"Balanced loyalties! God always come first!"

While we go about our daily lives, we often compartmentalize our lives. We embrace one set of values for our homes, we live by another in our business lives and profess yet another in our religious commitment. There can be moments when these values clash and we must



make choices and preferences. Does God have first place? Do we see ourselves as believers first? Today's word challenges us to make God first always.

In the first reading there is reference made to Cyrus the pagan king, whom the Lord chose to fulfil his plans for his chosen people. God is always supreme king and holds the destiny of the world in his hands, though at times it might appear that earthly powers are leading us astray. Earthly rulers, Cyrus, or Caesar are called by God to reveal something of His power and plan for the human race. While we respect our leaders and observe their directives, we are ultimately called to follow our God and discern His plan for us every day of our

In today's Gospel the Pharisees bring the issue of paying taxes to the Romans for Jesus' opinion on the matter. The overt question is whether it is proper to pay taxes to the government, but there is a hidden agenda that Jesus is well aware of. Whichever way Jesus answered the question would trap him. If he said taxes had to be paid to Rome, the people would be against him and if he said the opposite he would be seen as fomenting rebellion. Jesus completely sidesteps the issue by asking for a coin with which the taxes were to be paid. This coin bore the image of Caesar and an inscription proclaiming his authority. Jesus simply says, "Give to Caesar what belongs to Caesar, and to God what belongs to God."

Jesus is not entering into a discussion of the rights of the state and the rights of religion; but on the occasion of the question, he proposes a deeper truth. What matters more to Jesus than being under Caesar's rule and paying taxes, is belonging to God's kingdom. Jesus is reminding his listeners of a deeper, issue that of being people of God. If they belong to God, then they have to give God his due. God has to be the most important priority in their lives. What they owe to God is far more important than what they owe to anyone else. It is easy to remember what we owe to our fellow men, but we can forget what we owe to God.

We can look at today's gospel from many ways. One of them could be images - how they affect our lives. Ultimately the question is: where do we find God's image in our society? We are all citizens of two realms, the earthly and the spiritual. We find God's image stamped on creation, on every human being, and in every word, we speak and every good deed we do. Once we discover what image we wish to reflect, our lives and decisions will fall into place. Remember who you look like. Image can be everything. The ideal Christian is one who fulfils his duty both to his fellow men and to God. Only when there is a clash of interests do we have to remind ourselves that God always comes first. Besides God, Christians have a duty towards their fellow men. Christians should not shirk public office but see it as an opportunity to serve their fellow men. May we enjoy being citizens of heaven and earth, but firstly God's!

respect life month called to serve moms in need

Each October the Church in the United States celebrates Respect Life Month, and the first Sunday of October is observed as Respect Life Sunday. As Catholics, we are called to cherish, defend, and protect those who are most vulnerable, from the beginning of life to its end, and at every point in between. During the month of October, the Church asks us to reflect more deeply on the dignity of every human life.

From the time we are knit together in our mothers' wombs until we take our final breaths, each moment of our lives is a gift from God. While every season of life brings its own challenges and trials, each season also gives us new opportunities to grow in our relationship with God.

Today the gift of life is threatened in countless ways. Those who are most vulnerable, rather than receiving the protection they deserve, are all too often seen as a burden and as expendable. As new attacks on human life continue to emerge, we can be tempted to despair, but Christ instead offers us unfailing hope.

By virtue of this Christian hope, we can face any challenge or trial. May we hold fast to Christ our hope, from the beginning of life to its very end.

LITURGICAL LIVING

What is 40-Hours Devotion?

This week, we encourage you to join faithful from throughout the Wheeling area in a personal encounter with Jesus during a special 40-Hours Devotion at the Cathedral. In a 40-Hours Devotion, the Holy Eucharist is exposed on the altar in a monstrance for forty hours of adoration.



The devotion will begin with an Opening Mass on Thursday, October 26 at 6pm. After the Opening Mass, adoration will take place continuously, to include overnight hours, through the Closing Mass with Bishop Brennan on Saturday, October 28 at 6pm.

Why 40 Hours?

40 Hours Devotion comes from the 40 hours that Christ's body traditionally rested in the tomb. 40 is a significant number in the Bible, often tied to trials and/or suffering: the Israelites wandered in the desert for 40 years, and Christ was tempted in the desert for 40 days prior to the start of his ministry.

History of 40-Hours Devotion

The practice of 40 Hours Devotion dates to as early as 1527, introduced by St. Anthony Mary Zaccaria in Milan and Vicenza, and spread by St. Ignatius and the Jesuits. In Rome, this period of forty hours of Solemn Exposition of the Eucharist was scheduled so that the forty hours devotion in each church formed a continuous time of adoration from church to church.

40-Hours in the United States

St. John Neumann was the first church leader in America to practice the devotion. At the time, Catholics faced great opposition in his home city of Philadelphia during the Know-Nothing Riots of 1844. Anti-Catholic protesters burned

two churches and continued to foster animosity towards the Catholics in the city.

Bishop Neumann wanted to institute 40 Hours Devotion, but some of the priests in the diocese were hesitant, believing that it might fan the flames of anti-Catholic sentiment and even result in the desecration of the Eucharist. Neumann was working late into the night when he fell asleep at his desk with his candle still lit. As he slept, the candle burnt down and caught the papers on his desk. Miraculously, he awoke before a large fire broke out — and the papers, though charred, were still readable.

Neumann thanked God for His protection and the Lord spoke to him, telling him to not fear about having the devotion. The first was held in St. Philip Neri Parish, and then expanded throughout the diocese and beyond, being approved for all American dioceses in 1866.

The Tradition Continues

We are honored to carry on the tradition of 40 Hours Devotion, providing the faithful an opportunity to draw close to the Lord in prayer, especially during this time of National Eucharistic Revival. We would love for you to join us!

SAINTS OF THE WEEK

October 23 - Saint John of Capistrano (1386-1456)

Saint John of Capistrano was born in Italy and entered the Franciscans in 1416. He was drawn to the acetic life and became a follower of St. Bernardine of Siena. After his ordination, John traveled throughout Italy, Germany, Bohemia, Austria, Hungary, Poland, and Russia, preaching penance and establishing numerous communities of Franciscan renewal. When Mohammed II threatened Vienna and Rome, John, then seventy, was commissioned by Pope Callistus III to lead a crusade against the invading Turks. Marching at the head of an army of 70,000 Christians, he was victorious in the battle of Belgrade in 1456. *Patronage*: military chaplains; judges; lawyers

October 24 - Saint Anthony Mary Claret, bishop (1807-1870)

Saint Anthony Mary Claret, the son of a Spanish weaver, wanted to be a Jesuit, but ill health prevented him from entering that religious order. Instead, he became a secular priest, overseeing a parish in Spain before heading to Catalonia and the Canary Islands as a missionary. He established the Congregation of the Immaculate Heart of Mary (the Claretians), a group of priests and brothers dedicated to seeing the world through the eyes of the poor. They operate a diverse number of ministries throughout the world. St. Anthony was instrumental in spreading the devotion to the Immaculate Heart of Mary and the Rosary.

October 28 - Saints Simon and Jude, apostles (1st century)

Tradition maintains that Saint Simon the Zealot preached missions throughout Persia and Egypt. Saint Jude, not to be confused with Judas Iscariot, is the patron of hopeless causes and is called Thaddeus in the Gospel according to Matthew and the Gospel according to Mark. It is believed that he engaged in missionary work in Mesopotamia and Persia. Both Apostles are thought to have been martyred in Persia, and their relics were transferred to St. Peter's Basilica in Rome sometime during the seventh or eighth century.

WHY DO WE DO THAT? Catholic Life Explained:

Dropped Host

Question:

What happens to a consecrated host if it accidentally falls to the ground?

Answer:

This a very practical question because, as we all know, accidents happen, even during the most careful celebration of the liturgy. The short answer to this question is that nothing happens to the consecrated host. The Real Presence of Jesus remains in the consecrated host or any consecrated wine that might accidentally be spilled.

Another question we might ask is: How should the minsters respond if the Eucharist is dropped or spilled? If this happens, the priest, deacon, or extraordinary minister of holy Communion should immediately pick up the dropped host and consume it. If it is a case of the Precious Blood being spilled, the minister would use the purificator (and additional purificators if needed) to clean the spill and then the area should be reverently washed as soon as the Mass is over and the water poured into the sacrarium (a special sink that is located in church sacristies for reverently disposing of holy water, the water used to clean sacred vessels, etc.).
