who has spoken through the prophets.



## THE ASCENSION OF THE LORD

Today, we celebrate the great feast of the Ascension of our Lord, that glorious moment when Jesus, 40 days after His resurrection, was lifted up — quite literally— into heaven, as the Apostles watched in stunned amazement. It is recounted in both our first reading, from Acts, as well as the Gospel passage, from Matthew.

But the first reading tells us that the apostles were not permitted to simply bask in the moment for very long. “While they were looking intently at the sky as he was going, suddenly two men dressed in white garments stood beside them. They said, ‘Men of Galilee, why are you standing there looking at the sky?’” In other words, “Don’t just stand there, do something!”

This verse is a call to each one of us this very day. We have been given every grace and blessing through the Mass and all of the sacraments, through the Word of God, and the rich teachings of our faith.

And like those first apostles, we are not meant to just stand here, but to do something with these gifts — in love and gratitude to the One Who gave them to us. We are called, just as much as the first apostles “to be [His] witnesses... to the ends of the earth,” not with our own power, but through the power of the Holy Spirit in us.



### Guidelines for Public Celebration of the Mass

We kindly ask that you please review and adhere to these guidelines while attending Mass in the Cathedral:

- ❖ The faithful are required to bring their own facemasks and to wear them during Mass.
- ❖ Social distancing is necessary at Mass while seated in the pew and during the Communion procession. Families living in the same household may sit together. We are only able to accommodate 92 people per Mass at the Cathedral. Seating will be on a first come first seated basis. If additional seating is necessary, the overflow crowd will be directed to The Great Hall of Central Catholic High School where the Mass will be live-streamed.
- ❖ Some common, though optional practices of the Mass, will be omitted such as the use of hymnals, holding of hands during the Our Father, the Sign of Peace, and the offering of the Precious Blood of Christ to the faithful.

Please keep in mind that Bishop Brennan has given the faithful of the Diocese the dispensation from the obligation to attend Mass. Therefore, sick persons and those more susceptible to infection – the elderly, those already in frail health – are urged to remain at home and participate in televised or online Masses. Anyone who fears being infected by attending Mass should stay home. Thank you for your patience and devotion during these unprecedented times. Let us continue to keep one another in prayer and fulfill Christ's command to love our neighbor by doing everything we can to keep them safe and healthy.

# SAINT OF THE DAY



### MAY 25 - SAINT BEDE THE VENERABLE (672/73-735)

Venerable Bede was a Benedictine monk at the Abbey of Jarrow in England. He devoted his life to scholarly pursuits, including the study of Scripture, the composition of commentaries based on the ideas of Church Fathers, and extensive research and writings regarding the history of the Church in England. He is credited with educating over 600 monks and popularizing the use of AD (*anno Domini* - "in the year of our Lord" to refer to the Christian era.

### MAY 25 - SAINT GREGORY VII, POPE (1028-1085)

Pope Gregory VII, born Hildebrand of Sovana, joined the Benedictine monks, but was eventually called beyond the cloister to serve the larger church as pope. Recognized as one of the greatest reformer popes, St. Gregory instituted what is known as the Gregorian reform. Through this reform he wanted to end rampant and widespread abuses in the Church.



### MAY 25 - SAINT MARY MAGDALENE DE' PAZZI, VIRGIN (1566-1607)

Mary Magdalene de' Pazzi who was the daughter of a prominent family in Florence. She developed a love of prayer at an early age and began having mystical experiences. Her parents sent her to be educated in a convent but brought her home when they decided she should marry. Fortunately, Mary persuaded them that she had a vocation to be a Carmelite, and they allowed her to return. Her life was marked by prayer, penance, devotion to the Eucharist, and love for the poor.


### MAY 26 - SAINT PHILIP NERI, PRIEST (1515-1595)

Philip Neri was an Italian priest and founder of the Congregation of the Oratory or Oratorians. Philip was known for his joyful spirit, believing that it is more Christian to be cheerful than melancholy. A well-known figure in the Eternal City, he was known as the "Apostle of Rome" during his lifetime. He worked with the youth, finding safe places for them to play. Philip was ahead of his time in urging more frequent reception of Holy Communion, and he introduced the Forty Hours' devotion with exposition of the Blessed Sacrament.



### MAY 27 - SAINT AUGUSTINE OF CANTERBURY, BISHOP (d.604)

Augustine of Canterbury was a Benedictine monk and was named the first archbishop of Canterbury in 598. He was prior of a monastery in Rome when Pope St. Gregory the Great, after seeing blonde Saxon slaves in the market, chose him to lead a mission to England. Augustine worked in Kent in the south of England, and once he converted King Æthelberht, the rest of Kent followed. He died in 604 and was buried in the abbey church at Canterbury, which became a place of pilgrimage. The shrine was destroyed and the relics were lost during the English Reformation.

# Five Ways We Can Keep Growing in Our Spiritual Life

Workshops for teachers, spring training for Baseball players, ongoing courses for professionals, coaching, reviewing, updating, cutting away the dead branches and debris—life demands constant labor to improve, upgrade, and perfect.

Even more important must be the constant labor at ongoing formation for followers of Our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. All of us are a work in progress, an incomplete project, a task that can always be improved.

It is not uncommon for me to meet adults who received a poor catechetical formation at their First Communion, and ever since that day they have had no other spiritual formation until they decided to get married. Upon which they must comply to do a six hour formation class to prepare them for the Sacrament of Marriage, to prepare them to be faithful and loving spouses, to prepare them to be the best of parents. Obviously the church encourages a more complete formation program for its children.

Therefore, here are some practical and concrete steps that we can take to implement an ongoing program of "Permanent Formation".

## Spiritual Readings

Good books should be your best friends. They are

always available and ready to be opened and read. Busy people only have time to read the best of books. St. Teresa of Avila would not admit women into the Carmelite order who could not read; the reason being, the saint knew how much wonderful and inspiring and educational material could be acquired by good reading! Establish your own library of good catholic books!

## Spiritual Direction

Spiritual direction serves to help us to encounter God in our lives, to arrive at self-knowledge, to detect our major spiritual roadblocks, and finally to seek out and find God's will in our lives.

## Spiritual Exercises

God raised up St. Ignatius of Loyola to rescue a world in spiritual decline and spiritual battle. The Holy Spirit inspired him to compose the Rules for Spiritual Discernment, the spiritual masterpiece that has proved to be a precious jewel in spirituality to help us to discern the motions or movements of the good spirit and open our hearts to receive and follow them. By doing the Spiritual Exercises and living out this divinely inspired program of spirituality one ascends from a mediocre, confused, apathetic spiritual life, to a vibrant, growing, dynamic relationship with Jesus

Christ the King, a life-long pursuit of sanctity of life and an authentic witness to the world of holiness.


## Sharing the Faith
