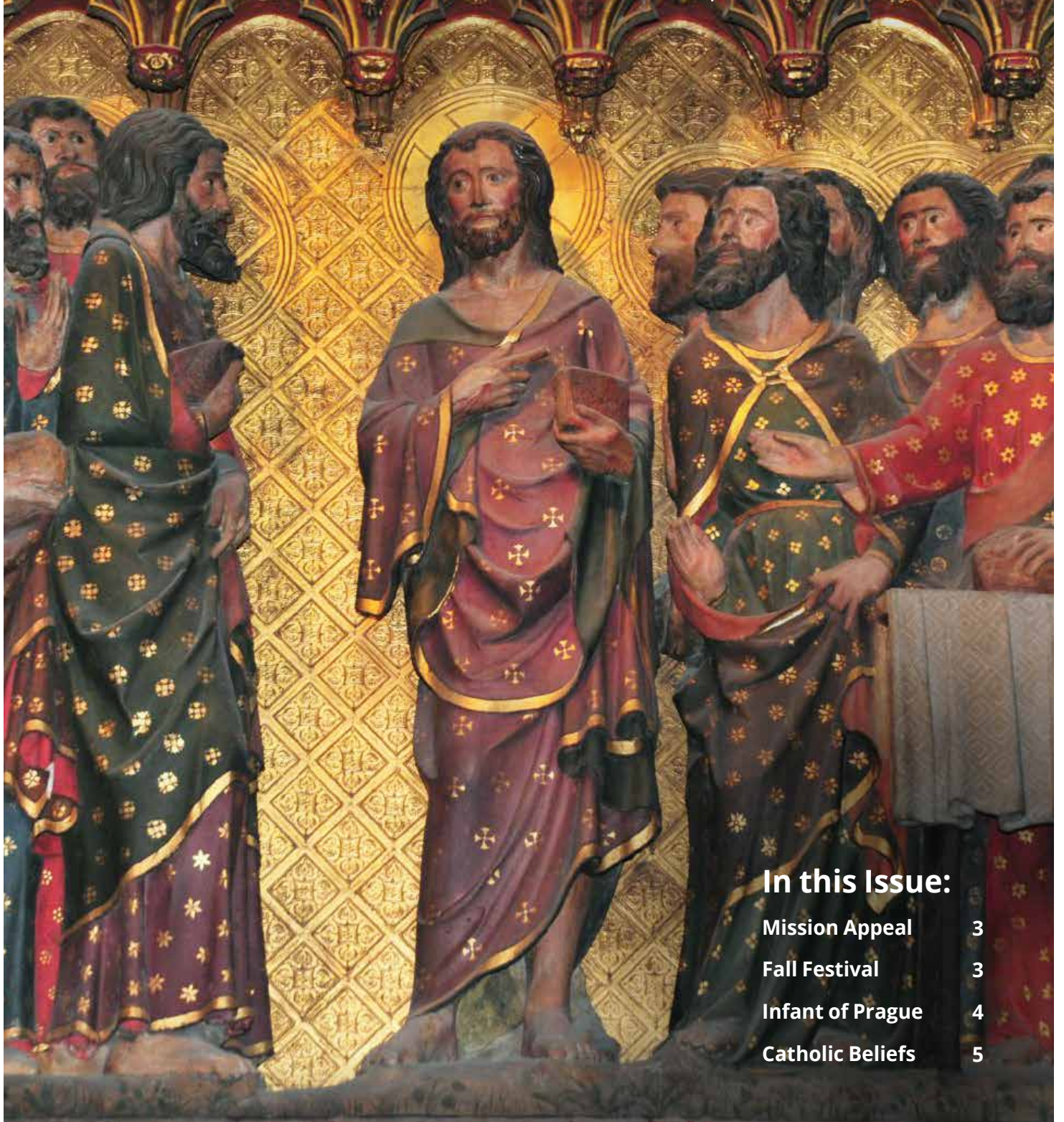

## From Father Sateesh

"Resolve conflicts with open communication and love."



Most people go through life trying to "mind their own business"! But as Christians we cannot live only for 'me', 'myself' and 'I', but are asked to take responsibility for others. This is especially so in matters of justice and morality; we cannot shirk our responsibility.

The first reading refers to a primitive kind of police, the watchman who stood on the Palestinian hills and blew his trumpet to warn of invaders. Prophets like Ezekiel saw themselves as watchmen over the spiritual dangers that threatened God's people. Ezekiel reminds us that if my brother does something wrong to me, I have to take responsibility for his/her action as a Christian. If I do not do so I will be held accountable for his action. Today much evil is done because good people prefer to be silent. As Christians it becomes our business to respond to every situation with faith and love.

In today's Gospel Matthew deals with the relationship of members of the Church and highlights one of the most painful of responsibilities, namely fraternal correction. Jesus reminds us that if there is any breakdown in our relationship, we should not wait but be the first to put things right, to speak about it in private, in order to build the relationship again. The important thing is to do it with love, delicacy and tact so that the other is not made to feel small in the eyes of the community.

I'm sure you will rejoice with me that the work on our baptismal font is almost finished! Deep thanks to all those who contributed to this year's Catholic Sharing Appeal - it is through your generous support that we were able to cover most of the expenses for the necessary repairs to this very important place where new Christians are born!

We welcome back our Cathedral Schola this Sunday after their summer break. As many of you know, our Schola works hard providing beautiful music at our 10:30 a.m. Mass on Sundays as well as for special liturgies and events throughout the year. We are very grateful for their ministry and dedication to enhancing our worship by giving voice to the glory and beauty of the liturgy!

## Infant of Prague Novena Begins This Week

**This Monday, September 11 at 7:00 p.m. we will begin our 12th annual Novena to the Infant Jesus of Prague.** The Novena will be prayed on nine consecutive Monday evenings concluding on November 6. To celebrate the National Eucharistic Revival, the theme for this year's reflections will be based on **"The Eucharist: Gift, Mystery, and Reality."** Each week consists of Exposition and Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament, a homily given by a guest priest or deacon, music, and prayers to the Infant of Prague. Find out more below!

### Novenas

The word "novena" is derived from the Latin word for nine, or "novem." Typically, a novena refers to nine days of prayer, asking God for a specific intention, often through a particular saint's intercession. Novenas are a beautiful way to grow purposeful, consistent, and persistent in daily prayer.

### History of the Infant of Prague

Originating in the Czech Republic, tradition holds that the original statue of the Infant Jesus of Prague was once possessed by St. Teresa of Ávila and was brought to what was then known as Bohemia by a Spanish noblewoman upon her marriage to a Czech nobleman named Vratislav of Pernstyn. Their daughter, Princess Lobkowitz, gifted the statue to the Discalced Carmelite friars. It now resides in the Church of Our Lady Victorious in Prague.

### Statue of the Infant of Prague

In His left hand, the Infant Jesus holds a miniature globe topped by a cross, representing His kingship over the world. His right hand is raised in blessing, with two fingers bent to reflect Christ's divine and human nature, and the other three fingers raised to symbolize the unity of the Trinity.

### Significance of the Infant of Prague

By depicting Jesus as a child, the tradition of the Infant of Prague also



emphasizes His humanity, and how we are children of God because of the salvation that He brings us. As Pope Benedict XVI said: *"The figure of the Child Jesus, the tender infant, brings home to us God's closeness and his love. We come to understand how precious we are in his eyes, because it is through him that we in our turn have become children of God. Every human being is a child of God and therefore our brother or sister, to be welcomed and respected. May our society grasp this truth! Every human person would then be appreciated not for what he has, but for who he is, since in the face of every human being, without distinction of race or culture, God's image shines forth."*

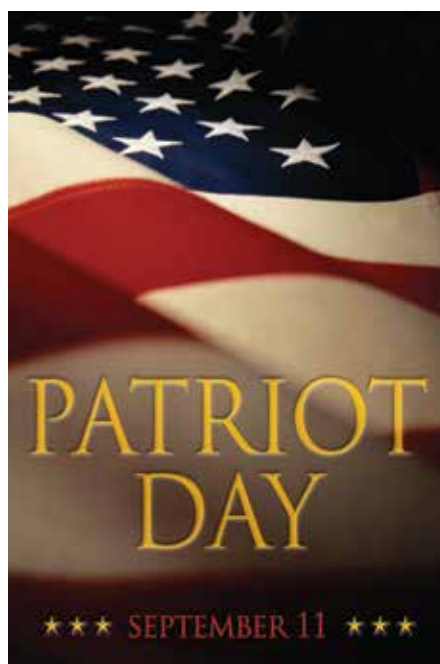

Each year on September 11, we pause as a nation to remember the horrific terrorist attacks on the United States in 2001. 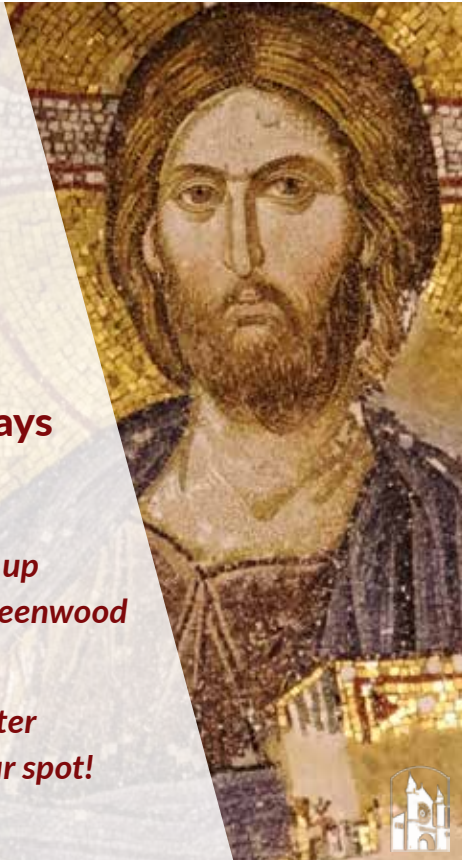

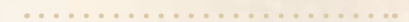

On September 15, the Church observes a memorial honoring the Blessed Mother as Our Lady of Sorrows. "And a sword will pierce your own soul, too," Simeon told Mary when she presented the child Jesus in the Temple forty days after his birth (Luke 2:35). That prophecy was fulfilled when Mary stood at the foot of her Son's Cross, sharing his bitter suffering. During the month of September, we honor Mary under the title of Our Lady of Sorrows. This month, let us bring to Mary all our sorrows, knowing that she understands what it is to truly suffer. This month is a good time to draw closer to our Blessed Mother by meditating on the great hymn to the Mother of Sorrows, the *Stabat Mater*.

### September 13 - St. John Chrysostom, bishop, doctor of the Church (c.350-407)

After a short stint as a monk, St. John Chrysostom, whose surname means “golden mouth,” returned to Antioch, where he was ordained a priest and became a noted preacher. During his free time he wrote commentaries on the Pauline letters as well as the Gospels according to Matthew and John. Due to his reputation for preaching and writing, he was appointed bishop of Constantinople. As bishop he initiated a program of reform that challenged clerical abuses and the extravagant lifestyle of the upper class. His reforms were not always received well, especially on the part of Empress Eudoxia; therefore, he was exiled from the city for a period of time. *Patronage:* preachers; Istanbul

### September 15 - Our Lady of Sorrows

The memorial of Our Lady of Sorrows is a relatively modern celebration, included on the universal calendar only in 1814. In the Gospel according to Luke, as Simeon holds the infant Christ in his arms, he tells Mary that her life will be full of suffering. Her Son will be “opposed,” and “a sword will pierce [Mary’s] soul, too” (Luke 2: 34.35). That prophecy is fulfilled when Jesus is crucified and Mary stands at the foot of his Cross. The image of the Mater Dolorosa, the Sorrowful Mother, is the subject of one of the most famous works of art, Michelangelo’s Pieta, which shows Mary with the dead Christ in her arms, her face revealing peace and acceptance, and yet profound grief. We pray in particular on this day for all mothers who suffer for their children, especially those who have lost a child.

### September 16 - Sts. Cornelius, pope, (d.253) & Cyprian, bishop, (d.280), martyrs

Cornelius and Cyprian lived during the persecution by the Emperor Decius. Cornelius, the pope, faced the issue of whether or not Christians who renounced their faith during the persecutions should be welcomed back into the Church. With great compassion, he publicly declared that these individuals may return to the Church after a period of penance. Cyprian, Bishop of Carthage, spent much of his life in hiding due to the persecutions, but this did not stop him from offering pastoral guidance and dispensing wisdom to the people of his diocese. Through letters, he urged the people to remain faithful to their Christian call. Both Saints Cornelius and Cyprian shared the same fate – a martyr’s death.



## NATIONAL Eucharistic Revival

### EUCHARISTIC MIRACLE AT TIXTLA

*Mexico, 2006*

In October 2006, Fr. Leopoldo Roque, pastor of Saint Martin of Tours Parish, invited Father Raymundo Reyna Esteban to lead a spiritual retreat for his parishioners. As Fr. Leopoldo and another priest were distributing Communion, assisted by a religious sister, this latter turns towards Fr. Leopoldo with tears in her eyes: the Host that she had taken to give Communion to a parishioner had begun to effuse a reddish substance.

The scientific research conducted included the following conclusions, presented in May 2013:

1. The substance analyzed corresponds to blood in which there are hemoglobin and DNA of human origin.
2. Two studies conducted by forensic experts have shown that the substance originates from the interior, excluding the hypothesis that someone could have placed it from the exterior.
3. The blood type is AB, similar to the one found in the Host of Lanciano and in the Shroud of Turin.

**WHY DO WE DO THAT?**  
**Catholic Life Explained:**

*Annulments*

**Question:**

After a civil divorce, is a Catholic obligated to pursue an annulment?

**Answer:**

Many Catholics are not exactly sure what an annulment does. An annulment does not deny that a marriage took place, nor does it deny that there once was love. It does not mean that people say anything untrue, such as they never loved each other or that everything in their marriage was wrong. An annulment does not negate children, nor make them illegitimate. An annulment addresses the spiritual aspect of marriage. In effect, an annulment says that at the time of the wedding, there was either something present or something absent that prevented the sacrament from taking place. It is a spiritual determination that, if granted in the affirmative, allows a person to marry in the Church.

Annulments have no legal standing and are unable to be used in a civil court. Therefore, a Catholic has no moral obligation to pursue an annulment. However, when the tragedy of divorce occurs, and there is no hope for reconciliation, annulments may help bring some spiritual closure to a person's life. Some people have found the process to be healing and others have found it to be difficult. Speak to your priest or a member of the Diocesan Tribunal staff to decide what is best for you.
