to participate in any act of violence. He took up the life of a hermit, thereby introducing monasticism into Gaul. Following his election as bishop of Tours he continued living as a monk, but made numerous trips to visit his people and establish new monasteries. The people of Gaul converted to Christianity due to his example. *Patronage*: soldiers; wine producers; France

## WHY DO WE DO THAT? Catholic Life Explained:

Sin on the Soul

#### **Question:**

Why do some sacraments leave a character or mark on the soul? Don't all sacraments affect the soul?

#### **Answer:**

All sacraments mediate grace and connect us to Christ and to the Church. Some sustain us in our faith journey, while others help us heal from the effects of sin. Each one offers a share in God's life, giving us what we need to be faithful followers of Jesus. But some sacraments change us in ways that are irreversible. The three sacraments that leave a character are Baptism, Confirmation, and Holy Orders. We are literally different people because of the effect of the grace of those sacraments. We are changed at the core of our being in such a fundamental way that we can not go back to what we once were.

In Baptism, we are freed from original sin, initiated into the Body of Christ as adopted sons and daughters. In Confirmation, we are given the fullness of God's Spirit, sealed in his grace and gifted with what we need to live a Christian life. In Holy Orders, a priest is marked as an 'alter Christus,' another Christ, and is once and forever a priest who offers sacrifice, forgives sin, and acts in the person of Christ. In these three sacraments, we are conformed more closely to Christ, reflecting his love and truth.
