

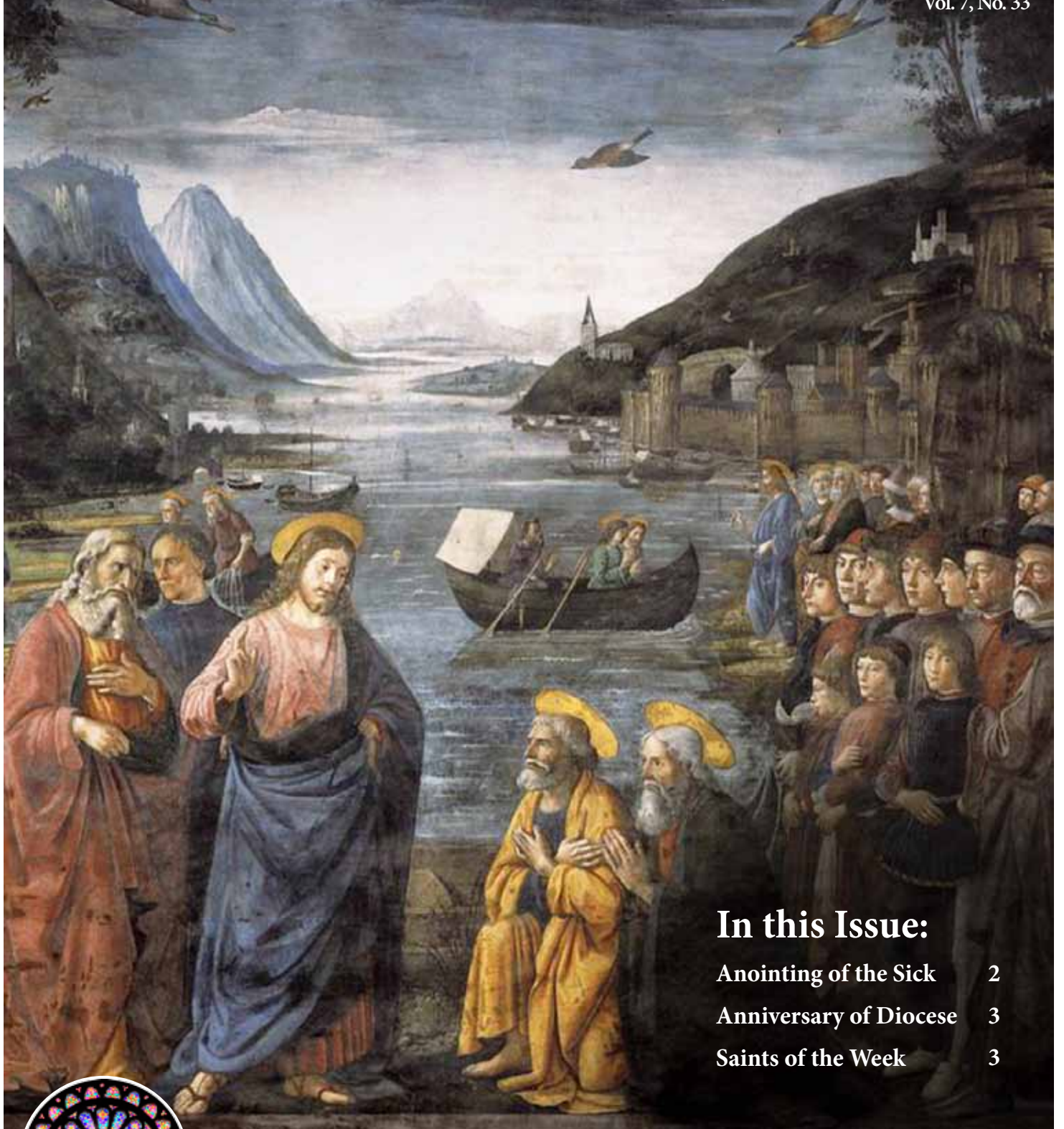

Fifteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time

In the Gospel reading for this Sunday, we hear of the commissioning of the Twelve Apostles in which Jesus gave them both the power and the authority to speak and to act in His name. He commanded them to do the works which He did - to heal the sick, to cast out evil spirits, and to speak the word of God - the good news of the Gospel which they received from Jesus himself. Saint Cyril of Alexandria reflects "The grace bestowed upon the holy apostles is worthy of all admiration. But the bountifulness of the Giver surpasses all praise and admiration."

Not alone does Jesus send the Twelve out, but with a partner. What are the twelve to take with them for their journey? Nothing. They do not have to worry about carrying the weight of possessions. Proper footwear is essential, but they will not need a second tunic. They are only to stay where people welcome them, following Jesus' example of leaving places that take offense at their preaching and miraculous deeds.

The message of the Twelve is repentance, a change of heart akin to Amos' message in the First Reading. While Amos aligns Amos with the professional class of prophets in today's reading, Amos is clear that he was working as a shepherd when the Lord called him. From within our ordinary, routine, daily work, the Lord calls us, too. He calls us and sends us out into the world to proclaim his saving message of repentance and love that our world so desperately needs to hear. 🍀

July: Month of the Precious Blood

"As we now approach the month devoted to honoring Christ's Blood - the price of our redemption, the pledge of salvation and life eternal - may Christians meditate on it more fervently, may they savor its fruits more frequently in sacramental communion." So wrote Pope Saint John XXIII, in his apostolic letter *Inde a Primus*, encouraging this devotion.

Anointing of the Sick - July 21/22

Jesus came to heal the whole person, body and soul. In the Church's Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick, through the ministry of the priest, it is Jesus who touches the sick to heal them from sin - and sometimes even from physical ailment. His cures were signs of the arrival of the Kingdom of God. The core message of his healing tells us of his plan to conquer sin and death by his dying and rising. The Rite of Anointing tells us there is no need to wait until a person is at the point of death to receive the Sacrament. A careful judgment about the serious nature of the illness is sufficient. When the Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick is given, the hoped-for effect is that, if it be God's will, the person be physically healed of illness. But even if there is no physical healing, the primary effect of the Sacrament is a spiritual healing by which the sick person receives the Holy Spirit's gift of peace and courage to deal with the difficulties that accompany serious illness or the frailty of old age. At the Cathedral of Saint Joseph, the communal celebration of the Anointing of the Sick is held following Mass on the Third Sunday of January, April, July, November. **The next celebration will be on July 21/22.** If you would like to participate in this sacrament, please be seated in one of the first few pews on the Blessed Mother's Side at the front of the Church after one of those weekend Masses.

Anniversary of the Formation of the Diocese

The Diocese of Wheeling (then, Virginia) was erected by Blessed Pius IX (the longest reigning Pope in history, after St. Peter) on July 19, 1850. Bishop Richard V. Whalen is recognized as its founding Bishop. Prior to this appointment, Whalen served as the 2nd Bishop of Richmond, at that time comprising the entire state of Virginia.

When the Diocese of Wheeling was created in 1850, Wheeling's only Catholic Church, St. James, was designated its Cathedral. Bishop Whalen wrote to the Holy Father requesting permission to change the Cathedral's patron from St. James to St. Joseph, since he is recognized as the patron of fathers, workers and social justice.



At the time of its establishment, the Diocese of Wheeling was entirely within the State of Virginia. In 1863 when West Virginia separated from Virginia, eight counties in the eastern panhandle of West Virginia continued as part of the Diocese of Richmond, and the Diocese of Wheeling included seventeen and one-half counties in Southwest Virginia.

The Diocese was redesignated the Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston on October 4, 1974, under a decree of Pope Paul VI, with Co-Cathedral Sacred Heart Church, Charleston, West Virginia. The Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston comprises the entire State of West Virginia, with a total population of 1,806,926 in an area of 24,282.45 square miles.

Saints for the Week Ahead



July 18 - Saint Camillus de Lellis (1550-1614) born at Chieti in the Abruzzi region of Italy; soldier addicted to gambling; his conversion led him to found in 1582 a society (Camilians), today numbering 1,130 religious, which established hospitals and cared for the sick with affection and diligence
Patronage: nurses; sick; hospitals; against illness;

July 20 - Saint Apollinaris (1st c.) early accounts report that he was ordained bishop by St. Peter himself and sent as a missionary bishop to Ravenna during the reign of the emperor Claudius (41-54 AD). Renowned for his power to heal in the name of Christ, he was frequently exiled, tortured, and imprisoned for the faith, and finally martyred.
Patronage: against epilepsy

July 21 - Saint Lawrence of Brindisi (1559-1619) Capuchin, linguist, military chaplain, diplomat, and minister general; learned exegete, forceful preacher, and controversialist; fifteen volumes of his writings are still in existence.
