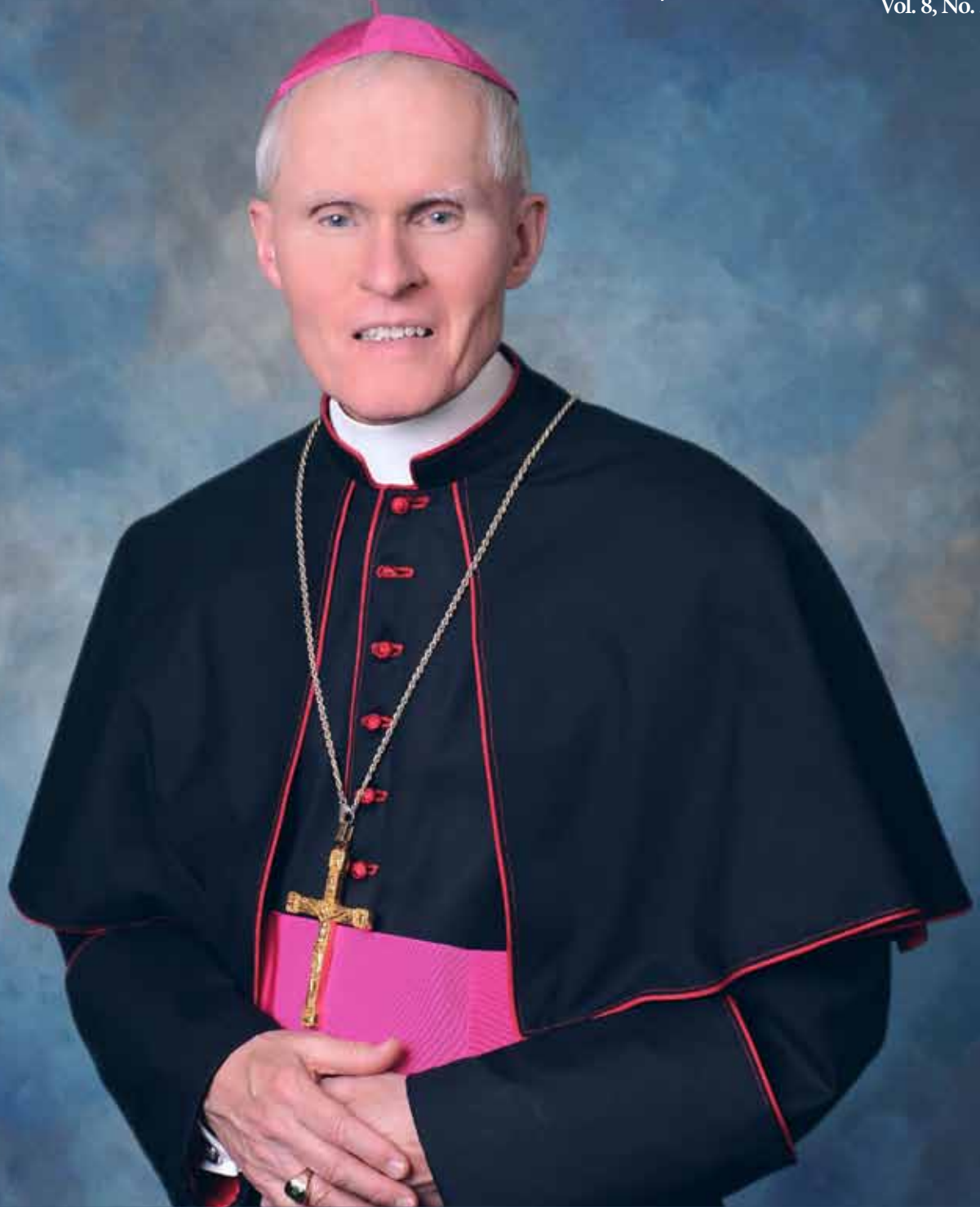

Twentieth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Jeremiah 38:4-6, 8-10 • Ps 40:2, 3, 4, 18

Hebrews 12:1-4 • Luke 12:49-53

Today's readings set a high bar for us, reminding us that a Catholic way of life can oftentimes be a challenging way of life.

In the second reading, from the Letter to the Hebrews, we are told to live as Christ lived. And how did Christ live? "For the sake of the joy that lay before Him He endured the cross." If we are tempted to complain about the sufferings we must endure in living as Christ's disciples, we are told, "In your struggle against sin you have not yet resisted to the point of shedding blood." In other words, "If you're not bleeding, what are you complaining about?" That is quite a high bar!

The Gospel reading from Luke continues this challenging theme. Our Lord tells His disciples "I have come to set the earth on fire, and how I wish it were already blazing." A couple of verses later Jesus adds, "Do you think that I have come to establish peace on the earth? No, I tell you, but rather division."

Jesus's life on this earth and the message He brought were not meant to simply make us feel good. In fact, His words can make us downright uncomfortable at times. That's because His Good News (and it is indeed good news!) is meant to change us, to challenge us at times, and indeed to make us saints.

The way of life in which we are called to live sets a high bar indeed. But deeply embraced, this way of life focused on God and others will make us the saints we are called to be.

This week, we will witness a milestone in our Diocesan Church as we welcome the Ninth Bishop of Wheeling-Charleston, Bishop Mark E. Brennan. Please keep Bishop Brennan in your prayers as he prepares to take on the most important task of shepherding this great diocese. May Bishop Brennan have the wisdom and support he will need to bring about true healing and hope. 🌱

Mass for the Conversion of Lost Souls

Everyone is invited to attend a Mass for the Conversion of Lost Souls at the Cathedral of Saint Joseph on **Tuesday, August 27, the Memorial of Saint Monica, at 6:00 p.m.** This fourth-century saint was a Christian, but her husband was a pagan. Monica's virtues and prayers, however, converted him, and he was baptized a year before his death. When her son, Augustine, went astray in faith and morals, Monica's tears and prayers for her son were incessant. She followed him where he went to teach, and there continued to storm heaven with prayers for her son. Finally, she had the joy of witnessing Augustine being baptized.

In addition to being one of the patron saints of mothers, Monica is most often invoked for the conversion of children who have left the Church. The Cathedral will celebrate this Mass on her feast day to pray in a special way for all those who have wandered from the faith. During the Mass, everyone will have an opportunity to write down the names of their loved ones and entrust them to the powerful intercession of Saint Monica.

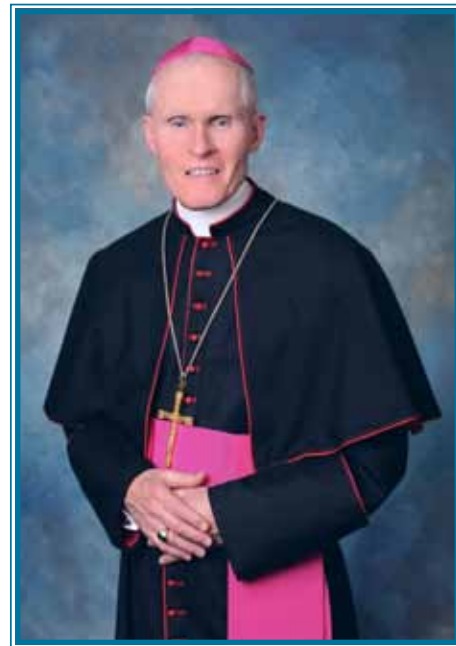

Welcome Bishop Brennan!

On July 23, 2019, the Holy Father Pope Francis appointed the **Most Reverend Mark Edward Brennan**, currently an Auxiliary Bishop for the Archdiocese of Baltimore, as the ninth bishop of the Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston.

Bishop Brennan, 72, was ordained a priest of the Archdiocese of Washington on May 15, 1976 by the then-Archbishop William W. Baum.

A Boston native, Bishop Brennan is the son of the late Edward Charles Brennan and Regina Claire Lonsway. He attended public schools in Massachusetts and Maryland before entering St. Anthony High School in Washington, D.C. Bishop Brennan graduated from Brown University in 1969 with a degree in history, and then entered Christ the King Seminary in Alleghany, New York for a year of philosophy before attending the Pontifical North American College in Rome for his theological studies. A parish priest for nearly his entire career, Bishop Brennan was assigned to Our Lady of Mercy Parish in Potomac, MD, from 1976-81; St. Pius X Parish in Bowie, MD, from 1981-85; St. Bartholomew Parish in Bethesda, MD, from 1986-88; St. Thomas Apostle Parish in Washington, D.C., from 1998-2003; St. Martin of Tours Parish in Gaithersburg, MD from 2003-16. Bishop Brennan attended Spanish Language courses and Hispanic cultural studies in the Dominican Republic and in Colombia from 1985-86. From 1988 to 1998, Bishop Brennan was the Director of Priestly Vocations in the Archdiocese of Washington. He was appointed Auxiliary Bishop for the Archdiocese of Baltimore on December 5, 2016, and ordained on January 19, 2017.



“I am deeply honored to be appointed the new bishop of the Wheeling-Charleston Diocese and am grateful to the Holy Father, Pope Francis, for his confidence in me to now lead the Catholic faithful here in West Virginia in a spirit of true Christian service,” said Bishop Brennan. “As my parents both retired to this great State a number of years ago, I am no stranger and, in fact, a great admirer of the beauty of its landscape and people. It will be my first priority to meet and get to know the good people across this diocese who are working each and every day to make lives better, to lift those who are suffering and in need of comfort, support and hope, and through their determined actions, living the Gospel of Jesus Christ. Even as we work toward bringing about true healing and renewal here in this local Church — work begun so well by Archbishop William Lori — I am full of hope and confidence for what we can accomplish together. There is immense need which is matched by immense desire and determination to reinvigorate the Church here in West Virginia and across our nation. As your brother and servant, I look forward to soon being back with you and to the joy of living and working among you.”

The Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston, which includes nearly 75,000 Catholics, 95 parishes and 34 smaller missions and chapels, encompasses the entire state of West Virginia. Currently, there are approximately 250 diocesan and religious priests, women religious and religious brothers, in addition to 25 primary and secondary Catholic schools, serving roughly 7000 students. The Diocese also has one Catholic hospital (Wheeling Hospital) and one Catholic higher education institution (Wheeling University).

The formal installation of Bishop Brennan will take place on Thursday, August 22 at 2:00 p.m. in the Cathedral of Saint Joseph in Wheeling. 🇺🇸



Bishop Brennan's Coat of Arms

Each bishop has a coat of arms composed of a shield, symbols, motto, scroll and external ornaments.

Bishop Mark E. Brennan's personal coat of arms features a shield made up of four sections, divided by a cross of the faith. A Latin cross in the upper left quadrant signifies that whatever trials we have in life, there is always another cross that each of us will be asked to carry. Praying hands in the upper right quadrant indicate that all of our lives should be directed to and with prayer.

The lower left features a lion's head, to honor Bishop Brennan's baptismal patron, St. Mark. The lower right includes two small crowns, known as diadems, to honor the bishop's parents, Edward (named for St. Edward the Confessor, King of England) and Regina (which is Latin for 'queen'). The monogrammed escutcheon (small shield) in the center honors the Blessed Virgin Mary, expressing the bishop's firm belief that no one will be successful in their religious life without Mary's help.

Bishop Brennan chose "*Docete Omnes Gentes*," a Latin phrase reflecting Christ's admonition to "teach all nations."

The Installation Mass on August 22

Bishop Mark E. Brennan will be installed as the Ninth Bishop of the Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston on Thursday, August 22, 2019, the Memorial of the Queenship of Mary, at 2:00 p.m. in the Cathedral of Saint Joseph. The installation of Bishop Brennan will be a milestone in the life of the diocese and marks a hopeful new chapter for the faithful, the priests, deacons, and religious of the diocese.

On the eve of the installation, Archbishop William E. Lori of Baltimore and apostolic administrator of Wheeling-Charleston will preside over Solemn Vespers at the Cathedral at 6:00 p.m. for which Bishop Brennan will be preaching.

The next day, August 22, will be the Episcopal Installation Mass. At the start of the Installation Mass, Bishop Brennan will be welcomed by the rector of the Cathedral and handed a crucifix to kiss. He will then be presented with holy water to sprinkle himself and the gathered faithful.

The Apostolic Mandate from Pope Francis appointing Bishop Brennan as bishop of Wheeling-Charleston will then be read by Msgr. Walter Erbi, chargé d'affaires of the Vatican Nunciature in Washington. The mandate will then be shown to the diocese's College of Consultors, the chancellor, and then to the people.

Once Bishop Brennan accepts the mandate, Archbishop Lori and Msgr. Erbi will lead him to the cathedra (or bishop's chair), where he will be seated as Wheeling-Charleston's ninth bishop.

Representatives of varying groups and individuals of the diocese will then greet the new bishop and welcome him to the diocese.

Once Bishop Brennan is seated at the cathedra, he becomes the celebrant of the Mass, which will include parts in Spanish, a language in which he is fluent. Bishop Brennan was responsible for ministry and outreach to the Hispanic community during his time as auxiliary bishop of the Archdiocese of Baltimore.

A capacity crowd is expected for the Installation Mass. Representatives from each Catholic parish, school and institution in West Virginia will join more than 200 priests, bishops and cardinals in celebrating the installation Mass. While all are certainly invited and encouraged to attend the Installation Mass, the Cathedral can only hold a certain number of attendees. There will be overflow seating for everyone at WesBanco Arena in Wheeling, where the Mass will be broadcast live.

Those who are unable to attend the Episcopal Installation Mass will be able to view the Mass live via the internet. The Mass will be live streamed on the diocese's website at dwc.org. Through the sponsorship of the Welty Home and Good Shepherd Nursing Home in Wheeling, the Mass will also be televised live on WTRFDT2/MYOV in the Wheeling area.

EWTN will air the installation Mass nationally at 3 p.m. that day. Catholic Television Network will also air the Mass at a time yet to be determined. In addition, the Mass will broadcast live on the radio on WKKX 1600 AM and 98.1 FM.

The Cathedral - The Bishop's Church

Historically, a cathedral has always been the church of the diocesan bishop. The term itself derives from the Latin word *cathedra*, which refers to the bishop's throne—and that throne is located in the cathedral church. Therefore, when Bishop Brennan is installed on August 22, he will not only become the bishop of the Diocese, but also the Pastor of the Cathedral of Saint Joseph. As the Council Fathers put it in *Sacrosanctum Concilium*, Vatican II's Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy, "The bishop is to be considered as the high priest of his flock, from whom the life in Christ of his faithful is in some way derived and dependent. Therefore all should hold in great esteem the liturgical life of the diocese centered around the bishop, especially in his cathedral church." (SC 41)

The cathedra is located in the upper sanctuary of the Cathedral and is carved in red oak with columns resting on the bodies of lions. The columns feature bas-relief symbols of Christ's passion and the teaching role of the bishop. Above the chair are delicately carved panels with symbols of the four evangelists and the biblical motto: "The Lord is my rock, my fortress and my savior." Also carved directly above the chair are the symbols of Saint Peter (keys) and Saint Paul (a sword).

This Week with the Saints

August 19 - Saint John Eudes (1601-1680), a successful preacher in France, cared for plague victims on both a physical and spiritual level. In light of the Protestant Reformation, he felt that the academic and spiritual training of priests needed to be strengthened; therefore, he established a society of diocesan priests: the Congregation of Jesus and Mary, commonly called the Eudists. Their sole purpose was directed toward the foundation of new seminaries where future priests would be equipped with the necessary tools to respond pastorally to the turbulent times. He eventually established a religious community of women, the Congregation of Our Lady of Charity of the Refuge, dedicated to the rehabilitation of prostitutes.



August 20 - Saint Bernard (1090-1153) joined the Cistercian Abbey at Citeaux, France, known for its strict and austere way of life. Within a short time he was noticed for his leadership; hence, he was appointed abbot of a new monastery at Clairvaux. His monastic vision at Clairvaux led to the foundation of several monasteries throughout France, Britain and Ireland. In solitude he wrote numerous theological and spiritual classics, including his treatise *On Loving God*, eighty-six sermons on the Song of Songs, and major work *On Consideration*, a reflection on papal devotion to Mary, earning him the titles "Our Lady's faithful chaplain" and "Mary's harper." Bernard was a prolific writer and had a great influence on the Church.

August 21 - Saint Pius X (1835-1914) was born Giuseppe Sarto in Riese, Italy. He grew up poor but was able to attend the seminary on a scholarship. As pope he was a reformer but at the same time was conservative in matters of theology. He published the first *Code of Canon Law*, which gathered the laws of the Church into one volume. His early pastoral experience influenced him to encourage frequent reception of Communion, his lasting legacy. He reformed the liturgy, especially the breviary (Liturgy of the Hours), and encouraged the use of Gregorian chant. Pius X lowered the "age of reason" from twelve to seven, making it possible for younger children to receive the Eucharist. It is said that the onset of World War I caused him so much distress that he died in 1914, as the war began. *Patronage*: first communicants; pilgrims who are ill



August 23 - During Saint Rose of Lima's (1586-1617) brief life, people noticed her physical beauty, declaring her *coma una rosa* ("like a rose"), but the beauty of her soul far surpassed her physical appearance. St. Rose longed to live solely for God so she renounced the institution of marriage by claiming Christ as her spouse. Basing her life upon St. Catherine of Siena, she lived a penitential life, setting up an infirmary in the family home to care for impoverished children and the sick. She gained popularity due to her selfless service to the needy. She is the first canonized saint of the Americas. *Patronage*: South and Central America; Philippines; West Indies; florists; gardeners

August 24 - There is little reference in the Gospel to Saint Bartholomew (first century), other than the fact that he was one of the original Twelve Apostles. He is also mentioned in the Acts of the Apostles as one of the disciples waiting for the descent of the Holy Spirit. According to a second-century Alexandrian teacher Pantaeus, an early Christian community in India claims Saint Bartholomew as its founder. Tradition states that he preached throughout Persia, Mesopotamia, Lycaonia, and Phrygia. It is believed that he was martyred by being flayed alive at Albanopolis, on the west coast of the Caspian Sea. *Patronage*: tanners; butchers

Assumption feast invites people to look to heaven with hope, pope says

VATICAN CITY (CNS) -- Mary's assumption into heaven calls people to put aside all those insignificant, mundane and petty concerns competing for their attention and instead be drawn to God and his greatness, Pope Francis said.

After reciting the Angelus prayer on the feast of the Assumption Aug. 15, Pope Francis also blessed thousands of rosaries that will be given to Catholics in Syria "as a sign of my closeness, especially for families who have lost someone because of the war."

"Prayers made with faith are powerful. Let us keep praying for peace in the Middle East and the whole world," said the pope, who explained that Aid to the Church in Need spearheaded the initiative to send some 6,000 rosaries to Catholic communities in Syria.

He also expressed his concern and prayers for those affected by monsoons in South Asia.

A week of heavy rains triggered deadly landslides and flooding in India, where, according to government officials, nearly 300 people died and more than 1.2 million people were forced from their homes. Officials in Myanmar reported more than 50 people have died there.

"May the Lord give strength to those (affected) and those who help them," the pope said.

With the assumption of Mary, body and soul, into heaven, she is "like a mother who waits for her children to come back home." Knowing that she

is there with God in heaven "gives us comfort and hope during our pilgrimage" on earth, he said.

The feast of the Assumption of Mary is an invitation to everyone, "especially for those who are afflicted by doubt and sadness, and live gazing downward," he said.

"Let us look on high," he said, where Mary awaits. "She loves us, she smiles at us and she comes to our aid with haste."

Just as every mother wants what is best for her children, "she tells us, 'You are precious in God's eyes; you were not made for measly worldly gratifications, but for the great joys of heaven,'" the pope said.

In life, it is important to seek what is truly great, "otherwise we get lost" chasing after so many trivial things, he said.

"Mary shows us that if we want our life to be happy, God goes first because only he is great," he said.

"Instead, how often we live chasing after things that don't matter: prejudices, grudges, rivalries, jealousies, illusions, superfluous material goods. How much pettiness in life!"

But today, "Mary invites us to lift our gaze up to the great things that the Lord has done for her" and reminds people that the Lord also does great things in them.

"Let us be attracted by true beauty, let us not be swallowed up by the petty things of life, but let us choose the greatness of heaven," he said. ☪
