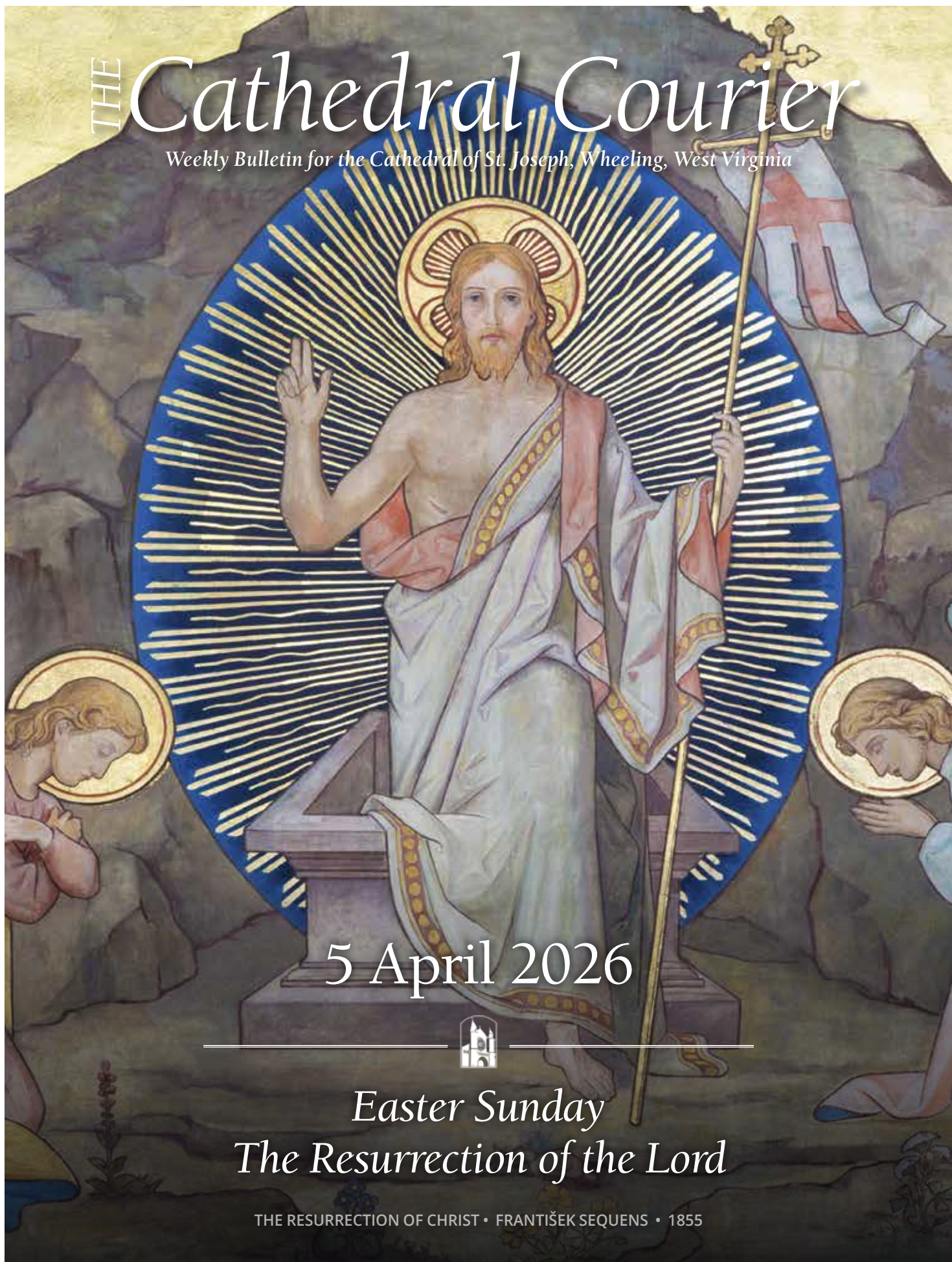

Easter: A Hope That Does Not Disappoint

Living the Joy of the Resurrection in a Broken World

On Easter Sunday, the Church proclaims the most important truth in human history: Jesus Christ is risen from the dead.

This is not simply a beautiful idea or a comforting symbol. It is a real event that has forever changed the world. The tomb is empty. Death has been conquered. And because Christ lives, hope is no longer wishful thinking, it is certain.

We live in a world that often feels heavy with darkness. We see war, violence, division, and unrest. We experience personal struggles, uncertainty, and loss. It can be easy to wonder where hope is to be found.

Easter answers that question.

Hope is found in the Risen Christ.

The Resurrection tells us that no darkness is final. No suffering is meaningless. No sin has the last word. What looked like defeat on Good Friday has become victory on Easter morning. This is the hope that the world cannot give, and the world cannot take away.

St. John Paul II once said, "We are an Easter people and Alleluia is our song." Those words are more than poetic. They are a call to live differently. As Christians, we are not meant to be people of despair or fear. We are called to live with a deep and abiding joy, even in the midst of difficulty, because we know how the story ends.

That joy is not shallow or naive. It is rooted in the certainty that Christ is alive and present. It is a quiet confidence that God is at work, even when we cannot see it clearly. It is the strength to keep going, to keep loving, to keep believing.

And this hope is not distant. It is given to us in a very real and tangible way, especially in the Eucharist.

Every time we come to Mass, we encounter the same Jesus who rose from the dead. The Eucharist is not a reminder of something long ago. It is the living presence of the Risen Lord. He comes to us, Body, Blood, Soul, and Divinity, to strengthen us, to nourish us, and to fill us with His life.

In the Eucharist, the hope of Easter becomes personal.

Easter also sends us out on mission. The first witnesses of the Resurrection did not keep the news to themselves. They ran to share it. In the same way, we are called to be bearers of hope in our homes, our workplaces, and our communities. A word of encouragement, an act of charity, a quiet witness of faith, these become ways that the light of the Resurrection continues to shine in the world today.

As we celebrate this great feast, we are invited not only to rejoice, but to live as people of the Resurrection. To bring hope into places of despair. To bring peace where there is conflict. To carry the light of Christ into a world that needs it so desperately.

Easter is not just a day. It is a way of life.

Christ is risen. And because He is risen, there is always hope.

LIVING OUR FAITH

Living the Joy of the Resurrection Celebrating the Octave and the Season of Easter

With the whole Church, we rejoice in Christ's Resurrection! Easter isn't just a single day—it's a season of joy. For fifty days, from Easter Sunday to Pentecost, the Church celebrates the victory of Christ over sin and death.

The first eight days, known as the Easter Octave, are celebrated as one great feast. Each day is a solemnity, a "little Easter," echoing the joy of that first morning when the tomb was found empty. These days are named "Monday in the Octave of Easter," "Tuesday in the Octave of Easter," and so on, leading up to Divine Mercy Sunday, the Octave Day of Easter.

The Church, like a wise mother, knows our hearts need time to absorb such joy. That's why Easter is prolonged—to help us truly enter into the mystery of the Resurrection and its power in our lives, especially through the grace of Baptism.

How can you celebrate the Easter Octave?

- Attend daily Mass during the Octave, if possible.
- Pray the Regina Caeli
- Read the Resurrection accounts in the Gospels
- Share a meal with family or friends in Christian joy
- Perform an act of mercy in honor of Divine Mercy Sunday

Let us live this week as an extended celebration of Christ's victory—joyful, prayerful, and filled with Easter hope.

O Queen of Heaven

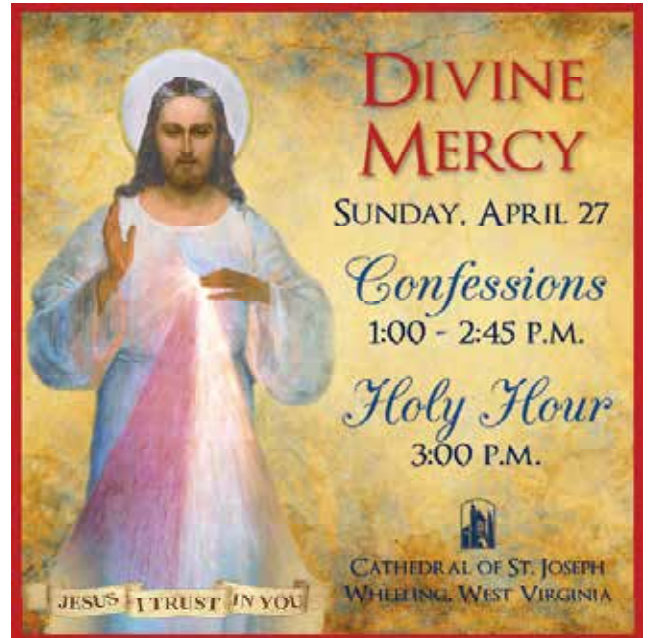
(Prayed in place of the *Angelus* during Eastertide)

V. Queen of Heaven, rejoice, alleluia.
R. For He whom you did merit to bear, alleluia.

V. Has risen, as he said, alleluia.
R. Pray for us to God, alleluia.

V. Rejoice and be glad, O Virgin Mary, alleluia.
R. For the Lord has truly risen, alleluia.

Let us pray. O God, who gave joy to the world through the resurrection of Thy Son, our Lord Jesus Christ, grant we beseech Thee, that through the intercession of the Virgin Mary, His Mother, we may obtain the joys of everlasting life. Through the same Christ our Lord.

The Divine Mercy devotion is a powerful reminder of God's boundless love, revealed to St. Faustina Kowalska in the 1930s. Through her, Jesus invited the world to trust in His mercy—especially for sinners and those in greatest need.

At the center of the devotion is the Divine Mercy image of Jesus with rays of red and pale light shining from His heart, representing the blood and water that flowed from His side. The words beneath the image, "Jesus, I trust in You," express the heart of the devotion: deep trust in God's mercy and a call to be merciful to others.

The Divine Mercy Chaplet, prayed using the rosary, is a powerful intercession for the whole world. Jesus promised special graces to those who pray it with trust.

The Divine Mercy Novena begins on Good Friday and leads up to Divine Mercy Sunday (the Second Sunday of Easter). Each day of the novena has a unique intention given by Jesus, including prayers for sinners, priests, and those who have lost faith.

More than a devotion, Divine Mercy is a way of life—living with trust in God and showing mercy to others. In a world so wounded, the message remains urgent and clear: *Jesus, I trust in You!*

WHY DO WE DO THAT?
Catholic Life Explained:
Easter Season

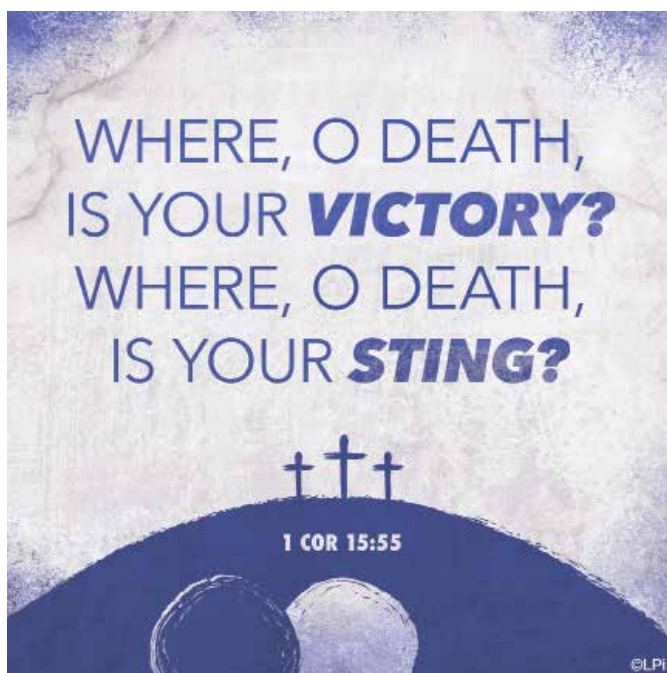
Question:

Why is the Easter season so long? And should we be doing something special for it?

Answer:

You've probably noticed the priest continuing to wear white vestments at the Sunday liturgy. While we celebrated Christ's resurrection several weeks ago, the Easter season extends fifty days — just over seven weeks — from Easter Sunday to Pentecost. For most of that time — about six weeks — Jesus is still with the disciples, teaching and encouraging them. The Easter season isn't just a celebration of when Jesus is with us. At the Last Supper, Jesus promised to send an "advocate" or "counselor" when he left. At the Ascension, he directs the disciples to await "power from on high" — the coming of the Holy Spirit. The Ascension completes the Paschal Mystery, beginning with Jesus' suffering and death and continuing in the resurrection. But the Holy Spirit ushers in a new era for the Church.

After spending weeks in prayer, fasting, and service during Lent, it may seem odd that we don't widely have similar practices for Easter. That doesn't mean you can't embrace the season! Commit to taking moments of little joy throughout the weeks, like random acts of kindness towards others. Consider reading the Acts of the Apostles to learn more about the early Church or picking up an Easter devotional to pray with. He is still risen indeed!
