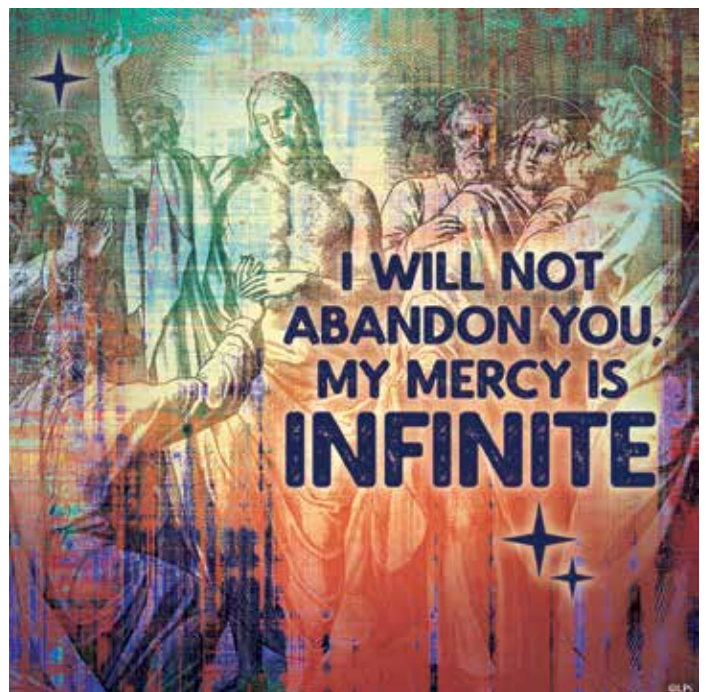

## Pope's Representative to Celebrate Centennial Mass

**On Tuesday, April 21 at 5:00 p.m.**, we will celebrate the 100th Anniversary of the Dedication of our Cathedral with a solemn Mass marking this historic milestone in the life of our parish and Diocese.

His Eminence Christophe Cardinal Pierre, Apostolic Nuncio to the United States and the Holy Father's representative in our country, will serve as the principal celebrant. A native of France, Cardinal Pierre has spent decades in the service of the Holy See as a diplomat, representing the Church in countries around the world before being appointed to the United States in 2016. In this role, he serves as a vital link between the Holy Father and the Church in our nation.



He will be joined by Bishop Mark Brennan, visiting bishops, and clergy, religious, and faithful from across the Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston.

The presence of the Apostolic Nuncio highlights the importance of this occasion and the Cathedral's role as the Mother Church of our Diocese.

## Plenary Indulgence Granted for Cathedral Centennial Year

**In a special spiritual gift for the faithful, Pope Leo XIV has granted a Plenary Indulgence for the Centennial Year, from April 21, 2026 through April 21, 2027.**

A plenary indulgence is the full remission of the temporal punishment due to sin. The faithful may obtain it by making a devout visit to the Cathedral during the Centennial Year and fulfilling the usual conditions: sacramental Confession, reception of Holy Communion, prayer for the intentions of the Holy Father, and complete detachment from sin.

This extraordinary gift of grace is an invitation to renew our faith, to seek the Lord's mercy more deeply, and to share in the spiritual fruits of this historic anniversary.

## The Heart of Christ Opened for Us Returning to the Source of Mercy and Peace

In the stillness of Holy Saturday night, something remarkable happens. A new fire is kindled, and from that flame the Paschal Candle is lit. In a darkened church, that single light begins to spread, quietly and steadily, until the entire space is filled with its glow. It is a powerful reminder that no darkness, no matter how deep, can overcome the light of the Risen Christ.

That same light leads us into the celebration of Divine Mercy Sunday, the great feast that concludes the Octave of Easter. It is a day that draws our attention to the heart of the Resurrection itself, the mercy of God poured out for a wounded world.

When Jesus rose from the dead, He did not leave His wounds behind. He carried them into eternity. And from those sacred wounds flows mercy. The Gospel for this Sunday shows the Risen Lord appearing to His disciples, offering them peace, and inviting Thomas to touch His side. These wounds are not signs of defeat, they are the very source of our healing.

The image of Divine Mercy, revealed to St. Faustina Kowalska, captures this beautifully. From the pierced side of Christ flow two rays, one pale and one red, symbolizing the water of Baptism and the Blood of the Eucharist. These are not abstract symbols. They are the means by which Christ continues to pour His mercy into our lives.

Jesus spoke to St. Faustina with words that still echo today: "I desire that the Feast of Mercy be a refuge and shelter for all souls, and especially for poor sinners... I pour out a whole ocean of graces upon those souls who approach the fount of My mercy" (Diary, 699). This is the heart of Divine Mercy Sunday, an open invitation to return to Him without fear.

And that is often the hardest part.

So many people carry the weight of past sins, regrets, and failures. We convince ourselves that we have gone too far, that we are beyond forgiveness. But Divine Mercy Sunday stands as a clear and powerful answer to that fear. There is no sin greater than God's mercy. No wound that He cannot heal.



The Church, in her wisdom, encourages us on this day to approach the sacraments, especially Confession and the Eucharist. Here, the mercy of Christ is not just remembered, it is received. We encounter the same Jesus who stood before His disciples and said, "Peace be with you."

Divine Mercy is not only something we receive, it is something we are called to share. Having experienced the compassion of Christ, we are sent out to be instruments of that same mercy in the lives of others, through patience, forgiveness, and acts of charity.

As we celebrate this beautiful feast, the invitation is simple. Do not be afraid to draw near. Go to the merciful heart of Jesus. Trust in His love. And allow His mercy to bring light into every place of darkness within you.

Because in the end, mercy is not just one aspect of God's love.

It is the way He chooses to meet us.

JESUS I TRUST IN YOU

The Divine Mercy devotion is a powerful reminder of God's boundless love, revealed to St. Faustina Kowalska in the 1930s. Through her, Jesus invited the world to trust in His mercy—especially for sinners and those in greatest need.

At the center of the devotion is the Divine Mercy image of Jesus with rays of red and pale light shining from His heart, representing the blood and water that flowed from His side. The words beneath the image, "Jesus, I trust in You," express the heart of the devotion: deep trust in God's mercy and a call to be merciful to others.

The Divine Mercy Chaplet, prayed using the rosary, is a powerful intercession for the whole world. Jesus promised special graces to those who pray it with trust.

**The Divine Mercy Novena began on Good Friday and leads up to Divine Mercy Sunday (the Second Sunday of Easter).** Each day of the novena has a unique intention given by Jesus, including prayers for sinners, priests, and those who have lost faith.

More than a devotion, Divine Mercy is a way of life—living with trust in God and showing mercy to others. In a world so wounded, the message remains urgent and clear: *Jesus, I trust in You!*

## April Month of the Holy Eucharist

The month of April is dedicated to devotion to the Holy Eucharist. This tradition has developed because Easter Sunday often falls in April, and when it does fall in March, the Easter season continues on through all of April. In essence, April is a month of Easter, and during the Easter celebration we remember the Eucharistic sacrifice Christ gave us and the baptism in the Holy Spirit, which would come after Jesus's resurrection.

At the Last Supper, surrounded by His Apostles, Jesus gave to the world the most sublime gift of His Real Presence by instituting the Sacrament of the Eucharist – His Body, Blood, Soul, and Divinity. Jesus took bread and pronounced the words: "Take and eat, this is my Body"; then He took a cup of wine and said: "Take and drink, this is my Blood. Do this in memory of me." With these words Jesus instituted the greatest of all of the Sacraments, the Sacrament of the most Holy Eucharist.

### Ways to Honor the Holy Eucharist

- Truly prepare yourself to receive Christ in the Holy Eucharist by arriving early to Mass and spending time in prayer.
- Spend time in Eucharistic Adoration
- If you are not in the state of grace before receiving Holy Communion, go to confession

## SAINT OF THE WEEK

### St. Benedict Joseph Labre (1748–1783)

*Feast Day: April 16*

Saint Benedict Joseph Labre was a French layman known for his radical poverty, deep prayer, and life as a pilgrim. After several attempts to enter religious life, he discerned that God was calling him instead to a hidden vocation of holiness in the world.



He spent years traveling to shrines across Europe, often living on the streets, begging for food, and dedicating long hours to prayer before the Blessed Sacrament. Despite his outward poverty and hardships, he was known for his gentle spirit, humility, and profound union with God.

Benedict died in Rome at the age of 35 and was quickly recognized for his holiness. He is the patron saint of the homeless and pilgrims, reminding us that true riches are found in God alone.

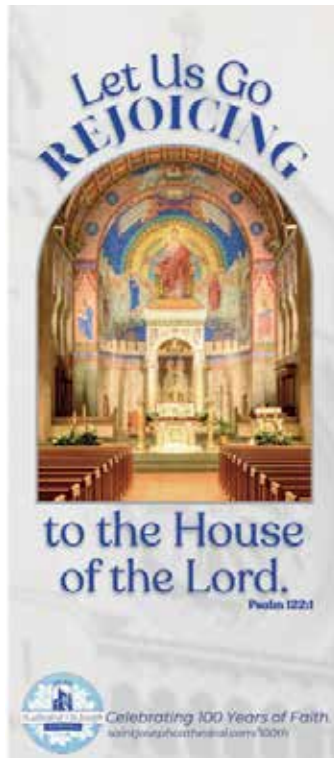
### Ways to include the Cathedral in your estate plans:

## WHY DO WE DO THAT?

### Catholic Life Explained:

#### Divine Mercy

#### Question:

Where did the feast of Divine Mercy come from?

#### Answer:

If you were born well before the year 2000, you know the feast of Divine Mercy has not always been celebrated in the Church. In the early 1900s, a young Polish nun began receiving private revelations. Jesus appeared to her during her times of prayer, speaking a message of mercy and love for the world. She received a set of prayers — the Divine Mercy Chaplet — and the request to have a feast day established to remind the Church of the mercy of God. St. Faustina died in 1938, on the cusp of war and in the midst of one of the most violent centuries in the history of the world.

Her story and her diaries began circulating in Poland and beyond. It quickly became apparent that this was a holy young woman, and the cause for her canonization opened. In the year 2000, she was canonized by the first-ever Polish pope, St. John Paul II. On her canonization day, he established the second Sunday of Easter as Divine Mercy Sunday, “a perennial invitation to the Christian world to face, with confidence in divine benevolence, the difficulties and trials that mankind with experience in the years to come.”
