RECTOR'S REFLECTIONS

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

"Why do you seek the living one among the dead? He is not here, but has been raised" (Luke 24:5-6). These words, spoken by the angels at the empty tomb, changed everything. They announce the victory of life over death, light over darkness, and hope over despair. Jesus Christ is risen! Alleluia!

On this joyful day, we proclaim that Christ is our hope, and that hope is not just a feeling, it is a person, risen and alive! In this Jubilee Year of Hope, the Resurrection reminds us that no matter how heavy our burdens or how deep our sorrows, God's love is stronger. The tomb is empty, and the gates of heaven are open.

LIVING OUR FAITH

Living the Joy of the Resurrection Celebrating the Octave and the Season of Easter

With the whole Church, we rejoice in Christ's Resurrection! Easter isn't just a single day—it's a season of joy. For fifty days, from Easter Sunday to Pentecost, the Church celebrates the victory of Christ over sin and death.

The first eight days, known as the Easter Octave, are celebrated as one great feast. Each day is a solemnity, a "little Easter," echoing the joy of that first morning when the tomb was found empty. These days are named "Monday in the Octave of Easter," "Tuesday in the Octave of Easter," and so on, leading up to Divine Mercy Sunday, the Octave Day of Easter.

The Church, like a wise mother, knows our hearts need time to absorb such joy. That's why Easter is prolonged—to help us truly enter into the mystery of the Resurrection and its power in our lives, especially through the grace of Baptism.

How can you celebrate the Easter Octave?

- Attend daily Mass during the Octave, if possible.
- Pray the Regina Caeli
- Read the Resurrection accounts in the Gospels
- Share a meal with family or friends in Christian joy
- Perform an act of mercy in honor of Divine Mercy Sunday

Let us live this week as an extended celebration of Christ's victory—joyful, prayerful, and filled with Easter hope.

Regina caeli

O Queen of Heaven

(Prayed in place of the *Angelus* during Eastertide)

V. Queen of Heaven, rejoice, alleluia.
R. For He whom you did merit to bear, alleluia.

V. Has risen, as he said, alleluia.
R. Pray for us to God, alleluia.

V. Rejoice and be glad, O Virgin Mary, alleluia.
R. For the Lord has truly risen, alleluia.

Let us pray. O God, who gave joy to the world through the resurrection of Thy Son, our Lord Jesus Christ, grant we beseech Thee, that through the intercession of the Virgin Mary, His Mother, we may obtain the joys of everlasting life. Through the same Christ our Lord.
R. Amen.



The Divine Mercy devotion is a powerful reminder of God's boundless love, revealed to St. Faustina Kowalska in the 1930s. Through her, Jesus invited the world to trust in His mercy—especially for sinners and those in greatest need.

At the center of the devotion is the Divine Mercy image of Jesus with rays of red and pale light shining from His heart, representing the blood and water that flowed from His side. The words beneath the image, "Jesus, I trust in You," express the heart of the devotion: deep trust in God's mercy and a call to be merciful to others.

The Divine Mercy Chaplet, prayed using the rosary, is a powerful intercession for the whole world. Jesus promised special graces to those who pray it with trust.

The Divine Mercy Novena begins on Good Friday and leads up to Divine Mercy Sunday (the Second Sunday of Easter). Each day of the novena has a unique intention given by Jesus, including prayers for sinners, priests, and those who have lost faith.

More than a devotion, Divine Mercy is a way of life—living with trust in God and showing mercy to others. In a world so wounded, the message remains urgent and clear: *Jesus, I trust in You!*

CARLO ACUTIS: ROADMAP TO REALITY

"The film also tracks the journey of a group of high school students who embark on a two-week pilgrimage from North Dakota to Italy to visit Carlo's tomb. A requirement for their pilgrimage: disengage from technology and leave their phones at home (for two weeks)."

"In a world losing itself to screens, teenage mystic Carlo Acutis saw beyond our social media-addicted society and offered an answer—if we're willing to listen. Carlo Acutis: Roadmap to Reality explores the life of the first millennial saint while following teens on a phone-free pilgrimage to his tomb, immersing them in his story, his passion for Christ, and a search for meaning in a digital age," notes producers of the film.

In a recent survey of WV Catholics, it was reported that the overwhelming majority cherish their faith, but only 18% feel comfortable talking about it, said Fr. John Rice in a recent homily at Mass for the Chancery staff.

WHY DO WE DO THAT?

Catholic Life Explained:

Discernment

Question:

How do I discern if a call to do something big is really from God?

Answer:

Each day we face plenty of decisions about following God: whether or not to pray, how to treat people, and how to prioritize our time. Sometimes there can be something much more significant we discern: a vocational call, a promotion at work that requires a move, or a new ministry position at church. In addition to a pro-con list or a cost-benefit analysis, here are a few things to prayerfully consider and to talk over with trusted individuals.

Does it conform to God's will revealed in the Church? God doesn't call us to do something that contradicts the moral law. Will it encourage spiritual growth? Sometimes we need to choose between multiple good options. Consider the personal impact on you and others you are responsible for, like family. Other times we might be invited to do good for others, but when we assess our other life commitments, we see that saying yes to this would actually impede our prior responsibilities in the long run. Does the call seem consistent? This isn't to say that God won't do something new. Even so, consider if the call is consistent with your gifts and abilities. Can you see a "through-line" so to speak, with how your experiences have led you to this point? Do others confirm it? Share your reflections with trusted, insightful confidantes. Have they seen the same things you have, or are they bringing up new points to consider? Humbly add their relevant points to your considerations. Don't forget your gut. After you've carefully considered everything in your mind, don't neglect your instincts. Does your heart say yes or no?

Our beautiful Cathedral, rich in history and faith, needs essential repairs to preserve it for future generations. Three critical projects have been identified:

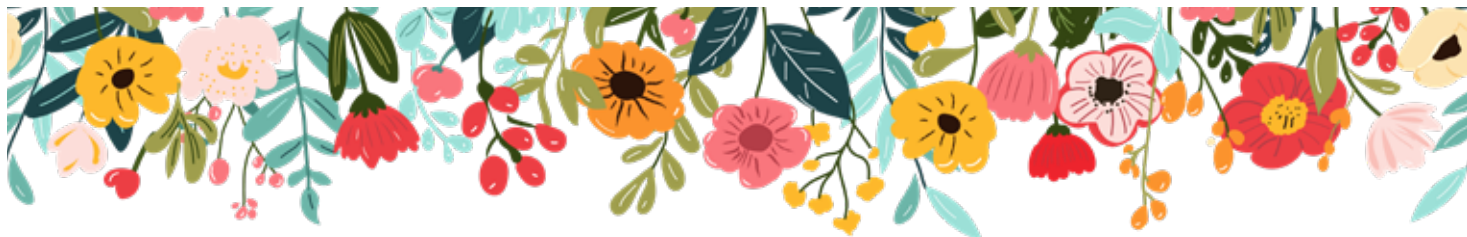
Roof Repairs: A major leak threatens interior damage — estimated at \$145,000

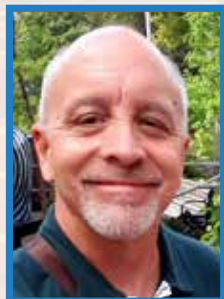
