"God's ways and God's thoughts are much greater than ours!"

Very early in life we learn that there is a price tag for everything. Nothing comes free of cost! So, we go about earning as much as we can, and we are proud of the fact that we have earned what we have by the sweat of our brow. However, we



forget that relationships and love cannot be earned. There is no business in love! For that matter, we can never earn the love of God, nor do we have to! Unlike human beings, God is not stingy or calculating but most generous in his gifts. He gives us not according to what we deserve but because of his unconditional love.

In today's extract the Prophet Isaiah insists on Israel's turning to God with humility and a sense of a need of him. "Seek the Lord while he is still to be found." Though he is a transcendent God he will draw close to the person who calls upon him. The passage also speaks of the ever-loving God who is known for his tender loving care of the poor and the weak. He is so different from us; his ways contrast sharply with our short-sighted and narrow ways. "My thoughts are not your thoughts, my ways are above your ways, as high as the heavens are above the earth."

In today's Gospel Jesus tells the parable of the workers in the vineyard, aimed mainly at the Pharisees. In the parable Jesus shows what God is like: God is generous and full of compassion for the poor and the needy. Many people consider Christ's story as an unfair story. It seems to favor the idler at the expense of the hard worker. But Jesus' story is not about justice. It's about generosity unlike anything we've known before. In the parable we see the owner of the vineyard employing workers from early in the day, to people who are taken in at the eleventh hour. To everyone he promises a just wage. One would expect that those who bore the burden of the day would be paid more. We must note that the eleventh-hour workers were not idlers who didn't want to work. But they were people no respectable employee would hire. They were the rejects. Yet this is exactly what the owner of the vineyard did. He employed them at the eleventh hour and paid them a full day's salary. This is the strong point of the parable. God's generosity utterly transcends human generosity. God deals with us in ways very different from the ways we humans deal with one another. The goodness of God is a great comfort to us. But it is also a challenge, because we are called to imitate it; to make our ways of dealing with one another more like God's way of dealing with us. Only when God touches our hearts and warms them will we in turn be generous like him.

The invitation before us today is to turn to God, take the leap of faith and strive to not be a part of this earthly realm but to be part of the spiritual realm. Let's seek God's ways and God's thoughts which are much greater than our ways and our thoughts. May we enjoy and imitate the generosity of God!




STEWARDSHIP WEEKEND: MINISTRY FAIR



Vicariate Council

Under the leadership of Bishop Mark Brennan, a Diocesan Pastoral Council was reinstituted in 2019-2020 and has been meeting since February 2021. **The Diocesan Pastoral Council provides the laity of the Diocese with an opportunity to assist Bishop Brennan in developing pastoral priorities, initiatives, and plans to forward the mission of Christ within the Diocese in light of its existing social, economic, demographic, and cultural circumstances and resources.**

It remains Bishop Brennan's wish for significant lay representation on the Diocesan Pastoral Council to be elected by the laity and not appointed by the Pastor/Administrator. In the Fall of 2020, all parishes were asked to hold an election process in order to elect two parishioners who would serve on the Vicariate Council; from this Vicariate Council, three members from each Vicariate were elected to serve on the Diocesan Pastoral Council. Since the Diocesan Pastoral Council was starting anew, staggered terms (of one, two and three years) were assigned to the first members of the Diocesan Pastoral Council.

Thus, we are now at the point where we need to form new Vicariate Councils who will then elect new representation to the Diocesan Pastoral Council as the staggered terms for those members come to an end. Parishioners who had served on the Vicariate Councils may be re-elected to another term or new parishioners may be elected; the important element that Bishop Brennan wants to emphasize is that the process is to be an election by the parishioners and not an appointment by the pastor. Thus, the attached Election Process for Lay Representatives from Vicariates to the Diocesan Pastoral Council was designed to have parishioners elect two parishioners to be part of a Vicariate Council that can assist a Vicar Forane. A particular function of the Vicariate Council is to elect from its membership three lay persons who will represent the Vicariate as members of the Diocesan Pastoral Council.

Every parish/mission in a Vicariate is to elect two (2) parishioners to serve on the Vicariate Council using these guidelines:

- 1. The Parish Pastoral Council, in union with the Pastor, will oversee the parish/mission election.
- 2. Suitable candidates are to be determined. Since the candidates are potential members of the Diocesan Pastoral Council, they need to meet the criteria for Diocesan Pastoral Council membership. "No one except Christians of proven faith, good morals and outstanding prudence are to be appointed to the (diocesan) pastoral council." (Canon 512 §3) Christian is to be understood as a Catholic in this context.
- 3. Five or six candidates should be identified and with their permission be placed on a ballot.

This weekend and next weekend, there will be nomination forms available in the narthex of the church. Please complete a form with the names of prospective parishioner nominees and drop it in the box.

The Vicariate Council will then elect from its membership persons to serve on the Diocesan Pastoral Council.



SAINTS OF THE WEEK

September 26 - Sts. Cosmas and Damian, martyrs (d.287)

Sts. Cosmas and Damian responded to the Gospel call by giving medical treatment to allow ho came to them, without charge, selflessly giving their time and care to the poor. As vibrant witnesses to the Christian faith, they were arrested during the Diocletian persecutions and eventually beheaded. *Patronage*: twins; physicians; nurses; barbers

September 27 - St. Vincent de Paul, priest (1581-1660)

In collaboration with St. Louise Montfort de Marillac, St. Vincent de Paul founded the Daughters of Charity, a new community of sisters not bound by traditional vows or enclosure, devoted to the sick, orphaned, and imprisoned. *Patronage:* charities, hospitals

September 28 - St. Wenceslaus, martyr (903-935)

Most people are familiar with St. Wenceslaus due to the popular Christmas carol "Good King Wenceslaus." Although this ancient carol is not based on historical events, it illustrates the fame King Wenceslaus received because of his heroic life. As a Christian king in Bohemia, a primarily pagan country, he worked fervently to Christianize his people. His attempt to evangelize the Bohemians was not received well by some, including his brother who eventually murdered him. As he was dying, he prayed that God would forgive his brother. *Patronage*: Czech Republic; Slovenia

St. Lawrence Ruiz (1600-1637) and Companions, martyrs

Also on September 28, Saint Lawrence Ruiz, a married man with three children, fled to Japan from Manila to escape an unjust charge. Upon arrival he was greeted with hostility, due to a recent edict that banned Christianity. When he and fifteen other companions would not adhere to the state religion and trample of religious images associated with the Catholic faith, they were executed. Saint Lawrence and his companions join 231 other Catholics martyred in Japan between the sixteenth and seventeenth centuries.

September 29 - Sts. Michael, Gabriel, and Raphael, archangels

We celebrate on this day the feast of three archangels, Sts. Michael, Gabriel, and Raphael, the great heralds of salvation and defenders against the power of evil. St. Michael is guardian and protector of the Church, from its roots in Israel to the Church of today and beyond. In Hebrew, his name means "who is like God." St. Gabriel, whose name means "hero of God," announces that John the Baptist will be born to Elizabeth and Zechariah. He is entrusted with the most important task of revealing to Mary that she will bear the Son of God. Then, there is St. Raphael, whose name is Hebrew for "God has healed." He is named in Tobit 12 as the one standing in the presence of God, and in 1 Enoch (early Jewish writing) as the healer of the earth (10:7). *Patronage*: Michael - Security forces; sick; Gabriel - telecommunications; postal service; Raphael - travelers; blind

September 30 - St. Jerome, priest, doctor of the Church (347-420)

St. Jerome was the author of the Vulgate translation of the Bible and of many biblical commentaries. St. Jerome spent his most productive years in seclusion, offering pastoral guidance to noble women, writing, and living an ascetic life. *Patronage:* archivists; scripture scholars; librarians

WHY DO WE DO THAT?

Catholic Life Explained:

Receiving Communion

Question:

How should one properly receive Holy Communion?

Answer:

The General Instruction of the Roman Missal (GIRM) tells us: "When receiving Holy Communion, the communicant bows his or her head before the Sacrament as a gesture of reverence and receives the Body of the Lord from the minister. The consecrated host may be received either on the tongue or in the hand, at the discretion of each communicant. When Holy Communion is received under both kinds, the sign of reverence is also made before receiving the Precious Blood."

The GIRM also states that Holy Communion distributed under both species is a fuller sign of the Heavenly banquet (no. 281). "Holy Communion has a fuller form as a sign when it takes place under both kinds. For in this form, the sign of the Eucharistic banquet is more clearly evident and clearer expression is given to the divine will by which the new and eternal Covenant is ratified in the Blood of the Lord, as also the connection between the Eucharistic banquet and the eschatological banquet in the Kingdom of the Father." (Eucharisticum Mysterium, no. 32)

No one is required to receive under both species, but the Church does encourage it. If one only partakes in the Host or only in the Precious Blood, they must remember they are receiving the fullness of Christ – Body, Soul, and Divinity. Thus, it is the choice of the communicant, not of the minister, to receive from the chalice. (Norms, no 46)

For the reception of the Precious Blood, the GIRM, no. 286 states: "Each communicant, after receiving the Body of Christ, moves to the minister of the chalice and stands facing him. The minister says, "The Blood of Christ", the communicant replies, "Amen", and the minister hands over the chalice, which the communicant raises to his or her mouth. Each communicant drinks a little from the chalice, hands it back to the minister, and then withdraws."
