



## FOURTEENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

The theme of humility is central to our readings today. God Himself is a humble God, so if we wish to follow Him, we too, must be humble. In fact, humility is key to living as Christ's disciples, and to a peaceful and fulfilling life.

In our Gospel passage from Matthew, Jesus Himself speaks to the Father of the privileged role that humble souls play in God's plan of salvation. "I give praise to you, Father, Lord of heaven and earth, for although you have hidden these things from the wise and the learned you have revealed them to little ones."

What does it mean to be a "little one"? It means that we acknowledge we don't have it all figured out, but that we are very much in need of a savior. It means we recognize that all we are and all we have been given is a gift from God. It means we embrace the stewardship way of life.

It is not easy, but deep peace and consolation come with this way of life. Jesus offers these warm and encouraging words to entice us to embrace it. "Come to me, all you who labor and are burdened, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you and learn from me, for I am meek and humble of heart; and you will find rest for yourselves. For my yoke is easy, and my burden light."

Let us resolve to follow in the footsteps of our Savior, embracing the humble path of discipleship. It is the path that leads to peace here and now, and ultimately leads us to heaven.



## Guidelines for Public Celebration of the Mass

We kindly ask that you please review and adhere to these guidelines while attending Mass in the Cathedral:

- ❖ The faithful are required to bring their own facemasks and to wear them during Mass.
- ❖ Social distancing is necessary at Mass while seated in the pew and during the Communion procession. Families living in the same household may sit together. We are only able to accommodate 92 people per Mass at the Cathedral. Seating will be on a first come first seated basis. If additional seating is necessary, the overflow crowd will be directed to The Great Hall of Central Catholic High School where the Mass will be live-streamed.
- ❖ Some common, though optional practices of the Mass, will be omitted such as the use of hymnals, holding of hands during the Our Father, the Sign of Peace, and the offering of the Precious Blood of Christ to the faithful.

Please keep in mind that Bishop Brennan has given the faithful of the Diocese the dispensation from the obligation to attend Mass. Therefore, sick persons and those more susceptible to infection – the elderly, those already in frail health – are urged to remain at home and participate in televised or online Masses. Anyone who fears being infected by attending Mass should stay home.

# SAINT OF THE DAY



## JULY 6 - SAINT MARIA GORETTI (1890-1902)

Saint Maria Goretti is one of the youngest saints to be canonized. She died of stab wounds after she resisted a rapist. Maria came from a poor Italian family. They lost their farm and a few years later, her father died of malaria. In spite of their hard existence as farm laborers, the family was close-knit and devout. By 1902, the family was sharing a building with another family of farm workers, one of whom was Alessandro Serenelli, who made it a habit to sexually harass Maria. One day, finding her alone, he threatened to kill her if she did not submit to him. Maria protested that what he asked was a mortal sin. Alessandro choked and then stabbed her, leaving her bleeding to death. She was taken to the hospital, but she could not be saved. Maria died forgiving her murderer. Shortly after Maria died, Alessandro was arrested, charged with murder, and sentenced to twenty years in prison. He remained unrepentant until Maria appeared to him in a dream. Upon his release, he went to Maria's mother and asked her forgiveness. Eventually he became a Capuchin lay brother and was present at Maria's canonization in 1950, as was her mother. **PATRONAGE:** girls, rape victims

## JULY 9 - SAINT AUGUSTINE ZHAO RONG, PRIEST, AND COMPANIONS, MARTYRS

Between 1648 and 1930, 87 Chinese Catholics and 33 Western missionaries, some of whom were Dominicans, Franciscans, Salesians, Jesuits and Vincentians, were martyred for their ministry or for refusing to renounce their Christian faith. Many of the Chinese converts were killed during the Boxer Rebellion, a xenophobic uprising during which many foreigners were slaughtered by angry peasants. Augustine Zhao Rong was a Chinese diocesan priest who was tortured and killed in 1815, after the Emperor Kia-Kin issued decrees banning Catholicism. Augustine Zhao Rong and the other Chinese martyrs were canonized in 2000 by Pope John Paul II.



## JULY 11 - SAINT BENEDICT, ABBOT (c.480-550)

Saint Benedict of Nursia was born north of Rome in Umbria. While studying in Rome, surrounded by self-indulgent companions, he decided to pursue a life as taught in the Gospel and withdrew to Enfide. On the advice of an elderly monk, Romanus of Subiaco, he became a hermit for three years. His reputation for holiness grew in the surrounding area, and the monks of Vicovaro begged him to come be their superior. Unfortunately, the monks were not inclined to follow Benedict's austere example, and they twice tried to kill him, once with poisoned bread and then with poisoned wine. Both times he was saved by miraculous intervention. Benedict's reputation grew, and after leaving Vicovaro, he found himself surrounded by so many followers that he was able to found twelve monasteries in the area of Subiaco. Eventually, Benedict built an abbey on the summit of Monte Cassino. Much of what we know of his life comes from Book Two of the *Dialogues of Gregory the Great*. Benedict is best known for his *Rule*, which is known for its wisdom and adaptability; communities both of men and of women have followed it since the sixth century to this day. For his influence, he is known as the Father of Western Monasticism and is venerated by Catholics and non-Catholics alike.

# Pope at pallium Mass: World needs to pray more, complain less

VATICAN CITY (CNS) -- Some people always will want to destroy unity and stifle prophets, Pope Francis said on the feast of Sts. Peter and Paul.

And yet, Jesus challenges everyone to be -- like Peter -- a rock for building a renewed church and renewed humanity, and -- like Paul -- a missionary who brings the Gospel to others, he said during a Mass in St. Peter's Basilica June 29.

People also need to complain less and pray more, especially for those who govern, the pope said.

People must ask themselves whether they "simply talk and do nothing" because God wants people to pray and "be mindful of those who do not think as we do, those who have slammed the door in our face, those whom we find it hard to forgive."

The feast day celebration in St. Peter's Basilica was markedly different from other years because of ongoing restrictions in place to stem the spread of COVID-19. Normally archbishops appointed over the course of the previous year would have been invited to concelebrate the feast day Mass with the pope and watch as he blessed their palliums, woolen bands worn around their shoulders.

The 54 archbishops from 33 different countries who were named over the past 12 months included: Archbishops Paul D. Etienne of Seattle; Nelson J. Perez of Philadelphia; Andrew E. Bellisario of Anchorage-Juneau, Alaska; Mitchell T. Rozanski of St. Louis; Gregory J. Hartmayer of Atlanta; Terrence Prendergast of Ottawa-Cornwall, Ontario; and Patrick M. O'Regan of Adelaide, Australia.

But the archbishops were not there. Instead, a congregation of about 90 people attended the Mass concelebrated by the pope, nine of the 11 cardinal-bishops resident in Rome and the archpriest of St. Peter's Basilica, Cardinal Angelo Comastri.

While the actual imposition of the pallium was to take place in each archbishop's archdiocese, Pope Francis did place a pallium on Cardinal Giovanni Battista Re, the new dean of the College of Cardinals. Conferring a pallium on a new dean was a custom begun by St. John Paul II.

The pallium symbolizes an archbishop's unity with the pope and his authority and responsibility to care for the flock the pope entrusted to him. The pope blessed the palliums after they were brought up from the crypt above the tomb of St. Peter.

In his homily, the pope said Sts. Peter and Paul demonstrate unity in diversity; they were two very different individuals, who sometimes argued heatedly, but they saw one another as brothers, united by Jesus.

Jesus "did not command us to like one another, but to love one another," the pope said. "He is the one who unites us, without making us all alike."

When the early church faced fierce persecution, the pope said, "no one ran away, no one thought about saving his own skin, no one abandoned the others, but all joined in prayer," which created "a unity more powerful than any threat."

They also prayed instead of complaining about the injustice they faced, the pope added.

"It is pointless, even tedious, for Christians to waste their time complaining

about the world, about society, about everything that is not right," he said. "Complaints change nothing."

"Are we protecting our unity with prayer, the unity of the church?" the pope suggested people ask themselves. "Are we praying for one another? What would happen if we prayed more and complained less?"

The answer, he said, is what happened to Peter in prison: closed doors open and chains break.

The pope asked people to pray for everyone, especially those who govern.

"God will judge them, but we should pray for those who govern. Pray. They need prayers. This is a task that the Lord has entrusted to us. Are we carrying it out? Or do we simply talk, insult them and that's all?" he said.

The feast day also highlights the importance of prophecy, which is "born whenever we allow ourselves to be challenged by God, not when we are concerned to keep everything quiet and under control," Pope Francis said.

"Today the world needs real prophecy, not fast talkers who promise the impossible, but testimonies that the Gospel is possible," he said.

"What is needed are not miraculous shows," he said, "but lives that show the miracle of God's love. Not forcefulness, but forthrightness."

The world needs "not speeches, but service. Not theory, but testimony," he said. "We are not to become rich, but rather to love the poor. We are not to save up for ourselves, but to spend ourselves for others. To seek not the approval of this world, but the joy of the world to come. Not better pastoral plans, but pastors who offer their lives -- lovers of God."
