"Let the hearts that seek the Lord rejoice; turn to the Lord and his strength; constantly seek his face."

On this Thirtieth Sunday in Ordinary Time in the Gospel of Matthew, we hear the Pharisees asking Jesus, "Teacher, which commandment in the law is the greatest?" You shall love the Lord,

May we this week take some reflection time to think about this great commandment and how we live it in our daily lives!


This Wednesday, November 1, we celebrate the Solemnity of All Saints. It is Holy Day of Obligation, and we are required to attend Mass on this feast. Mass will be celebrated at 12:05 p.m. and 6:00 p.m. Mark your calendar now to attend one of these Masses.

Also, this week on Friday, November 3, we will have Eucharistic Adoration beginning after 12:05 p.m. Mass and concluding with Benediction at 5:00 p.m. Please sign up to spend some time with the Lord in the Holy Eucharist, as during this National Eucharistic Revival we are trying to renew our love for and in the Eucharistic Lord.

November is traditionally the month to pray for all the faithful departed. We will have our Book of Remembrance in the sanctuary during this month and you are invited to list the names of your family members and friends who have died. Those names in the book will be remembered at all Masses during the month of November. May the souls of all the faithful departed rest in peace!



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HOLY DAY OF OBLIGATION



Wednesday, November 1 is the Solemnity of All Saints. On this day, the Church honors all the saints, those who have finished the race and now rejoice in God's presence. An observance in honor of all the saints has been celebrated on November 1 since at least the seventh century, and it originated even earlier. "Why should our praise and glorification, or even the celebration of this feastday mean anything to the saints?" asked Saint Bernard of Clairvaux. "Clearly, if we venerate their memory, it serves us, not them, But I tell you, when I think of them, I feel myself inflamed with a tremendous yearning. Calling the saints to mind inspires, or rather arouses in us, above all else, a longing to enjoy their company ... We long to share in the citizenship of heaven to dwell with the spirits of the blessed ... In short, we long to be united in happiness with all the saints." This is a Holy Day of Obligation, so please plan to attend Mass!

The next day, Thursday, November 2, the Church commemorates all of the faithful departed, those men and women who have gone before us in death. "Why would we doubt that our offerings for the dead bring them some consolation? Let us not hesitate to help those who have died and to offer our prayers for them," said Saint John Chrysostom. On this day, we pray for them in a special way, trusting that God will hear and answer our prayers that they know eternal light, happiness, and peace.

This Wednesday we will join the Church throughout the world in celebrating the beautiful Solemnity of All Saints. This Holy Day of Obligation immerses us in the lives of countless saints throughout the ages. Those who struggled before us to gain sanctity and for their efforts won a crown of glory. The saints offer us courage and a sense of intimate

communion with the Father through Christ. God not only calls us to holiness but also gives us the strength to live it through the Holy Eucharist.

This Solemnity reminds us of the many men, women and children who were obedient to Divine Providence in their lives, some were priests or religious, some married, others single; some poor, others rich; some very intelligent, others barely, some saints; others doing their best to become saints.



# **STEWARDSHIP REFLECTION**

### Live & Give in Gratitude

Today, in St. Matthew's Gospel, Jesus draws from the Old Testament and teaches the first and greatest commandment: to love God with your whole heart, soul, and mind. He then expresses the second greatest commandment: to love your neighbor as yourself. In Exodus, Moses commands love of neighbor through compassion and kindness to strangers, widows, and orphans. In the Gospel, Jesus challenges the Pharisees — and us — to love God above all. Complete love of God is challenging in a society that lures and distracts us with the temptation of worldly goods and possessions. St. Paul's First Letter to the Thessalonians describes how that community is a model of faithfulness to the Word of the Lord. Christian stewards acknowledge that all gifts come from God and, in gratitude, share these blessings with the poor and needy. How do we respond to the needs of the poor? Is our love of neighbor evident in our actions? Demonstrate your love of neighbor by volunteering at a local soup kitchen or donating clothing to a local St. Vincent de Paul society.





"It is a holy and a wholesome thought to pray for the dead that they may be loosed from their sins," observes the writer of Maccabees in the Old Testament (2 Maccabees 12:45-46; guoted in the Catechism of the Catholic Church, 958). Intercession on behalf of those who have died is a cherished tenet of our Catholic faith, springing from our belief in the resurrection of the body and the communion of saints. "Though separated from the living, the dead are still at one with the community of believers on earth and benefit from their prayer and intercession (Order of Christians Funerals, 6). Trusting in God's mercy, we continue to pray for them, knowing that this spiritual bond with our brothers and sisters who have died can never be broken. In the month of November, when we celebrate All Souls, we pray in a special way for those who have died — those who are known to us, and those known only to God.

### Ways to Honor the Holy Souls

- Visit a cemetery and pray for the deceased
- Pray for the souls in purgatory with St. Gertrude's Prayer (see page 7)
- Perform acts of charity and sacrifices for the holy souls

# **SAINTS OF THE WEEK**

### November 3 - St. Martin of Porres, religious (1579-1639)

Saint Martin de Porres, called the "father of charity," was born in Lima, Peru, of a Spanish nobleman and a young freed black slave. Martin grew up in poverty and spent part of his youth with a surgeon–barber from whom he learned some medicine and care of the sick. At age 11 he became a servant in the Holy Rosary Dominican priory. He was known for his tender care of the sick and for his spectacular cures. He cared for sick people in the monastery, fed the needy with food from the monastery, and began a home for abandoned children. He had a close friendship with St. Rose of Lima. *Patronage*: social justice; peoples of mixed races

### November 4 - St. Charles Borromeo, bishop (1538-1584)

Saint Charles Borromeo, a doctor of civil and canon law, was a great champion of the Church redefining itself in light of the Protestant Reformation. As Archbishop of Milan, he promulgated the reforms of the Council of Trent, giving special attention to liturgical and clerical renewal. Other significant contributions he made to the Church include the establishment of new seminaries for the education of the clergy, defining a code of moral conduct for clergy, and founding the Oblates of St. Augustine. St. Charles adopted a simple life in which he responded to the needs of the poor and sick by providing monetary and spiritual support. *Patronage:* bishops; seminarians; catechists; catechumens

# WHY DO WE DO THAT? Catholic Life Explained:

Coming Back to Church

### **Question:**

I have been away from the Church for a few years and really want to get active again, not so much for me, but for my children. Is this a bad reason to come back to Church?

### Answer:

If you are on your way to the supermarket, and you are forced to detour from your usual route because of road work, does the food you buy taste different? Is the meal less filling? Are the vegetables less tasty? Of course not. In our faith journey, there are many detours called sin. Some are greater than others, some are even a bit longer. But God's grace comes to us in ways we understand and recognize and need. Your children leading you back to the Church is not as important as the fact that you are back.

This is an opportunity for you to renew, strengthen, and deepen your faith. Regardless of how we get to Church, or what draws us closer to God, the fact is we are there. Do what you need to do to get right with God and the Church. Go to confession, begin good family religious practices, and be involved in the ministries your parish offers. Be more than a lukewarm parishioner. Be the kind of Catholic you want your children to be.
