who has spoken through the prophets.





NINETEENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

In the Gospel today, Our Lord sent His disciples to row across the lake, knowing that they would meet strong, gale-force headwinds and be in danger. He did this because He wanted to strengthen their faith and trust in Himself. He intended to come to them at the right moment, working two miracles — walking on the water and calming the storm. This He did and the result was as He had intended — their faith in Him was strengthened, they declared He was the Messiah, the Chosen of God. Peter, already the recognized leader, and always the most daring among them, showed himself ready to risk drowning in order to prove his trust and confidence in Christ. While he trusted in Christ, all went well, but when his faith weakened he would have been lost were it not for the outstretched helping hand of his master. This was also a very necessary lesson in the education of Peter and his companions.

For us, too, there is a necessary lesson in this incident. It is that we must continue to trust in Christ and his loving Father, even when God seems to have deserted us. Most of the troubles and trials of our lives are caused by the injustice and lack of charity. The remainder can be attributed to our own defects and sins or to some weakness in our mental and bodily make-up. But God foresees all these misfortunes, and can prevent them. Instead he lets them take their course, because they can and should be the means of educating us in our knowledge of life's true meaning and they should draw us closer to him.

Christ foresaw the storm and the grave risk His Apostles would run when He sent them off across the lake. But that trial and the grave danger they ran was for their own good, because they learned to realize that He was from God and they could always trust Him. Our trials and our earthly ailments are also foreseen by God and permitted by him (even if inflicted on us by a sinful fellowman) so that they will draw us closer to Him and help us on the road to heaven.

Guidelines for Public Celebration of the Mass

We kindly ask that you please review and adhere to these guidelines while attending Mass in the Cathedral:

- ❖ The faithful are required to bring their own facemasks and to wear them during Mass.
- ❖ Social distancing is necessary at Mass while seated in the pew and during the Communion procession. Families living in the same household may sit together. We are only able to accommodate 92 people per Mass at the Cathedral. Seating will be on a first come first seated basis. If additional seating is necessary, the overflow crowd will be directed to The Great Hall of Central Catholic High School where the Mass will be live-streamed.
- ❖ Some common, though optional practices of the Mass, will be omitted such as the use of hymnals, holding of hands during the Our Father, the Sign of Peace, and the offering of the Precious Blood of Christ to the faithful.

Please keep in mind that Bishop Brennan has given the faithful of the Diocese the dispensation from the obligation to attend Mass. Therefore, sick persons and those more susceptible to infection – the elderly, those already in frail health – are urged to remain at home and participate in televised or online Masses. Anyone who fears being infected by attending Mass should stay home.

MASS FOR THE CONVERSION OF LOST SOULS

Thursday, August 27 at 6:00 p.m.

Join us at the Cathedral of Saint Joseph to celebrate the memorial of Saint Monica. This fourth-century saint was a Christian, but her husband was a pagan. Monica's virtues and prayers, however, converted him, and he was baptized a year before his death. When her son, Augustine, went astray in faith and morals, Monica's tears and prayers for her son were incessant. She followed him where he went to teach, and there continued to storm heaven with prayers for her son. Finally, she had the joy of witnessing Augustine being baptized.

In addition to being one of the patron saints of mothers, Monica is most often invoked for the conversion of children who have left the Church. The Cathedral will celebrate this Mass on her feast day to pray in a special way for all those who have wandered from the faith. During the Mass, everyone will have an opportunity to write down the names of their loved ones and entrust them to the powerful intercession of Saint Monica.

SAINT OF THE DAY

AUGUST 10 - SAINT LAWRENCE (d.258)

Lawrence, one of the seven deacons of the Roman Church, fell victim to the anti-Christian persecutions launched by the emperor Valerian. Although little is known about the events leading up to his death, legend claims that he was martyred by being roasted on a gridiron. According to tradition, his death brought an end to idolatry and led to the conversion of Rome. His life has been the subject of many artistic masterpieces, including the paintings of Fra Angelico. **PATRONAGE:** Rome; cooks



AUGUST 11 - SAINT CLARE OF ASSISI (1193/4-1253)

Inspired by the Lenten sermons of her close friend Saint Francis of Assisi, Clare of Assisi renounced her wealth to found the Poor Clares, or Minoreesses, a community of nuns devoted to a simple, austere life of prayer. She is the patron saint of television, due to a vision she had while lying sick in bed on Christmas Eve, in which she saw the crib and heard the singing just as if she were present in the church. In art, she is often depicted holding a monstrance because she protected Assisi from attackers with the Blessed Sacrament. Her sister Saint Agnes eventually joined the Poor Clares. **PATRONAGE:** Poor Clares; television; good weather

AUGUST 12 - SAINT JANE FRANCES DE CHANTAL, RELIGIOUS (1572-1641)

Under the influence of her spiritual director Saint Francis de Sales, Jane Frances de Chantal, a wealthy widow and mother from France, founded the Congregation of the Visitation of the Virgin Mary. Unusual in its time, this new community of enclosed nuns welcomed individuals with frailties due to health and age, and who were often refused admittance by other cloistered orders. She was no stranger to pain, having witnessed the death of her husband and some of her children, but she transformed her experiences of sorrow into moments of transformation and service to the sick. **PATRONAGE:** loss of parents; widows



AUGUST 13 - SAINT PONTIAN, POPE AND SAINT HIPPOLYTUS, PRIEST, MARTYRS

Pontian was a victim of the persecution of Alexander Severus, who directed his attention particularly against the leaders of the Church. Pontian governed the Church as pope from 230 to 235. He was exiled to the mines of Sardinia and died in exile. Hippolytus, a priest and a person of some importance in the Church in Rome at the beginning of the third century, provoked a schism which lasted for some years. He was exiled to Sardinia with Saint Pontian, where he was reconciled with the Church and died for the faith in 235.

AUGUST 14 - SAINT MAXIMILIAN KOLBE, PRIEST AND MARTYR (1894-1941)

Polish born Maximilian Kolbe was a Franciscan friar whose devotion to Mary continues to affect the Church today. He established the Militia of the Immaculata, a Marian apostolate that uses prayer as its main weapon in spiritual battles. He was eventually arrested and sent to Auschwitz. He volunteered to die in place of another prisoner and was put in the starvation bunker. Still alive two weeks later, Maximilian was injected with a lethal dose of carbolic acid, dying with a radiant, calm look upon his face.

PATRONAGE: those suffering from drug addiction; prisoners

ASSUMPTION OF THE BLESSED VIRGIN MARY

Saturday, August 15, 2020

On August 15 we celebrate the Solemnity of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary, which commemorates the dogma of faith that “the Immaculate Mother of God, the ever Virgin Mary, having completed the course of her earthly life, was assumed body and soul into heavenly glory,” as pronounced by Pope Pius XII (*Munificentissimus Deus*, 44).

The Assumption is the oldest feast day of Our Lady, but we don't know how it first came to be celebrated.

Its origin is lost in those days when Jerusalem was restored as a sacred city, at the time of the Roman Emperor Constantine (c. 285-337). For 200 years, every memory of Jesus was obliterated from the city, and the sites made holy by His life, death and Resurrection became pagan temples.

After the building of the Church of the Holy Sepulchre in 336, the sacred sites began to be restored and memories of the life of Our Lord began to be celebrated by the people of Jerusalem. One of the memories about his mother centered around the “Tomb of Mary,” close to Mount Zion, where the early Christian community had lived. On the hill itself was the “Place of Dormition,” the spot of Mary's “falling asleep,” where she had died. The “Tomb of Mary” was where she was buried. At this time, the “Memory of Mary” was being celebrated. Later it was to become our feast of the Assumption. For a time, the “Memory of Mary” was marked only in Palestine, but then it was extended by the emperor to all the churches of the East. In the seventh century, it began to be celebrated in Rome under the title of the “Falling Asleep” (“Dormitio”) of the Mother of God.

Soon the name was changed to the “Assumption of Mary,” since there was more to the feast than her dying. It also proclaimed that she had been taken up, body and soul, into heaven.

Because the Solemnity of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary falls on a Saturday this year, the obligation to attend Mass is lifted. The faithful, however, are encouraged to attend Mass on the August 15 feast day.
