



## Second Sunday in Ordinary Time

Isaiah 49:3, 5-6 • Ps 40:2, 4, 7-8, 8-9, 10  
1 Corinthians 1:1-3 • John 1:29-34

Today's readings provide clear and inspiring reminders of the most fundamental aspect of our identity — that of servants of our most high and holy God, His modern-day disciples.

John the Baptist recognized the holiness of Jesus and the response due to Him when he encountered Christ in person on the day they met at the Jordan River. His response, which we read in our Gospel passage from St. John was, "Behold, the Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world... He is the one of whom I said, 'A man is coming after me who ranks ahead of me because he existed before me.'"

What a powerful description of our Lord and the place He should rightfully have in each of our lives. He is truly our Savior, the only one who can free us from our sinfulness. We are utterly and completely dependent on His power, love and mercy. Therefore He truly does "rank ahead" of us; he deserves to be first, above all other priorities and plans in our lives. Let us examine our daily lives and encourage our children to do the same.

Does the way I spend my time reflect that God comes first? Do prayer and weekly Mass, regular confession and time with my family "rank ahead" of everything else on my calendar? Do I use my talents, skills and energy to serve my family, parish and community in thanksgiving and recognition that God's kingdom ranks ahead of any other goals or ambitions?

Challenging questions, to be sure. But questions worthy of our high calling as Christian disciples offered a glorious mission in service of our Lord and His kingdom. What will our response be? 🙏

## Day of Prayer for the Legal Protection of Unborn Children

On January 22, 1973, the United States Supreme Court handed down a decision known as *Roe versus Wade*, which made abortion legal throughout the United States, and struck down many states' laws restricting abortion. Since that decision, more than 60 million abortions have been performed in the United States. In all the dioceses of the United States, January 22 is observed as a day of penance for violations to the dignity of the human person committed through acts of abortion, and for the full restoration of the legal guarantee to the right to life. We pray not only for the innocent children who are not able to be born, but for all mothers and fathers who are considering abortion and those who have had abortions. In the *Pastoral Plan for Pro-Life Activities*, the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops stated that "Only with prayer - prayer that storms the heavens for justice and mercy, prayer that cleanses our hearts and souls - will the culture of death that surrounds us today be replaced with a culture of life." Please pray for a greater respect of human life - from natural conception to natural death.

## Mass on the World Day of the Sick

**Tuesday, February 11, 2020 at 6:00 p.m.**

Pope St. John Paul II in 1992 declared February 11 as World Day of the Sick, to coincide with the feast of Our Lady of Lourdes. Pope Francis calls the World Day of the Sick an “opportunity to reflect in particular on the needs of the sick and, more generally, of all those who suffer. It is also an occasion for those who generously assist the sick, beginning with family members, health workers and volunteers.”


On Tuesday, February 11 at 6:00 p.m., the Cathedral of St. Joseph in Wheeling, West Virginia will celebrate a Mass with the communal Anointing of the Sick. The Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick is given to those who suffer from any kind of physical, emotional, or spiritual illness, those preparing to undergo surgery, or those experiencing fatigue associated with advanced years. Through anointing, the grace of the Holy Spirit comforts and strengthens the soul of the person.

Following the Mass, those present are invited to join in a candlelight procession to the side altar of the Blessed Virgin Mary where the celebration will conclude with a Prayer to Our Lady of Lourdes and the singing of the Salve Regina.

For the convenience of those in need, the Cathedral is handicapped accessible with a ramp on both sides of the church (one on the 13th Street side and one on the courtyard side).

## Cold/Flu Season Reminder

During the cold and flu season, we ask that everyone be mindful of others when attending Mass. If you are sick and believe you are contagious, stay home. The obligation to attend Mass is not required if you are ill. If you do have cold or flu like symptoms, do not feel that you have to exchange the Sign of Peace with others. Simply wave or nod your head to your neighbors. If your parish has a custom of holding hands during the Lord’s Prayer, parishioners who are ill may fold their hands in a prayerful posture. While it is the norm in the Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston to receive the Eucharist under both sacred species, refrain from drinking from the chalice if you feel ill. You are still receiving the Body, Blood, Soul and Divinity of the Lord.

## God's word can never be 'enchained,' pope says at audience

VATICAN CITY (CNS) -- A true apostle is one who continues to be a courageous and joyful evangelizer even in the face of persecution and certain death, Pope Francis said.

By choosing to close the Acts of the Apostles not with St. Paul's martyrdom but with his continuing to preach the Gospel even while under house arrest, St. Luke wanted to show that the word of God cannot be "enchained," the pope said Jan. 15 during his weekly general audience.

"This house open to all hearts is the image of the church which -- although persecuted, misunderstood and chained -- never tires of welcoming with a motherly heart every man and woman to proclaim to them the love of the Father who made himself visible in Jesus," he said.

The pope concluded his series of talks on the Acts of the Apostles with a reflection on St. Paul's imprisonment in Rome.

St. Paul's treacherous journey and adventures to "the heart of the empire," he said, did not weaken

the Gospel he preached but instead strengthened it by "showing that the direction of events does not belong to men but to the Holy Spirit, who gives fruitfulness to the church's missionary action."

During his imprisonment, the pope continued, the apostle would meet with notable Jewish people in his efforts to show "the fulfillment of the promises made to the chosen people" through Christ's death and resurrection.

While not everyone was convinced by his preaching, St. Paul continued to welcome anyone "who wanted to receive the proclamation of the kingdom of God and to know Christ," which is a grace that all Christians should pray for, he said.

May the Lord "enable us, like Paul, to imbue our houses with the Gospel and to make them cenacles of fraternity, where we can welcome the living Christ, who comes to meet us in every person and in every age," Pope Francis said. 🙏

**John 1:29-34**

Did you ever look at a Where's Waldo book? The very detailed and colorful pictures make it hard to spot Waldo, even though his clothes look like they'd stand out anywhere. Those types of books actually develop skills in children to learn to zero in on what they are searching for even when there are many distractions.

In today's Gospel John is Baptizing by the river, calling on the people to repent when he recognizes Jesus. John calls out, "There is the Lamb of God who takes away the sins of the world." He then tells the story of

how he baptized Jesus and a dove came from heaven. John knew what to watch for because of his communication with God. Others, however, did not recognize the Messiah because He did not fit their preconceived ideas of a savior.

For us, each day is like a Where's Jesus? book. Sometimes we have ideas of what He should look like: a saint, a priest, a hero. But perhaps He looks like a young child who helps another who is sad. Perhaps Jesus is a neighbor who in need of a cup of tea or someone to bring in their mail or a coworker who



needs a listening ear. Open your heart to listen to where God is calling you. Where is Jesus in your day? With all the distraction of life He may be difficult to spot but, believe me, He is there on every page of your life. Just keep looking! 🍀

# This Week with the Saints

**January 17 - Saint Fabian** († 250) and **Saint Sebastian** († 288) have always been venerated together, and their names were coupled in the ancient martyrologies, as they are still in the Litany of Saints.



**Fabian**, a Roman, was as energetic as he was admired and respected. He was Pope from 236 to 250. He was able to accomplish a great deal during his long pontificate. He promoted the consolidation and development of the Church. He divided Rome into seven diaconates for the purpose of extending aid to the poor. The Church flourished under St. Fabian as a succession of emperors left the Christians to themselves. This peaceful time came to an abrupt end with the ascension of Emperor Decius. He was a cruel enemy and he decreed that all Christians were to deny Christ by openly worshipping pagan idols. The Church was to lose many followers, but more stood firm to suffer torture and even death. Certainly, one of the first was Pope Fabian. Arrested, he was thrown in prison and died at the hands of his brutal captors.

**Sebastian**, a native of Milan, was an officer in Diocletian's imperial guard. The oldest historical account of the saint is found in a commentary on the psalms by St. Ambrose; the passage reads: "Allow me to propose to you the example of the holy martyr Sebastian. By birth he was a Milanese. Perhaps the persecutor of Christians had left Milan, or had not yet arrived, or had become momentarily more tolerant. Sebastian believed that here there was no opportunity for combat, or that it had already passed. So he went to Rome, the scene of bitter opposition arising from the Christians' zeal for the faith. There he suffered, there he gained the crown." According to legend, Sebastian was pierced with arrows so that he would die a slow and painful death, but this attempt on his life was unsuccessful due to his athletic stamina. He eventually became well enough to confront the emperor regarding the way Christians were being treated. This led to his execution. *Patronage:* archers; athletes; soldiers; police associations



**January 21 - Saint Agnes** (c.292-305) is one of the women whose name is mentioned in Eucharistic Prayer I. She is thought to have been a member of Roman nobility, and was martyred at the age of twelve under Diocletian on January 21, 304, for refusing to marry a prefect's son. She is the patron saint of Christian virtue and is often represented with a martyr's palm and a lamb (a translation of her name in Latin). This gave rise to the tradition of blessing lambs by the Pope at the Vatican on this day. The wool from these lambs is then used to weave the pallia worn by archbishops and others of metropolitan rank. *Patronage:* Christian virtue; those confronted by political and social violence



**January 23 - Saint Vincent** († c.304) was from Saragossa in third-century Spain. He is also known as Vincent the deacon and servant under St. Valerius, bishop of Saragossa. He was martyred in 304 during the persecution by the emperor Diocletian. Just before he was killed on a gridiron or grill, he was offered his freedom if he would throw a copy of the Scriptures on the fire that was prepared for him, but he refused. After witnessing Vincent's faith and heroism, his executioner converted to Christianity. *Patronage:* wine-producers



Also on January 23, **Saint Marianne Cope** (1838-1918), who was born in West Germany. A year after her birth the Cope family emigrated to the United States of America to seek work and educational opportunities. From a young age, she felt the call to enter the religious life, which led to her decision to enter the Sisters of Saint Francis in Syracuse, New York. She had a deep affection for the suffering and the sick. While serving as superior general of her religious community, she accepted an invitation to care for the sick, especially those afflicted with leprosy, in Hawaii. Marianne joined the mission to Hawaii where she helped establish homes for leprosy patients and cared for St. Damien de Veuster of Molokai who contracted leprosy during his ministry to the sick. Following the death of St. Damien, Marianne continued his compassionate ministry of care for leprosy patients. Marianne lived the Franciscan call to serve the "crucified," the most vulnerable, in society. She was canonized by Pope Benedict XVI on October 21, 2012.

**January 24 - Saint Francis de Sales** (1567-1622), bishop of Geneva, contributed immensely to the development of spirituality through the publication of his book, *An Introduction to the Devout Life*. Living at a time when manuals on spirituality were written primarily for clerics and members of religious orders, St. Francis' book provided a practical path to holiness for people from all states of life. He challenged the prevailing belief that only a select few could obtain sanctity. Along with his accomplishments in the area of everyday, or lay, spirituality, he cofounded with St. Jane Frances de Chantal the Order of the Visitation of Holy Mary, a religious community of nuns that would move beyond traditional enclosure to a healthy blend of prayer and service to the poor. Together, Saints Francis and Jane, with their close friends Saints Vincent de Paul and Louise de Marillac, transformed the face of the Church in France. Saint Francis has been named a Doctor of the Church. *Patronage:* Catholic press, writers, journalists, deaf

**January 25** - On this day, we celebrate the Feast of the **Conversion of Saint Paul the Apostle**. Saul of Tarsus (c.4 - c.64) had a history of persecuting Christians. He was present at the martyrdom of Saint Stephen and held the cloaks of those who stoned him. While on the road to Damascus, where Saul was headed to suppress the Christian community, he was blinded by a bright light and heard the voice of Christ saying, "Saul, Saul, why do you persecute me?" (Acts of the Apostles 9:4). He took the name Paul and became the "Apostle to the Gentiles," traveling the known world with the message of the Gospel. Saint Paul's conversion is a witness to the mercy of God and the possibility of conversion.
