

Prayer Initiative for New Bishop begins this weekend

Archbishop William E. Lori has invited us to join him in intentional prayer for the selection of our next bishop. In that spirit, the Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston will begin “Praying in Hope” — a “prayer initiative” for the selection of a new bishop on the first weekend in February.

The “Mass for the Election of a Bishop” from the *Masses and Prayers for Various Needs and Occasions* (Roman Missal) will be celebrated during all of the weekend Masses on the Fourth Sunday in Ordinary Time, February 2 and 3.

There are many opportunities to continue this prayer initiative at home. A novena booklet is available for you to take home after the weekend Masses. In addition, the faithful are encouraged to pray the rosary at home with the special intention of praying for the Election of a New Bishop in West Virginia. The initiative will also include prayer cards, featuring a prayer composed by Archbishop Lori and a cover photo of the stained glass window of Christ, the Good Shepherd, at Good Shepherd Nursing Home in Wheeling.

Throughout this edition of *The Cathedral Courier*, you will find resources for incorporating “Praying in Hope” at home and with your families. Please join Archbishop Lori in praying for the appointment of a holy and wise pastor as our next bishop.


Pope St. John Paul II in 1992 declared February 11 as World Day of the Sick, to coincide with the feast of Our Lady of Lourdes. Pope Francis calls the World Day of the Sick an “opportunity to reflect in particular on the needs of the sick and, more generally, of all those who suffer. It is also an occasion for those who generously assist the sick, beginning with family members, health workers and volunteers.”

On **Monday, February 11 at 6:00 p.m.**, the Cathedral of St. Joseph will celebrate a Mass with the communal Anointing of the Sick. The Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick is given to those who suffer from any kind of physical, emotional, or spiritual illness, those preparing to undergo surgery, or those experiencing fatigue associated with advanced years. Through anointing, the grace of the Holy Spirit comforts and strengthens the soul of the person.

Following the Mass, those present are invited to join in a candlelight procession to a statue of Our Lady of Lourdes in the Cathedral courtyard. The celebration will conclude with the praying of the Litany of the Blessed Virgin Mary and the singing of the *Salve Regina*.

Family Resource for The Appointment of the New Bishop

Why do we have bishops in the Catholic Church?


While Jesus was engaged in His public ministry He instituted a specific structure for the Church. From all of His disciples Jesus called forth twelve men for a specialized leadership role. Their particular calling was to be the chosen witnesses of Jesus' Resurrection from the dead and to whom He gave teaching authority and priestly power on His behalf. Though Jesus' public ministry ended with His ascension into heaven, the mission and ministry of Jesus continues through the work of the Catholic Church. The Church in the world is set up in such a way that the fullness of the Good News of Jesus and the Sacraments He instituted continues until Christ returns. The word hierarchy literally means "holy origin."

We believe the bishops are modern-day apostles. The word apostle means "one who is sent." The great responsibility that Jesus gave to the apostles was to baptize people and to teach everything He commanded them (Matthew 23: 18-20). To go, baptize, preach, and teach. As Catholics we profess the Church is apostolic, which means every bishop of the Catholic Church is a successor of one of the twelve apostles. Each bishop can trace his lineage back to one of the apostles. Thousands of years later we continue the tradition of Jesus' institution of the Church.

How is a man chosen to be a bishop?

The process has developed over the centuries but remains essentially the same from the foundation laid down by St. Peter as the first pope. (Acts 2: 15-26.) St. Peter sees in the broken number of apostles a need to restore the college of apostles number to 12, the symbolic number of completion. St. Peter even sets requirements for who is eligible to be nominated as Judas' replacement. Matthias and Barsabbas were nominated. The Church prayed. The lot went to Matthias. It was not until the apostles' number was restored did the full power of the Holy Spirit get released for the apostles to go out and bring the nations to Jesus Christ.

Throughout the centuries the Holy Spirit has raised up certain men to serve as bishops to teach, to sanctify and to govern a local Church or diocese. It is the bishop's responsibility to be the primary, or the ordinary/first, preacher of the Gospel and teacher of Catholic faith. The diocesan bishop is the one who ensures the faithful receive the sacraments validly and that the sacraments are celebrated faithfully. The bishop is the only one who can validly ordain men to the diaconate and priesthood. Lastly, it is the bishop's task to oversee or govern a diocese's operations. The bishop ideally is like a loving father who cares for his family.



What should we hope for in a bishop?

The same thing we hope for ourselves and our families- holiness. In addition the Church, under the guidance of the Holy Spirit, prays and asks God that a bishop be a pastor after [Jesus] own heart, a man of virtue, and a faithful teacher of the Catholic faith. You see, the most important quality of a bishop is to be a disciple of Jesus Christ.

Practically speaking, a list is compiled of men who seem to fit the first requirement - like Matthias and Barsabbas- and then submitted to Rome. The Pope ultimately makes the decision after recommendations and consultations. After a time of prayer, the Holy Father makes the official appointment and sends a delegate or letter inviting the nominated man to accept. What can our family do to help choose the next bishop for West Virginia?

The best thing your family can do is pray and talk about your Catholic faith as a family. Think about it: your family is a mini-version of the Church, called the *domestic church*. You form a vital part of the one, holy, catholic and apostolic Church family throughout the world who gathers in prayer, worship, belief, and service. For example, your family meals are reflective of the Eucharistic banquet we share at every Mass. Your particular family's prayer is powerful and influences the whole world. Even for the appointment of a bishop! Below are some resources to help your family in her mission.

Rely On the Extended Church Family:

The Intercession of the Saints

God has given your family and all her members a special place in the Universal Church with a specific mission that only your family can complete.

The saints have already fulfilled their plan and purpose on earth and have reached the goal of eternal life with Jesus in heaven.

The saints lived virtuously amidst trial and tribulation. By learning from their example and relying on their intercession we gain assistance in becoming who God wants us to be- Saints!

Below are two litanies (long repetitive prayers invoking a particular aspect or title of Jesus, Mary or other saint).

The first is the Litany of the Blessed Virgin Mary. Mary holds the exalted place of the Mother of God. She said “Yes” to God and His plan of saving us from sin and death and thus giving to the world the Incarnate Son of God. Mary is full of grace and is obedient to God. Because of who she is and what she does we call her the Queen of Saints. Her intercession at Jesus’ side is powerful.

St. Joseph also holds an honored place in the communion of saints. Joseph was entrusted with protecting and caring for both Jesus and Mary, among other things. He is a model for us because of his obedience to God. St. Joseph is also the patron of our Diocese.

Here are a few tips on using the following litanies as you ask the Holy Spirit to guide the appointment of our next bishop.

- ▶ Identify the different virtues that family members naturally have and celebrate them!
- ▶ Pick a virtue from a litany and ask Jesus to help you cultivate the habit of living it out today. Talk about successes or failures before bedtime.
- ▶ Read the beginning of the Gospels. See if you can name the different virtues of Mary and Joseph.
- ▶ Pick a virtue and ask that our next bishop be a man who strives to live the virtue.
- ▶ Pray for a bishop devoted to Jesus Christ and the example of Mary and Joseph.

Saint Joseph, Patron of the Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston

When the Diocese was created in 1850, St. James Parish was Wheeling's only Catholic Church and designated as the diocesan Cathedral. In 1872 Bishop Whelan wrote the Holy Father requesting permission to change the Cathedral's patron from St. James to St. Joseph, who had been designated patron of the Universal Church in 1870. (*Faith in the Mountains: A History of the Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston*. 2000)

While devotion to and understanding of St. Joseph has unfolded over time, "Scripture points him out to us as the "father" of Jesus (Lk 2:27-48), prepared to carry out the divine plan, even when it eluded human understanding. To him, "son of David" (Mt 1:20; Lk 1:27), God entrusted the safekeeping of the Eternal Word, made man by the power of the Holy Spirit in the womb of the Virgin Mary. St Joseph is described in the Gospel as a "just man" (Mt 1:19), and for all believers he is a model of life in faith" (Pope St. John Paul II, General Audience, 19 March 2003).

The Solemnity of St. Joseph is celebrated on March 19th.

- Show up five minutes earlier for Sunday Mass.
- Pray a family rosary.
- Read a theological work on Christ and the Church.

- Celebrate the diversity of gifts among family members.
- How does that diversity unify your family?
- Share the importance of your Catholic faith at meal times.
- Do a day of service for the poor at Catholic Charities.
- Talk about why the different members of your family have different responsibilities.
- Start a solidarity project. Ex. A mini family fundraiser for a local charity.
- Have your parish priest over for dinner.
- Thank your parish priest for answering his vocation.
- Host a prayer group at your house.
- Make a pilgrimage or virtual pilgrimage to the Cathedral of St. Joseph or Co-Cathedral of the Sacred Heart.

This Week with the Saints

February 3 - While serving as Bishop of Sebaste, in Armenia, **Saint Blaise** († 316) was a visible witness of the Gospel, which eventually led to his martyrdom during the persecutions of Diocletian. His feast day is commemorated with a blessing of throats because legend says that he cured a young boy choking on a fish bone. *Patronage:* against throat diseases



February 5 - Saint Agatha was born in Sicily, probably around the year 231, and is one of the women mentioned by name in Eucharistic Prayer I. According to legend, she was the daughter of a prominent family and was very beautiful. The Roman senator Quintianus wished to marry her, but when Agatha spurned him, he had her put in a brothel. In spite of this, Agatha held to her Christian faith. Quintianus then had her tortured by having her breasts cut off. She eventually died in prison in 253. St. Agatha is the patron of the city of her martyrdom, Catania, and is invoked against fire, earthquakes, and eruptions of Mount Etna. In recent years, because of her torture she is considered the patron saint of breast cancer patients.



February 6 - Saint Paul Miki (1562-1597), a Jesuit priest, was one of the twenty-six martyrs of Japan. Feeling threatened by the growing influence of the Jesuits, the local governor had members of the Christian community arrested and thrown in jail. They were forced to walk 600 miles from Kyoto to Nagasaki as a deterrent to other Christians, but they sang the *Te Deum* as they went. At Nagasaki they were crucified. When Christian missionaries returned to Japan in the nineteenth century, they found that a secret Christian community had survived by transmitting their beliefs and prayers from generation to generation. Paul Miki and his companions are the proto-martyrs of the Far East.



February 8 - Saint Jerome Emiliani (1481-1537) was born into a wealthy family, and before being led to study for the priesthood he was a soldier in Venice. As a priest, Jerome was greatly devoted to helping the poor and the disadvantaged. He founded hospitals, orphanages (for which he was proclaimed Patron of Orphans by Pius XI), and an order of priests whose apostolate it was to care for the orphans. *Patronage:* orphans; abandoned children



Also on February 8, we celebrate **Saint Josephine Bakhita** (1868-1947), who was born in Sudan and at the age of nine was taken into slavery. Bought by an Italian diplomat, she was taken to Italy where she converted to Christianity at the age of 25. Three years later, after having been freed from slavery, she joined the Institute of the Canossian Daughters of Charity. She spent fifty years in that congregation and was a well known and sought-after speaker regarding the Catholic faith. Pope Saint John Paul II canonized this first Sudanese saint on October 1, 2000 as a witness to evangelical reconciliation and a model of freedom.
