RECTOR'S REFLECTIONS

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

In today's Gospel, the disciples on the Road to Emmaus come to recognize the Risen Lord in the breaking of the bread. What begins in confusion and sorrow is transformed into joy and mission. Their hearts burn within them as they encounter Christ, and they return with renewed faith.

This Gospel speaks beautifully to us this week, as we prepare to celebrate a truly historic moment in the life of our Cathedral and our Diocese.

This Tuesday, April 21, the Cathedral of St. Joseph marks the 100th Anniversary of its Dedication. Pope's Representative to Celebrate Centennial Mass

On Tuesday, April 21 at 5:00 p.m., we will celebrate the 100th Anniversary of the Dedication of our Cathedral with a solemn Mass marking this historic milestone in the life of our parish and Diocese.

His Eminence Christophe Cardinal Pierre, Apostolic Nuncio to the United States and the Holy Father's representative in our country, will serve as the principal celebrant. A native of France, Cardinal Pierre has spent decades in the service of the Holy See as a diplomat, representing the Church in countries around the world before being appointed to the United States in 2016. In this role, he serves as a vital link between the Holy Father and the Church in our nation.



He will be joined by Bishop Mark Brennan, visiting bishops, and clergy, religious, and faithful from across the Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston.

The presence of the Apostolic Nuncio highlights the importance of this occasion and the Cathedral's role as the Mother Church of our Diocese.

Plenary Indulgence Granted for Cathedral Centennial Year

In a special spiritual gift for the faithful, Pope Leo XIV has granted a Plenary Indulgence for the Centennial Year, from April 21, 2026 through April 21, 2027.

A plenary indulgence is the full remission of the temporal punishment due to sin. The faithful may obtain it by making a devout visit to the Cathedral during the Centennial Year and fulfilling the usual conditions: sacramental Confession, reception of Holy Communion, prayer for the intentions of the Holy Father, and complete detachment from sin.

This extraordinary gift of grace is an invitation to renew our faith, to seek the Lord's mercy more deeply, and to share in the spiritual fruits of this historic anniversary.

A History of Our Cathedral

A Legacy of Faith, Beauty, and the Presence of God

The Cathedral of St. Joseph stands as the mother church and liturgical center of the Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston, serving the Catholic faithful throughout West Virginia. At the heart of this sacred building is the cathedra, the bishop's official teaching chair. This chair not only gives the Cathedral its name but also symbolizes unity in apostolic faith, reminding all who gather here that they are part of the one Church founded by Christ.

The present Cathedral is the second church to occupy this site. In 1847, St. James Church was relocated here, and in 1850 it became the Cathedral when the Diocese of Wheeling was established. Bishop Richard Vincent Whelan served as its first bishop. Reminders of this original dedication remain, especially in the Cathedral Rectory, where the pilgrim shell of St. James appears throughout the first floor.

In 1872, Bishop Whelan petitioned Rome to change the Cathedral's title to honor Saint Joseph, reflecting a growing devotion to him and the needs of the Catholic faithful in the region.

Plans for a new Cathedral emerged in the late 19th century but were delayed until after World War I. Bishop Patrick J. Donahue began the effort, but his death in 1922 halted progress. A devastating fire in 1923 severely damaged the original structure, clearing the way for a new Cathedral.

Bishop John J. Swint took up the project with determination, working with architect Edward J. Weber. He envisioned a Cathedral that would stand for centuries as a lasting legacy of faith. The cornerstone was laid on May 5, 1924, and the Cathedral was solemnly dedicated on April 21, 1926.

The Cathedral is built in the Lombard Romanesque style, inspired by churches of northern Italy. Its design follows a modified basilica plan in the shape of a cross, with a great dome rising 148 feet above the crossing. Massive limestone arches and columns give the structure a sense of strength and permanence,

drawing the eye upward toward heaven. The interior is rich with sacred art. The façade features carvings of St. Joseph and symbolic depictions of Christ and the Evangelists. Inside, the original cathedra remains in the sanctuary, carved in red oak and adorned with symbols of Christ's Passion.



The stained glass windows by George Sotter depict scenes from the life of St. Joseph and the unity of the Old and New Testaments. The murals by Felix B. Lief-tuchter transform the Cathedral into a vision of heaven, with Christ enthroned among the saints and angels in adoration.

The high altar and baldachin remain central, crafted from marble sourced across Europe. Renovations following the Second Vatican Council brought the altar forward, while later restorations, especially in 1996, preserved the Cathedral's beauty and improved its functionality. Additional work in 2012 ensured new elements harmonized with the original design.

Today, the Cathedral of St. Joseph stands as a place of prayer, worship, and encounter with God. Built through the faith and sacrifice of those who came before us, it continues to serve as a lasting sign of the Church's presence and mission, a sacred place where heaven and earth meet.

LIVING OUR FAITH

What is a Cathedral?

From the earliest days of the Church, Christians gathered to “break the bread,” listening to the Word of God as it was proclaimed from what St. Justin Martyr, writing in the 2nd century, beautifully called the “memoirs of the Apostles,” the Gospels. In those first centuries, the Eucharist was most often celebrated in private homes, especially those of wealthier members of the community. Because of persecution, these “house churches” were simple and discreet, often unadorned from the outside, though the interior spaces reserved for worship sometimes featured modest frescoes of the Good Shepherd or figures from the Old Testament.

This changed dramatically after the Edict of Milan in 313 AD, when the Emperor Constantine granted Christians the freedom to worship openly. As the number of believers grew, so too did the need for larger spaces. Christians began to adopt and adapt public buildings, especially Roman basilicas, for worship. These structures, originally used as courts or civic halls, became places of sacred gathering and were often referred to as *domus ecclesiae*, meaning “house of the Church.” This expression reminds us that the Church is not merely a building, but the living Body of Christ, the people of God themselves.

In each city, the principal church was the one where the bishop, the successor of the Apostles, presided. This church came to be known as the Cathedral, from the *cathedra*, or bishop’s chair. In Rome, Constantine donated land for the Cathedral of the Bishop of Rome, which remains to this day the Archbasilica of St. John Lateran, the mother church of all churches.

As Christian communities expanded, additional churches were established in surrounding areas. Priests, as collaborators with the bishop, were sent to celebrate the Eucharist in these communities. To maintain unity, a small fragment of the consecrated host from the bishop’s Mass was sent to these churches and placed into the chalice, a powerful sign of communion with the bishop.

In this way, the early Church lived out the words of St. Ignatius of Antioch: “Where the bishop is, there is the Church.”

April Month of the Holy Eucharist

The month of April is dedicated to devotion to the Holy Eucharist. This tradition has developed because Easter Sunday often falls in April, and when it does fall in March, the Easter season continues on through all of April. In essence, April is a month of Easter, and during the Easter celebration we remember the Eucharistic sacrifice Christ gave us and the baptism in the Holy Spirit, which would come after Jesus’s resurrection.

At the Last Supper, surrounded by His Apostles, Jesus gave to the world the most sublime gift of His Real Presence by instituting the Sacrament of the Eucharist – His Body, Blood, Soul, and Divinity. Jesus took bread and pronounced the words: “Take and eat, this is my Body”; then He took a cup of wine and said: “Take and drink, this is my Blood. Do this in memory of me.” With these words Jesus instituted the greatest of all of the Sacraments, the Sacrament of the most Holy Eucharist.

Ways to Honor the Holy Eucharist

- Truly prepare yourself to receive Christ in the Holy Eucharist by arriving early to Mass and spending time in prayer.
- Spend time in Eucharistic Adoration
- If you are not in the state of grace before receiving Holy Communion, go to confession

SAINT OF THE WEEK

St. Conrad of Parzham (1818–1894)

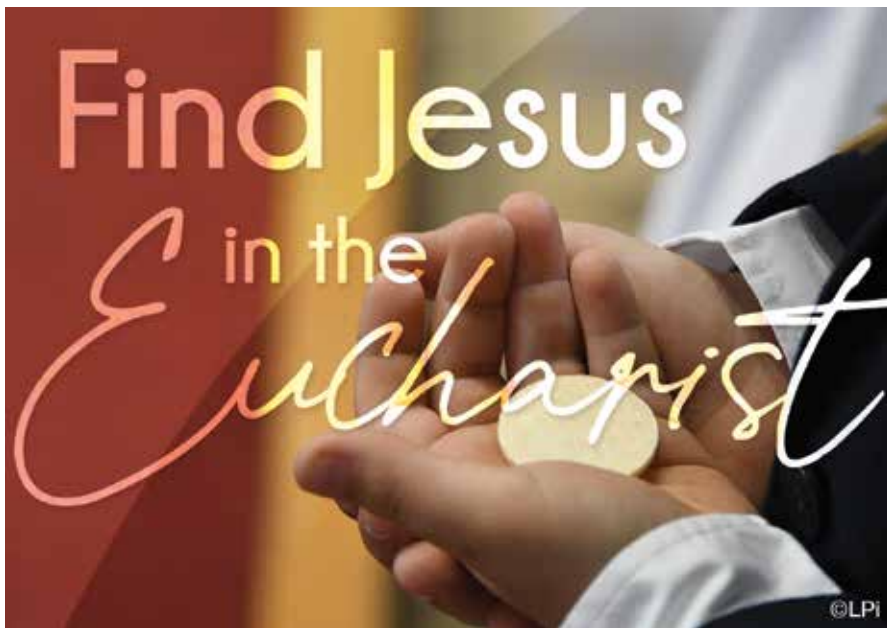
Feast Day: April 21

Saint Conrad of Parzham was a Capuchin Franciscan lay brother known for his humility, kindness, and faithful service. Born in Bavaria, Germany, he worked as a farmer before entering the Capuchin order after the death of his parents.

For over 40 years, he served as porter at the friary in Altötting, welcoming visitors, caring for the poor, and assisting those in need. Though his work was simple, Conrad carried it out with great love, patience, and a deep spirit of prayer. He had a strong devotion to the Blessed Sacrament and the Blessed Virgin Mary, drawing strength from time spent before the Lord. Canonized in 1934, he is a model of holiness in ordinary, everyday duties.

WHY DO WE DO THAT? Catholic Life Explained: *Pilgrimages*

Question:

What is a pilgrimage? Why do people go on them?

Answer:

A pilgrimage is a spiritual journey to visit a holy site, such as the shrine of a saint, a place where the Blessed Virgin Mary has appeared, or an historic church or chapel. What makes a pilgrimage different from a vacation and a pilgrim distinct from a tourist is the spirit in which the journey is made. Pilgrimages are really a symbol of our spiritual journey in life, reminding us that this world is not our true home and that we spend our lives journeying to our homeland, which is the Kingdom of God.

Pilgrimages — which can be as involved as a trip to Rome or the Holy Land or as simple as visiting the Blessed Sacrament in a local parish church — are also an opportunity for us to step out of the rhythms and limits of our daily lives to seek out connection with God in a special way, by visiting a holy place. At times, such as on a special feast, a jubilee, or the anniversary of the dedication of the church, special graces (called “indulgences”) can also be offered to pilgrims, helping to enrich our experience of the celebration.

In the end, pilgrimages are an ancient act of devotion and something that each of us can put into practice, helping us to discover how God is present in the world around us, in places both near and far.

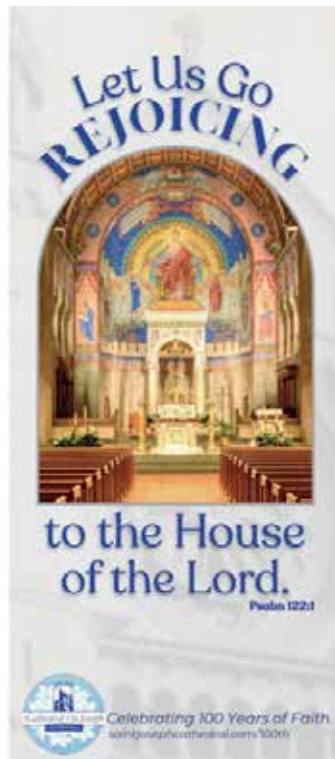

Outcome:

1. Identify ethical challenges that frequently arise during discharge planning involving older adults with continuing care needs, with attention to organizational duties concerning family caregivers, and to how these challenges differ from treatment decision-making and duties concerning surrogate decision-makers.
2. Analyze and discuss burdens that are frequently transferred to family caregivers during the discharge process, and the ethical implications of shifting burdens from institutions to families.
3.
