



Baptism of Jesus: "This is my beloved Son, in whom I am well pleased!"

The Gospel highlights the fact that the Baptism of Jesus was marked by signs that marked the occasion and revealed to him and to the world the special mission of Jesus. There is first of all the heavens that are torn apart. The heavens signified for the Israelites the abode of God. At His baptism, the heavens are opened, God comes down on earth and dwells in and among people. At our baptism we may not have the sign, but God comes to dwell in you and me. We become the temple, the dwelling place of God.

The second sign is the Spirit, descending on Jesus in the form of a dove. Jesus is filled with the spirit, which symbolizes the power of God, that gives strength to fulfill his mission. The third sign at the baptism of Jesus was the voice that came from the heavens saying, "You are my son the beloved, my favor rests on you!" The most important message we need to hear is God saying to us: "You are my beloved, my favor rests on you. You are my beloved in whom I am well pleased."

The good news that Jesus came to give us is that in and through him, the Father is saying to us right now: "You are my beloved, my favor rests on you". He does not say "Change and I will love you!" but rather "I love you!" He puts no terms and no conditions to his unconditional love. We cannot fulfill our life's mission unless we are energized by the Spirit, who comes to inspire us to comfort us to nourish our spirits and recreate us when we are dispirited. When we have heard in the depth of our hearts those wonderful words: "You are my beloved, my favor rests on you! Our lives too will be transformed, and we will live our mission to the fullest. That will really be the moment of our true baptism, being affirmed by God and rediscovering our true mission in life, the turning point in our lives. This feast of Baptism is an opportunity for all of us to reflect on our own baptism.

In order to understand today's feast and what took place at the River Jordan, we have to go far beyond seeing Jesus' baptism as a matter of dealing with sinfulness. Baptism is not, as is true of all the sacraments, an isolated ritual. It takes place in the context of our whole life and the life of the community. Whether we are baptized as children or as adults, what primarily is happening is that we become incorporated embodied, into the Christian community. We become not passively, but actively a member of the Body of Christ. It can never be something imposed on us against our will. That is why, for adults, there is now a long process of initiation leading up to Baptism and celebrated in the presence of the whole parish community and at the Easter Vigil. As today's readings tell us, the Sacrament of Baptism is insufficient to save us. We must live our faith in Christ by obeying the commandments of God. This is achieved by shining in our love towards others as a light in the world.

All of us have defining moments, peak experiences in our lives. These moments sometimes change and give a new direction to our lives. For some it could be an experience of death, for others a crisis that we have come through. For others it could be a success that we have achieved, a new job offer that we have received. Sometimes it can be a new relationship that makes all the difference in the world! For many it could be a moving God-experience! Have a good weekend celebrating your God-experience!

CELEBRATE YOUR BAPTISM

In the liturgical calendar, the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord signifies the end of the Christmas season. The Baptism of the Lord is notable because it marks the beginning of Jesus' ministry and confirms his identity as the Son of God. As we reflect on Christ's baptism, we are reminded of our own baptism. "Celebrate the anniversary of your baptism like a birthday", says Pope Francis. It is a day to give thanks for God's gift of faith to us, and to give thanks for baptism, the foundation of our Christian life. Celebrate the day like a birthday. It is a day to remind ourselves that we are loved and cherished by God.

Catholic Schools Hope Scholarship

Catholic schools throughout the Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston are preparing for the 2022-23 school year with their common application and re-enrollment period beginning in February. Schools are also preparing to welcome new students taking advantage of the HOPE Scholarship—with its application period set to open by March 2022.

The Hope Scholarship, formerly House Bill 2013, was passed last Spring by the WV Legislature. Hope Scholarship is set up to provide funds for families enrolling in private school, alternative instruction programs, or home schools. This education savings account is managed through the West Virginia Treasure Riley Moore's office and not by the Diocese.

According to the Treasurer's website, hopescholarshipwv.com, students are eligible for the program if they are:

- A resident of West Virginia
- Entering kindergarten for the first time in the Fall of 2022
- Current K-11 student enrolled full time (or at least 45 days during the time

The site also states that under the current school aid formula, each eligible student would receive \$4,600 annually that can be used toward private school, alternative instruction programs, or home school. Please visit the site to learn more about the program and receive updates from the Treasurer's office.

The application and re-enrollment period for the 24 Catholic schools in the Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston begins in February:

- February 4, 2022 (1st Friday of Catholic Schools Week) – Re-enrollment for current families begins.
- February 11, 2022- Application period opens for parishioners new to the school begins.
- February 18, 2022-General public application period begins.

Throughout the month of January, we give special honor to the Most Holy Name of Jesus. Saint Paul wrote to the Philippians: "At the name of Jesus every knee should bend, in heaven and on earth and under the earth, and every tongue should confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father" (Philippians 2:10-11). We hold the name of Jesus in special reverence. The very name of Jesus is a prayer.

A Way to Honor the Holy Name

Adopt the pious practice (that used to be more widely practiced and is so meaningful and fitting) of bowing your head whenever you say or hear the name of Jesus (just as we should bow or genuflect before the Real Presence in the tabernacle or make a sign of the cross as we pass a Catholic Church). The Council of Lyons in 1274 stated: "Each should fulfill in himself that which is written for all, that at the Name of Jesus every knee should bow; whenever that glorious Name is recalled, especially during the sacred Mysteries of the Mass, everyone should bow the knees of his heart, which he can do even by a bow of his head." This devotion also helps to make amends for blasphemous use of the Holy Name.

SAINTS OF THE WEEK

January 13 - St. Hilary (315-368)

Saint Hilary was the bishop of Poitiers, France, during the era of the Arian heresy, and he fought for the correct understanding and expression of the divinity of Christ. He was known as the "hammer against Arianism" and the "Athanasius of the West," after the bishop of Alexandria who fought the heresy in the East. The Christian world was so divided by Arianism that Hilary was exiled twice. His great contribution was the successful expression in Latin of the theology about Christ, or Christology, that had been developed in Greek.





WHY DO WE DO THAT?

Catholic Life Explained:

Baptismal Garment

Question:

At my grandson's Baptism, the priest put a bib on the baby. I do not remember seeing this before. Why is this done? Is it something new?

Answer:

When an adult is baptized, there is a part in the ceremony when the newly baptized is vested in a white garment. It is symbolic of the changes that baptism brings in the life of the baptized as they are freed from the bonds of sin and brought into the saving grace of Christ. Realities that are so profound are symbolically presented so that we might better grasp and understand them.

Infants are often dressed in a baptismal dress, which is the baptismal garment. In some places, the bib is used as a kind of baptismal garment. At the place in the ceremony where the investiture takes place, the bib is used. Some are poncho-like and fit over the baby's head. Others are simply placed on the baby's chest. If the baby is dressed in a white garment, nothing else is needed. The prayer says it all: "See in your white garment the outward sign of your Christian dignity ... bring that dignity unstained into the everlasting life of heaven." In baptism, we are given our purpose and goal in life as believers and this is symbolized by the white garment.
