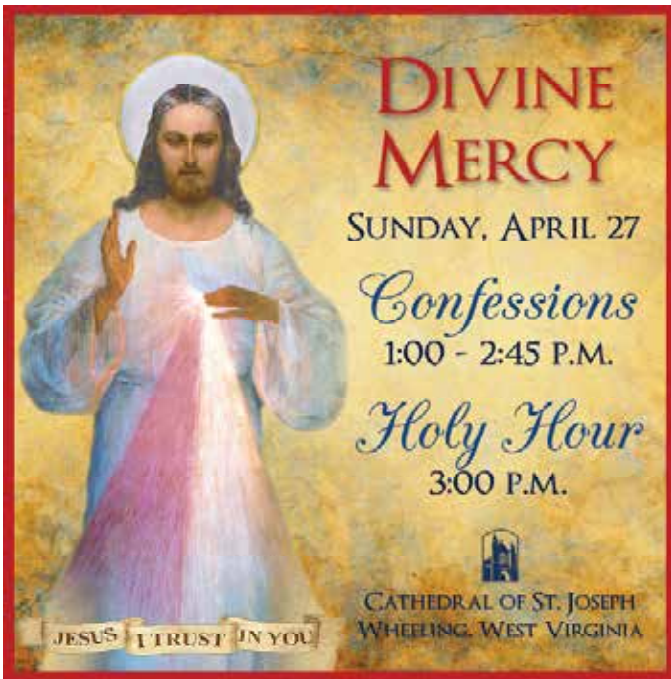

Solemnity of the Dedication of the Cathedral Observed This Year on Monday, April 28

On April 28, we celebrate the 99th Anniversary of the Dedication of the Cathedral of Saint Joseph (transferred from April 21 due to the Octave of Easter). This date is a Solemnity at the Cathedral and a feast for all parishes in the Diocese—a moment to honor our sacred identity and the generations of faith that have shaped our local Church.



Originally titled to Saint James the Apostle, the Cathedral was moved to its present location in 1847. In 1872, Bishop Richard V. Whelan—our first bishop—petitioned Rome to change its patron to Saint Joseph, reflecting growing devotion to the saint and the needs of the faithful.

A devastating fire in 1923 paved the way for a new Cathedral under Bishop John J. Swint, working with architect Edward J. Weber. Inspired by Italian

churches like San Pietro in Toscanella and Santa Maria del Fiore in Florence, the new Lombard Romanesque structure was completed in just two years and dedicated on April 21, 1926.

Next year, on April 21, 2026, we will celebrate the 100th Anniversary of that dedication. Special liturgies and commemorative events are being planned. Stay tuned—our Centennial celebration is just around the corner!

Holy Thursday Pilgrimage

"Stay with Me." On Holy Thursday evening, pilgrims from across our community came together for beautiful tradition of faith and devotion. After the Mass of the Lord's Supper at the Cathedral, we journeyed to six local churches, pausing in prayer at each Altar of Repose. With hearts united in silent adoration, we accompanied Jesus in the Garden, honoring His final hours with reverence and love.

In Loving Memory of Pope Francis

Remembering a Shepherd of Mercy, Joy, and Hope

On Easter Monday, April 21, 2025, the world lost a beloved and transformative leader, Pope Francis, who passed away after a profoundly impactful papacy. Known for his humility, compassion, and unwavering commitment to the marginalized, Pope Francis leaves behind a remarkable legacy of mercy, joy, and hope. His teachings and example continue to inspire the Church and the world.

A Life of Service and Humility

Born on December 17, 1936, in Buenos Aires, Argentina, Jorge Mario Bergoglio was the eldest of five children in an Italian immigrant family. He joined the Society of Jesus (Jesuits) and was ordained a priest in 1969. He later became the Archbishop of Buenos Aires, where he was known for his pastoral care, simplicity, and strong dedication to serving the poor and vulnerable. He was made a cardinal in 2001 by Pope John Paul II.



Pope Francis was elected the 266th pope of the Catholic Church on March 13, 2013. His choice of the papal name "Francis" reflected his devotion to St. Francis of Assisi, a saint known for his humility, poverty, and love of all creation. His election marked the first time a pope came from the Americas and the first Jesuit pope in history.

A Pontificate Rooted in Mercy

Pope Francis dedicated his papacy to promoting God's boundless mercy, captured in his motto *Miserando atque eligendo*—"by having mercy and by choosing him." He called the Church to focus on mercy, embracing the wounded and offering healing. His emphasis on mercy became central to his pontificate, particularly through

the establishment of the Extraordinary Jubilee Year of Mercy in 2015, which invited all Catholics to experience and share God's mercy.

A Pope for the Poor and the Vulnerable

Pope Francis' commitment to the poor was evident throughout his life, and this commitment shaped his papacy. He repeatedly called for a "preferential option for the poor" and worked tirelessly to address poverty, inequality, and the issues facing the marginalized. He famously washed the feet of prisoners and refugees as an exam-

ple of Christ's love for the least among us. His encyclical *Laudato Si'* also emphasized the need for global solidarity and care for creation, underscoring that environmental justice is deeply connected to social justice.

Witness to the Joy of the Gospel
Pope Francis believed the Gospel should be preached with joy and lived out with enthusiasm. In his apostolic exhortation *Evangelii Gaudium* (The Joy of the Gospel), he called for a renewed missionary spirit within the Church, urging Catholics to go beyond self-preservation and engage in active evangelization. He invited the faithful to spread the Good News with joy, compassion, and an openness to others.

A Legacy of Hope for the Church and the World

Pope Francis' papacy left a profound mark on the global Church. Through his writings, speeches, and actions, he consistently called for peace, justice, and reconciliation. His message of hope encouraged people worldwide to build a more just and merciful society, especially through acts of kindness, charity, and reconciliation. His commitment to interfaith dialogue and his efforts to foster peace among world religions were also central aspects of his papacy.

A Worker for Peace and Reconciliation

Pope Francis worked tirelessly to promote peace and understanding in a divided world. He led efforts to foster unity, including his historic outreach to other Christian denominations and his dialogue with non-Christian faiths. His meetings with world leaders, including his landmark 2016 visit to Cuba and his

efforts in promoting peace between Israel and Palestine, were part of his broader vision for global peace.

As we mourn his loss, we are called to reflect on his words: "The Church's mission is not to condemn anyone forever; it is to pour out the balm of God's mercy on all those who ask for it with a sincere heart." His example of love, humility, and service will continue to guide the Church in its mission of evangelization and mercy.

Eternal rest grant unto him, O Lord, and let perpetual light shine upon him. May he rest in peace. Amen.

A Prayer for Pope Francis and for the Election of a New Pope

Heavenly Father,
we come before You with hearts both sorrowful and grateful.
We mourn the passing of Your servant, Pope Francis,

WHY DO WE DO THAT? Catholic Life Explained: *Sede Vacante*

Question:

What happens in the Church when the Pope dies, and who is in charge until a new Pope is elected?

Answer:

The Latin phrase *sede vacante* means “the seat being vacant,” referring to the period when the papal office is empty following the death (or resignation) of the pope. It is a time marked by solemn mourning, deep reflection, and prayerful anticipation throughout the Church. The death of the pope is officially confirmed by the Camerlengo—the Cardinal who oversees the Church’s temporal affairs during this transition. He is responsible for verifying the pope’s death, sealing the papal apartments, and organizing the burial rites and the preparations for the conclave.

While the *sede vacante* lasts, the ordinary governance of the Church is handled by the College of Cardinals, but they cannot make decisions that are reserved to the pope. The Camerlengo coordinates practical matters and ensures the continuity of administration, but no major changes in Church teaching or structure can occur until a new pope is elected.

This time invites all the faithful to reflect on the gift of the papacy, to honor the legacy of the pope who has passed, and to pray for the cardinals who will soon gather in conclave to choose a new successor to St. Peter. As we await the words *Habemus Papam*—“We have a Pope!”—we entrust the Church to the guidance of the Holy Spirit.

Roof Repairs: A major leak threatens interior damage — estimated at \$145,000

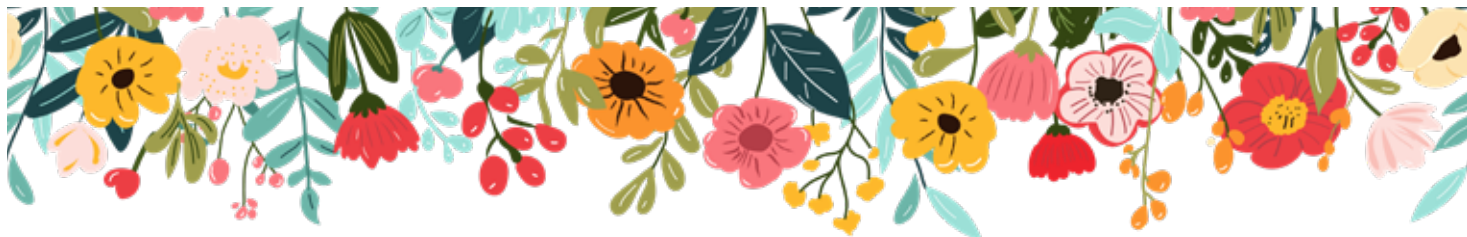
Wall Repairs: Cracked limestone near a transept window needs urgent repair — \$9,680

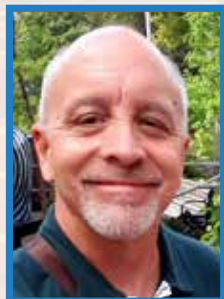
