

## Third Sunday in Ordinary Time

Isaiah 8:23 - 9:3 • Ps 27:1, 4, 13-14  
 1 Corinthians 1:10-13, 17 • Matthew 4:12-23

Today's readings teach us that Our Lord has come to bring us light, liberty, and unity. In today's First Reading Isaiah speaks of the moment when Israel will be delivered from the prolonged darkness and oppression it has suffered as a result of its infidelity to God.

In today's Second Reading Paul shows that the Lord does not just liberate us. He also wants us united around him and working with him. Paul is chiding the Corinthians because they are claiming some special provenance based on whoever baptized them or whoever was the most eloquent preacher.

In today's Gospel Our Lord is revealed by Matthew to be that light of liberation and joy spoken of by Isaiah. The fulfillment of a prophecy is not always textbook; it doesn't happen to the letter. Everything Our Lord said, did, and lived during his earthly mission has something to say, and, in this case, settling in Capernaum shows that light of liberation arriving to a people with a pagan past, an allusion to the darkness and oppression caused by their past infidelities.

Our Lord also calls his first disciples today. His light draws others to him not only so that they can see the way, but so that they can someday light the way to Christ as well.

Saint John Paul II in many of his teachings had a favorite passage from the constitution on the Church in the Modern World of the Second Vatican Council, *Gaudium et Spes* (n. 22): "The truth is that only in the mystery of the incarnate Word does the mystery of man take on light. For Adam, the first man, was a figure of Him Who was to come, namely Christ the Lord. Christ, the final Adam, by the revelation of the mystery of the Father and His love, fully reveals man to man himself and makes his supreme calling clear. [...] Through Christ and in Christ, the riddles of sorrow and death grow meaningful. Apart from His Gospel, they overwhelm us."

Everyone at some point in their life feels overwhelmed, disoriented, and questioning the meaning of their life or how they're living it. The distress doesn't just focus on the moment you're trying to face; it makes you think of the road traveled and where you want to go from here. It's in that moment that Christ wants to be your light, if you let him. Let him light the way and give meaning to even the most apparently meaningless things in your life. 🕯️

## Mass on the World Day of the Sick

**Tuesday, February 11, 2020 at 6:00 p.m.**

Pope St. John Paul II in 1992 declared February 11 as World Day of the Sick, to coincide with the feast of Our Lady of Lourdes. Pope Francis calls the World Day of the Sick an “opportunity to reflect in particular on the needs of the sick and, more generally, of all those who suffer. It is also an occasion for those who generously assist the sick, beginning with family members, health workers and volunteers.”


On Tuesday, February 11 at 6:00 p.m., the Cathedral of St. Joseph in Wheeling, West Virginia will celebrate a Mass with the communal Anointing of the Sick. The Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick is given to those who suffer from any kind of physical, emotional, or spiritual illness, those preparing to undergo surgery, or those experiencing fatigue associated with advanced years. Through anointing, the grace of the Holy Spirit comforts and strengthens the soul of the person.

Following the Mass, those present are invited to join in a candlelight procession to the side altar of the Blessed Virgin Mary where the celebration will conclude with a Prayer to Our Lady of Lourdes and the singing of the Salve Regina.

For the convenience of those in need, the Cathedral is handicapped accessible with a ramp on both sides of the church (one on the 13th Street side and one on the courtyard side).

## Cold/Flu Season Reminder

During the cold and flu season, we ask that everyone be mindful of others when attending Mass. If you are sick and believe you are contagious, stay home. The obligation to attend Mass is not required if you are ill. If you do have cold or flu like symptoms, do not feel that you have to exchange the Sign of Peace with others. Simply wave or nod your head to your neighbors. If your parish has a custom of holding hands during the Lord’s Prayer, parishioners who are ill may fold their hands in a prayerful posture. While it is the norm in the Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston to receive the Eucharist under both sacred species, refrain from drinking from the chalice if you feel ill. You are still receiving the Body, Blood, Soul and Divinity of the Lord.

## Hospitality is an important ecumenical virtue, pope says

VATICAN CITY (CNS) -- Showing hospitality makes a person a better human being and a better Christian and is an important part of promoting Christian unity, Pope Francis said.

“Working together to live with ecumenical hospitality, particularly toward those whose lives are most vulnerable, will make us -- all Christians, Protestants, Orthodox, Catholics, all Christians -- better human beings, better disciples and a more united Christian people,” the pope said Jan. 22 during his weekly general audience.

Christians today, like the people of Malta who welcomed St. Paul and his companions who were shipwrecked on their island, must show hospitality to and care for those who flee violence and persecution, he said.

“Unfortunately, they sometimes encounter even the worst hostility,” he said. “They are exploited by criminal traffickers today; they are treated as numbers and as a threat by some leaders today; sometimes inhospitality rejects them as a wave carrying poverty or the very dangers from which they were fleeing.”

In his audience talk, the pope reflected on the Week of Prayer for

Christian Unity, which takes place Jan. 18-25. The theme for the 2020 celebration, “They showed us unusual kindness,” is taken from St. Luke’s account in the Acts of the Apostles of the hospitality shown by the people of Malta to St. Paul and his companions.

St. Paul and the other passengers of the ship were welcomed by the Maltese people, who gave them food and shelter “even though they had not yet received the Good News of Christ,” the pope said.

The virtue of hospitality, he added, “means recognizing that other Christians are truly our brothers and sisters in Christ.”

“We are brothers and sisters,” the pope said. “Someone may tell you, ‘But that one is a Protestant, that one is Orthodox.’ Yes, but we are brothers and sisters in Christ.”

The pope said ecumenical hospitality means showing God’s love to others and “a willingness to listen to other Christians, paying attention to their personal stories of faith and the history of their community.”

“I think about the past, in my land for example, when some Evangelical

### Matthew 4:12-23

We have been learning about John the Baptist over the last two Sundays and how he played an important role in the life of Jesus. The spotlight had been on John. He was the last of the great prophets. He was the one drawing crowds to the river for a baptism of repentance. But now, he suddenly leaves the stage. King Herod doesn't like the response and popularity that John is receiving. He orders John to be imprisoned. That, Herod believes, will end the Baptizer's influence and the troubles associated with him and those like him. But we know that more "trouble" was to come. When Jesus learns what happened to John, he immediately goes public and invites four fishermen to join him. Jesus is off and running.

Try to catch the spirit of today's Gospel reading.

The movement is on fast forward. Once Jesus comes to know that it's time for him to begin what he came to do, he does so with gusto. He is a man on a mission. He is fully purpose-drive. Part of his message to the world is taken from John's playbook. Repent. Change your ways. Open your heart to something new and very significant. It's game time. And this game is for real and for keeps.


Some lines in the Gospels are more important than others. Here's one that many judge as momentous. "Repent, for the Kingdom of God is at hand." God's loving and fierce entry into human history is made definitive in the person of Jesus and he is suddenly on the road. God's Kingdom is not something that Jesus predicts will come at some future date. Nor is it going to take place only



in heaven. Jesus states that it's beginning right now, today! That's his proclamation, his Big Announcement. As we say these days, the full beginning of the Kingdom of God, on earth as it is in heaven, is now "on the clock." It all began on that day described in today's Gospel. And it's been unfolding ever since. 🌱

# This Week with the Saints

**January 27** - Several miraculous occurrences, including restoration of sight and visions, surrounded the life of **Saint Angela Merici** (1474-1540), a native of Desenzano in northern Italy. She was profoundly impacted by one vision in which she saw a great company of virgins and saints singing and playing instruments while descending from a staircase in the heavens. Based upon this vision, St. Angela founded a group of consecrated women known as the Ursulines, dedicated to the education of young women.



**January 28 - Saint Thomas Aquinas** (1225-1274), called the “Angelic Doctor” for his writings, was born near Naples, Italy. Against his family’s wishes, he joined the newly established Dominicans and went to study under Albert the Great in Paris. Thomas’ theological writings, especially the *Summa Theologiae*, remain preeminent texts to this day. For all his brilliance, Thomas was also a man of deep prayer who realized that the mysteries of God cannot fully be expressed by words. He contributed the liturgical texts for the Solemnity of Corpus Christi, the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ, which included the *Adoro te devote*, *O salutaris*, *Tantum Ergo*, and *Pange Lingua*. *Patronage*: Catholic schools, colleges, universities; philosophers, theologians, booksellers



**January 31 - Saint John Bosco** (1815-1888) was gifted by God with the ability to read and interpret the signs of the times. Living during rapid industrialization and growing anticlericalism, he became very concerned about the emotional and spiritual livelihood of people, especially the plight of the young. St. John worked to provide positive and affirming environments, including orphanages and oratories, where the young could learn and recognize their infinite potential. In the spirit of his favorite hero, St. Francis de Sales, he founded the Salesians, a religious congregation devoted to works of charity, with an emphasis on empowering young people to become strong pillars of faith in a culture of instability. His work among young men living in the slums proved to be a worthy endeavor. Whether he was presiding at Mass or playing games with children or carrying the sick to hospitals, it was obvious he lived until “his last breath ... day and night, morning and evening” for the neglected and abandoned. *Patronage*: young people; editors; magicians



## Pope sets special day to honor, study, share the Bible

VATICAN CITY — The newly established “Sunday of the Word of God” is an invitation to Catholics across the world to deepen their appreciation, love and faithful witness to God and his word, Pope Francis said.

By papal decree, the third Sunday in Ordinary Time — Jan. 26 this year — is to be observed as a special day devoted to “the celebration, study and dissemination of the word of God.”

A day dedicated to the Bible will help the church “experience anew how the risen Lord opens up for us the treasury of his word and enables us to proclaim its unfathomable riches before the world,” the pope said in the document establishing the special Sunday observance.

Dioceses and parishes have been invited to respond with creative initiatives, helpful resources and renewed efforts for helping Catholics engage more deeply with the Bible at church and in their lives.

Archbishop Rino Fisichella, president of the Pontifical Council for Promoting New Evangelization, said added emphasis on the importance of the word of God is needed because “the overwhelming majority” of Catholics are not familiar with sacred Scripture. For many, the only time they hear the word of God is when they attend Mass, he told Vatican News Sept. 30, when the papal document, titled “Aperuit Illis,” was published.

“The Bible is the most widely distributed book, but it’s also perhaps the one most covered in dust because it is not held in our hands,” the archbishop said.

With this apostolic letter, the pope “invites us to hold the word of God in our hands every day as much as possible so that it becomes our prayer” and a greater part of one’s lived experience, he said.

ministers came,” the pope said, “a small group of Catholics burned their tents. This isn’t Christian. We are brothers and sisters. We are all brothers and sisters and we must give hospitality to one another.”

With so many migrants and refugees facing “risky voyages to escape violence, war and poverty,” Pope Francis called on Christians to set aside their differences and work together to show them “the love of God revealed by Jesus Christ” and that “each person is precious to God.

“The divisions that still exist between us prevent us from being fully the sign of God’s love for the world, which is our vocation and mission,” he said. 🇺🇸


