## At The Cathedral

September 1 - 8, 2019



### Twenty-Second Sunday in Ordinary Time

Sirach 3:17-18, 20, 28-29 • Ps 68:4-5, 6-7, 10-11

Hebrews 12:18-19, 22-24 • Luke 14:1, 7-14

Today's readings remind us of a chief virtue that characterizes the Christian disciple: humility. This is a virtue that is widely thought of as a form of self-abasement. That understanding, however, is off the mark. Humility is simply the awareness of who (and Whose) we truly are.

On one hand, we are children of the Most High God who loved us into existence and who, by virtue of our Baptism, have the Holy Trinity dwelling within us. On the other hand, we are children who are completely dependent on God for our existence and for every breath we take.

Our Lord speaks of true humility in our Gospel passage from Luke this Sunday, telling the parable of the guests invited to a wedding banquet and instructing us not to seek a place of honor at the banquet table, lest a more distinguished guest arrives and we are asked to move to a lower place.

Jesus has much more in mind here than an etiquette lesson. He is reminding us that all glory belongs to God. The visual image He offers in having to slink down to a lower seat at the table points out how silly we are when we forget to give God the credit for our blessings and talents.

On the other hand, when we live in humility — recognizing that all we have is a gift from God and using those gifts to serve Him and others — then God “exalts” us by filling us with even more of Himself and His grace.

Jesus goes on to encourage us to serve and share our blessings with people facing circumstances that would make it impossible for them offer us any worldly advantage or prestige— “the poor, the crippled, the lame.”

Our attitude and the way in which we serve and share should be centered on true humility — recognizing that we are all “little” ones in the eyes of God. We are all His children; brothers and sisters invited to our Father's heavenly banquet. 🌿

### Labor Day - September 3

This Monday marks the time when working people around the country come to the end of summer vacation and students return to school. We set aside this day to reflect on the work we do and to reward honest work with a day of rest. Pope Francis tells us that work “expresses the dignity of being created in the image of God. Thus, it is said that work is sacred.” He also said, “At the dawn of creation, God made man the steward of His handiwork and charged him to cultivate and protect it. Human labor is part of that creation and continues God's creative work. This truth leads us to consider work as both a gift and a duty. Indeed, labor is not a mere commodity but has its own inherent dignity and worth.” May Saint Joseph, patron of workers, intercede for those who seek employment and remind all of the dignity of labor.

**Since Labor Day is a Federal Holiday, Mass will be celebrated at the Cathedral at 9:00 a.m.**

Bless, O Lord, the daily work by which men and women provide bread for themselves and their loved ones. We also offer to Your fatherly hands the toil and sacrifices associated with work, in union with Your Son Jesus Christ, Who redeemed human work from the yoke of sin and restored it to its original dignity. On September 15, the Church observes a memorial honoring the Blessed Mother as Our Lady of Sorrows. "And a sword will pierce your own soul, too," Simeon told Mary when she presented the child Jesus in the Temple forty days after his birth (Luke 2:35). That prophecy was fulfilled when Mary stood at the foot of her Son's Cross, sharing his bitter suffering. During the month of September, we honor Mary under the title of Our Lady of Sorrows. This month, let us bring to Mary all our sorrows, knowing that she understands what it is to truly suffer. This month is a good time to draw closer to our Blessed Mother by meditating on the great hymn to the Mother of Sorrows, the *Stabat Mater*.

# Lofty titles do not guarantee entrance to heaven, pope says

ROME - A life marked by humility, faith and love determines whether Christians enter heaven, not who they know, Pope Francis said.

Before praying the Angelus prayer with pilgrims gathered in St. Peter's Square on Sunday, August 25, the pope said that the Lord will recognize those worthy of experiencing eternal joy if they have lived "a life of faith that translates into deeds" and not whether they have attended conferences or rubbed shoulders with church leaders.

"The Lord does not recognize us by our titles," he said. "Look, Lord, I belonged to this association; I was a friend of that bishop, of that cardinal, of that priest.' No, titles do not count; they do not count," he said.

Greeting pilgrims after the prayer, Francis had special words of welcome for the new seminarians, most from the United States, beginning their studies at the Pontifical North American College in Rome.

The pope urged the men to maintain a strong commitment to their spiritual lives and "fidelity to Christ, to the Gospel and to the magisterium of the

Church. Without building on these columns, it will be impossible to truly construct your vocation."

In his main talk, the pope reflected on the Sunday Gospel reading from St. Luke in which Jesus, while preaching in a village, is asked if only a few people will be saved.

Jesus' response, the pope explained, doesn't focus on how many will be admitted into heaven but rather on the duty of God's children to "strive to enter through the narrow gate."

"With these words, Jesus makes it clear that it isn't a question of numbers, there isn't a limited number in paradise! But it is a matter of following the right path now, and this right path is for everyone, but it is narrow," he said.

The pope said that Jesus doesn't deceive his followers and tell them that the path to heaven is "a beautiful highway with a large door at the end," but rather is a confined passageway.

To save oneself, he explained, "one must love God and neighbor, and this is not comfortable."

"It is a 'narrow gate' because it is demanding; love is always demanding,

it requires commitment, indeed, an 'effort,' that is, a firm and persevering will to live according to the Gospel," the pope said. "St. Paul calls it 'the good fight of faith.' It takes an effort every day to love God and one's neighbor."

To obtain the joy of heaven, Francis said, Christians are called to be in communion with Christ by praying and receiving the sacraments and reading the Word of God which "keeps us in faith, nourishes our hope and revives charity." 🌟

**Bishop Bernard W. Schmitt, the seventh Bishop of Wheeling-Charleston, undertook extensive renovations and restorations to repair the building's interior finishes and adapt the interior to contemporary liturgical needs. This project included: cleaning and conservation of murals and restoration of the painting of the interior; construction of liturgical furnishings to match original woodwork; installation of handicapped accessibility throughout the interior and exterior; new heating, cooling, electrical, lighting, and sound systems; construction of new baptismal fountain; restoration of floor tile and slate on altar platforms, refinishing floor under the pews; and construction of an addition with a kitchen and restrooms, and restoration of courtyard. This period of restoration was completed in 1996.**

**Luke 14:1, 7-14**

There was a time when social graces were highly valued. The name Emily Post was well known to many because of her book on etiquette. She described what would be considered good manners in public society. In today's Gospel reading Jesus was not teaching etiquette about what to do when you attend a wedding banquet, which for him was a very important image for describing life in God's Kingdom. On one level, it seems that he was simply offering some practical advice on good manners. In those days where one sat at the table mirrored one's social status. Higher places were for top elected officials, Hollywood stars, and the "well-to-do." The rest were assigned to "lower places."

How embarrassing would it be if you took a high place and were then told to go to the lower seat? That's

the practical side. But, as is usual, Jesus was really telling us something important about how things are with God. God has favorites too, but they may be different from the people we think are his favorites. Jesus always has a way of turning things upside down, as he does here.

In family life, we seek to make present the ideas and values of Jesus. We love each other because we are members of the same family and because we are sisters and brothers in Christ. What Jesus proposes in today's Gospel reading is that when we enter the Kingdom, we need to wait for the "master of the feast" to assign us our positions and know that God will keep the feast open to everyone.

There's also an important family message. We are all equal in God's eyes. Wives are equal to husbands, and children to their parents. That's part of the radical teaching of the Gospel. God



equally loves us all, no matter what our social standing, our background, our condition, or our gifts and talents. This is hard for a society built on individualism and personal accomplishment to understand. But that's what you see in good families: a profound acceptance and love for all family members, along with a spreading of a similar attitude outside the family. All are welcomed and all are loved, no matter what their place in society. "the narrow gate." 🌱

# This Week with the Saints

**September 3 - Saint Gregory the Great** († 387) was a mayor, a monk, a pope and a writer. Unhappy with his life as mayor of Rome, St. Gregory allocated half his fortune to the poor and the other half to the foundation of seven monasteries. After joining a monastery in pursuit of a simple life, he was elected to the papacy. As pope, he cared for the poor, implemented the Gregorian reforms to improve Church governance and clerical behavior, promoted the monastic vocation, and renewed the liturgy. His name is associated with Gregorian chant (plainsong) and Eucharistic Prayer II (along with St. Hippolytus). A prolific writer and Doctor of the Church, St. Gregory composed numerous theological texts and is cited 374 times in St. Thomas Aquinas' *Summa Theologiae*.

He will share his missionary experience at all the Masses this weekend and will make an appeal on behalf of the Vincentian Missions. The Vincentian Missionaries need our help to carry out their many missionary, educational and charitable activities in their missions. They also request our special financial support for the training of young men studying for priesthood. There will be special collection today to help the Missionary work of the Vincentian Missionaries. We urge you to be very generous in your mission offering since these Missionaries need our help.

Started in 1904 at Thottakom in the Syro-Malabar Archdiocese of Emakulam, Kerala, India, as a clerical society, the Vincentian Congregation made rapid progress during the past years. Wherever there was a call from the poor, they responded promptly with the limited resources at their disposal and God's blessing showered on them abundantly. Soon Vincentian mission centers and charitable institutions were established in all the Southern states of India and in a few North Indian States. Their Missionaries were sent to Africa as well. In 1968 the Congregation was raised to the status of Pontifical Right. In 1990, with a view of further growth and efficient service to the poor, the congregation was divided into three provinces. Mary Matha Province is placed under the special protection of Mary, the Mother of God.
