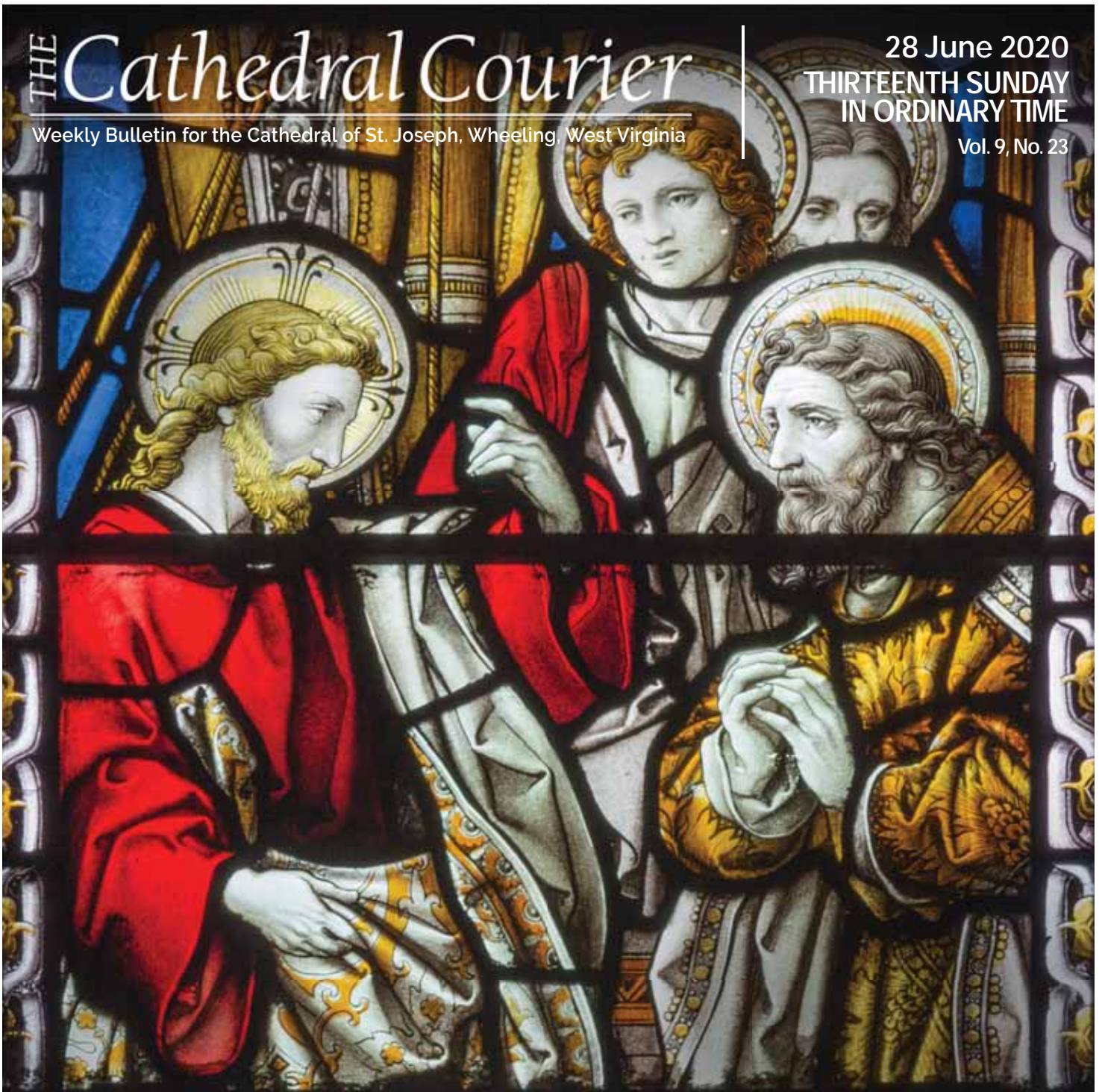

## THIRTEENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

Our First Reading, from 2 Kings, shows us the necessity and power of hospitality. It recounts the story of a woman who showed loving hospitality to a visitor, inviting him to dinner with her family and arranging a room for him in their home so that he would have a comfortable place to stay during his travels through her town. She reached out to the man in a simple and practical manner to make him feel welcome and was rewarded in an extraordinary way.

In our Second Reading, from the Letter to the Romans, St. Paul reminds us of the power of our Baptism and how this sacrament makes us disciples. What does that mean for us here and now? St. Paul tells us very clearly: “You must think of yourselves as dead to sin and living for God in Christ Jesus.” We must live for Christ! Nothing less will do.

Our Lord proclaims this same instruction in a rather shocking way in our Gospel passage from Matthew: “Whoever finds his life [by living for oneself] will lose it, and whoever loses his life for my sake will find it.” But how do we lose our life? Precisely through loving actions towards others, loving them as if they were Christ. “Whoever gives only a cup of cold water to one of these little ones to drink because the little one is a disciple... he will surely not lose his reward.”

So, we have come full circle to the importance of hospitality, and to putting God first in our lives because we have become disciples of Christ through our Baptism. We put God first by serving others as if we were serving Christ Himself, thus losing a self-centered life and finding our true fulfillment.

## Guidelines for Public Celebration of the Mass

We kindly ask that you please review and adhere to these guidelines while attending Mass in the Cathedral:

- ✓ The faithful are required to bring their own facemasks and to wear them during Mass.
- ✓ Social distancing is necessary at Mass while seated in the pew and during the Communion procession. Families living in the same household may sit together. We are only able to accommodate 92 people per Mass at the Cathedral. Seating will be on a first come first seated basis. If additional seating is necessary, the overflow crowd will be directed to The Great Hall of Central Catholic High School where the Mass will be live-streamed.
- ✓ Some common, though optional practices of the Mass, will be omitted such as the use of hymnals, holding of hands during the Our Father, the Sign of Peace, and the offering of the Precious Blood of Christ to the faithful.

Please keep in mind that Bishop Brennan has given the faithful of the Diocese the dispensation from the obligation to attend Mass. Therefore, sick persons and those more susceptible to infection – the elderly, those already in frail health – are urged to remain at home and participate in televised or online Masses. Anyone who fears being infected by attending Mass should stay home.

be admitted to those which are eternal.

# SAINT OF THE DAY



## JUNE 29 - SAINTS PETER AND PAUL, APOSTLES (d. 64)

Peter and Paul according to legend were executed on the same day in the year 64 A.D. under the command of Emperor Nero and buried in Rome. Tradition says that Peter fled Rome to avoid arrest and saw Jesus on the road. "Where are you going, Lord?" Peter asked. Jesus replied, "I am going to Rome to be crucified again." Peter turned back and was crucified upside down, because he felt unworthy to meet his death the same way as Christ. Paul was arrested in Jerusalem and was sent to Rome, where he was placed under house arrest. He was slain by beheading, because as a Roman citizen he could not be subjected to the indignity of crucifixion. In a sermon in the year 395, Saint Augustine of Hippo said: "Both apostles share the same feast day, for these two were one; and even though they suffered on different days, they were as one. Peter went first, and Paul followed. And so we celebrate this day made holy for us by the apostles' blood. Let us embrace what they believed, their life, their labors, their sufferings, their preaching, and their confession of faith." Saint Peter is the patron of those in the fishing industry and Saint Paul is the patron of the lay apostolate, writers, Malta, and Greece. Both are the principal patrons of Rome.

## JUNE 30 - FIRST MARTYRS OF THE HOLY ROMAN CHURCH (d. 54-68)

On this day we commemorate those who suffered martyrdom during the reign of Nero, approximately 54-68. Nero, a ruthless and unstable man, blamed the early Christians for a fire that destroyed two-thirds of Rome. Some believe Nero himself may have started the fire to clear land for future building projects, in particular, a palace. Heinous and barbaric tactics were used to torture and kill Christians, including crucifixion, covering people with wax and lighting them ablaze as human torches, and feeding them to animals. Saints Peter and Paul were among thousands of Christians that were killed at the hand of Nero.



## JULY 1 - SAINT JUNÍPERO SERRA, (1713-1784)

Saint Junípero Serra was a Spanish Franciscan friar, best known for founding the string of twenty-one missions that stretch from San Diego to Sonoma, California. Junípero was born in Majorca. At age sixteen he entered the Franciscans. After completing his theological studies, he served as professor of philosophy at Majorca before volunteering for the missions in the "New World." Upon arrival, he went to Mexico City to dedicate his mission at the shrine of Our Lady of Guadalupe. Serra founded his first mission at San Diego in 1769, and worked his way up the coast along El Camino Real, making converts as he went. In spite of a leg injury he suffered at the beginning of his ministry, he traveled on foot whenever possible, eventually covering 24,000 miles. The chapel at Mission San Juan Capistrano is believed to be the oldest standing building in California, and the only one left were Serra is known to have celebrated the liturgy. Pope Francis canonized Junípero during his visit to the United States in September 2015. This was the first canonization to take place on U.S. soil.

# God listens to everybody -- sinner, saint, victim, killer, pope says

VATICAN CITY (CNS) -- Everyone lives a life that is often inconsistent or a "contradiction" because people can be both a sinner and a saint, a victim and a tormentor, Pope Francis said.

No matter what one's situation is, people can put themselves back in God's hands through prayer, he said June 24 during his weekly general audience.

"Prayer gives us nobility; it is able to protect one's relationship with God, who is the true companion along humanity's journey, amidst thousands of hardships in life, good or bad, but always with prayer," he said.

The audience, livestreamed from the library of the Apostolic Palace, was the pope's last general audience talk until Aug. 5, according to Vatican News. His Sunday Angelus address was to continue throughout July, however.

With the start of summer vacation for many, the pope said he hoped people could have a peaceful moment of rest despite the ongoing restric-

tions "connected to the threat of infection from the coronavirus."

May it be a time of "enjoyment of the beauty of creation and a strengthening of ties with mankind and with God," he said in greetings to Polish-speaking viewers and listeners.

In his main talk, the pope continued his series on prayer and reflected on the role prayer played in the life of David -- a young shepherd whom God called to become king of Israel.

David learned early in life that a shepherd takes care of his flock, protects them from danger and provides for them, the pope said.

Jesus, too, is called "the good shepherd" because he offers his life for his flock, guiding them, knowing each one by name, he said.

When David was later confronted for his terrible sins, he realized he had become a "bad shepherd," someone who was "sick with power, a poacher who kills and loots," the pope said.

He no longer acted like a humble servant but had robbed another man of the only thing he loved when he took

the man's wife as his own.

David wanted to be a good shepherd, but sometimes he failed and sometimes he succeeded, the pope said.

"Saint and sinner, persecuted and persecutor, victim and even executioner," David was full of contradictions -- being all of these things in his life, he said.

But the one thing that stayed constant was his prayerful dialogue with God. "David the saint, prays, David the sinner, prays," always lifting his voice to God either in joy or deep despair, the pope said.

This is what David can teach the faithful today, he said: to always speak with God, no matter the circumstances or one's state of being, because everyone's life is often marked by contradiction and inconsistencies.

People should tell God about their joy, sins, sorrows and love -- everything, the pope said, because God is always there, and he listens.

Prayer returns people to God "because the nobility of prayer leaves us in God's hands," he said.

The pope also noted the day's feast of the birth of St. John the Baptist.

He asked that people learn from this saint, how to be courageous witnesses of the Gospel, above and beyond any individual differences, "preserving harmony and friendship that are the basis for the credibility of any proclamation of faith."
