First Sunday of Lent

Genesis 2:7-9; 3:1-7 • Psalm 51:3-4, 5-6, 12-13, 17

Romans 5:12-19 • Matthew 4:1-11

We began this past Wednesday the holy season of Lent. This is the season in our liturgical year when the Church encourages us to increase our prayer, fasting and almsgiving in order to enter more deeply into the mystery of our Lord's Passion and Death and to celebrate more fully His Resurrection.

Jesus, by His own example in today's Gospel, demonstrates the necessity of setting aside a period of time devoted especially to prayer and fasting as a means of strengthening our spiritual life. Just before the launch of His public ministry, He is "led by the Holy Spirit into the desert for forty days, to be tempted by the devil." In imitation of Jesus, we should ask the Holy Spirit to lead us into the desert, too — the desert of our interior lives where our thoughts and desires reside.

While our Lord was strong enough to withstand the temptations of the devil on His own, we most certainly are not without His help. We must turn to the Holy Spirit and ask Him to show us where we need to grow, and then rely on the Holy Spirit for strength and guidance throughout these 40 days of growth. Perhaps we will be led to take on a spiritual reading program, or a daily time of meditation on the Scriptures. Maybe we'll be inspired to fast from our favorite food or social media fix and find a project that serves the poor in this community.

At the end of this season, we will be prepared to enter into the grace-filled days of the Triduum and we will, through the power of the Holy Spirit, be resurrected as a new creation with our Lord come Easter. Let us set out on this Lenten journey mindful of the fact that Christ calls us to ongoing repentance and conversion of heart so that we may his experience His mercy and love in abundance. 🙏

Lord, Let Me Walk ... A Lenten Reflection

Pope Francis tells us that Lent is a new beginning, a path towards continual conversion of the heart. We hope that you will join with us in this journey of prayer and reflection. On **Sunday, March 1st at 3:00 p.m. in the Cathedral of Saint Joseph** the Catholic Schools in the Upper Ohio Valley (from Wheeling to Weirton) will gather together for a Lenten Reflection. Two smaller meals are permitted, if necessary, to maintain strength according to each one's needs, but eating solid food between meals is not permitted.

All Catholics ages 14 and over are bound to refrain from eating meat on Ash Wednesday and all Fridays of Lent.

Pope: Lent is a time to reflect on God's love

ROME (CNS) -- Ashes not only symbolize humanity's frail mortality but are also a reminder of God's infinite love of people, whom he created from dust, Pope Francis said.

While men and women are just "dust in the universe" compared to the galaxies and space, "we are thus a dust that is precious, destined for eternal life" with God, the pope said Feb. 26, celebrating Mass and distributing ashes at the beginning of Lent.

"For Lent is not a time for useless sermons, but for recognizing that our lowly ashes are loved by God," he said. "It is a time of grace, a time for letting God gaze upon us with love and in this way change our lives. We were put in this world to go from ashes to life."

After a brief prayer at the Benedictine's Monastery of St. Anselm, Pope Francis walked in the traditional Ash Wednesday procession to the nearby Dominican-run Basilica of Santa Sabina, on Rome's Aventine Hill, for the Mass.

The pope received ashes on his head from 95-year-old Cardinal Jozef Tomko, titular cardinal of the basilica, and distributed ashes to the cardinals present, as well as to Benedictines from St. Anselm, Dominicans from

Santa Sabina and some laypeople.

In his homily, the pope said that the placing of ashes on the forehead is a reminder that although humanity is merely dust in the earth, it can also become something wondrous "if we allow ourselves to be shaped by the hands of God."

"More often than not, though, especially at times of difficulty and loneliness, we only see our dust. But the Lord encourages us: In his eyes, our littleness is of infinite value. So, let us take heart: We were born to be loved; we were born to be children of God," he said.

Christians are called to avoid "the fleeting realities of this world," which ultimately turn to dust, and instead embrace the life that God wishes to give them, he said.

If a person lives to earn money or seek pleasure, prestige or promotions, he or she is "simply staring at dust," the pope said.

"That is not why we have been put in this world," he said. "We are worth so much more. We live for so much more, for we are meant to make God's dream a reality and to love."

Matthew 4:1-11

We are now in the season of Lent, one of the holiest seasons of the Church year. In the early Church this was a time of intense preparation for Easter when new candidates were brought into the Church through Baptism. These forty days invite us to remember the time when Jesus went into the desert to pray and fast. Like him, each year, we enter a kind of wilderness for forty days to gain strength for living a fuller Christian life. As he did, we want to do all we can to deepen our relationship to God.

Strengthened though his time in the desert, Jesus begins to leave and the Tempter is waiting for him. The forces of evil want to derail him before he can accomplish his Father's will.

Even in this Gospel, temptation is about choosing lesser goods, as it always is. We all have a tendency to compromise. Often, we are faced not with a decision between good and evil, but between

two goods, one greater and one lesser. The lesser good is often wrapped in more beautiful paper.

The three temptations touch on three fears that are common to all of us. The first is our fear about not having enough of something. In this case Jesus was tempted to turn stones into bread. There were lots of stones around him but no bread. It was a powerful temptation. Who wouldn't choose bread over rocks for supper?

The second fear is about the lack of control we have over our lives. We want to be in charge of everything! So will catch you. We all are tempted to have God do our bidding.

The third temptation exposes our fear over not having enough social power. The temptation invites us to rule the world. All we have to do to attain such power is to become a slave to evil.

All these temptations can be wrapped into one huge temptation: Think and act as if you were God and in



total control of everything! Is not that what all of us would like for ourselves? We don't want limits. We want to be in charge. Our "wants" are limitless. We want a new car every year, the latest fashions when they are still fashionable, the best of food and drink, and add to that the best and most recently developed technological what's the cost? We deny what's best and most important in our humanity. To live according to God's plan is a free choice. The Tempter provides us with choices too. It is up to us to discern what a lesser good is. 🍀



This Week with the Saints

March 3 - Saint Katharine Drexel (1858-1955), a wealthy and world heiress from Philadelphia, did not spend her fortune on houses or jewelry, but on the establishment of institutions and missions dedicated to the marginalized. Due to her financial means, she had the privilege of traveling to various parts of the country where she became keenly aware of the oppression of Native Americans and African Americans. She dedicated her entire life, including the founding of a religious community known as the Sisters of the Blessed Sacrament, to the empowerment of these groups through education (that is, launching the first Catholic college for African Americans, and starting 145 Catholic missions and twelve schools for Native Americans). Regarding the purpose of the Sisters of the Blessed Sacrament, St. Katharine said, "Ours is the spirit of the Eucharist - the total gift of self." Katharine died on March 3, 1955 at the age of 96.



March 4 - Saint Casimir (1458-1484) was a prince of Poland and of the Grand Duchy of Lithuania. Born in the royal palace in Krakow, he was heir apparent to the throne. When the king went to Lithuania, Casimir was left in charge of Poland from 1481 to 1483, and it is said that he ruled with great justice and prudence. Casimir was known for his piety and devotion. Weakened by fasting, he developed a lung disease that was probably tuberculosis, and died. St. Casimir is buried in the cathedral of Vilnius, in Lithuania. *Patronage:* Poland; Lithuania

March 7 - Saint Perpetua († 203) was a wealthy noblewoman, the mother of a young son; **Saint Felicity († 203)** was a humble slave girl, who gave birth to a daughter just a few days before she died. The account of the martyrdom of Saints Perpetua and Felicity forms one of the finest pages of the history of the first centuries of the Church. It shows us clearly the wonderful sentiments of these two women when they heard that they had been condemned to the wild beasts. Knowing their own weakness but relying on the strength of Christ, who was fighting with them, they went to their martyrdom as to a triumphant celebration, to which they were invited by Christ. They were exposed to the fury of wild beasts in the amphitheater at Carthage, A.D. 203, and finally killed by the sword. These women, so different in their circumstances, were united in their death. The names of these heroic women are included in the Roman Canon, Eucharistic Prayer I. *Patronage:* mothers

Ashes are also a reminder of the "dust of death" brought on by war and of "lives reduced to ashes," including the lives of those who are unwelcomed, the poor and "the abandoned elderly."

"We continue to destroy ourselves, to return to ashes and dust," the pope said. "Even in the church, the house of God, we have let so much dust collect, the dust of worldliness."

The fire of God's love, he added, is often extinguished by the "ashes of hypocrisy," especially in Christians who do acts of charity, prayer or fasting "only to be recognized, to look good, to satisfy our ego."


"How often do we profess to be Christians, yet in our hearts readily yield to passions that enslave us. How often do we preach one thing and practice another. How many times do we make ourselves look good on the outside while nursing grudges within. How much duplicity do we have in our hearts. All this is dust that besmirches, ashes that extinguish the fire of love," the pope said.

Lent, he said, "is a time of healing" and through contemplating the cross and the sacrament of penance, Christians can encounter God's forgiving love, which "consumes the ashes of our sin."

"The embrace of the Father in confession renews us from inside and purifies our heart," Pope Francis said. "Let us allow ourselves to be loved, so that we can give love in return. Let us allow ourselves to stand up and walk toward Easter. Then we will experience the joy of discovering how God raises us up from our ashes." 🌱
