Dear Friends in Christ Jesus,

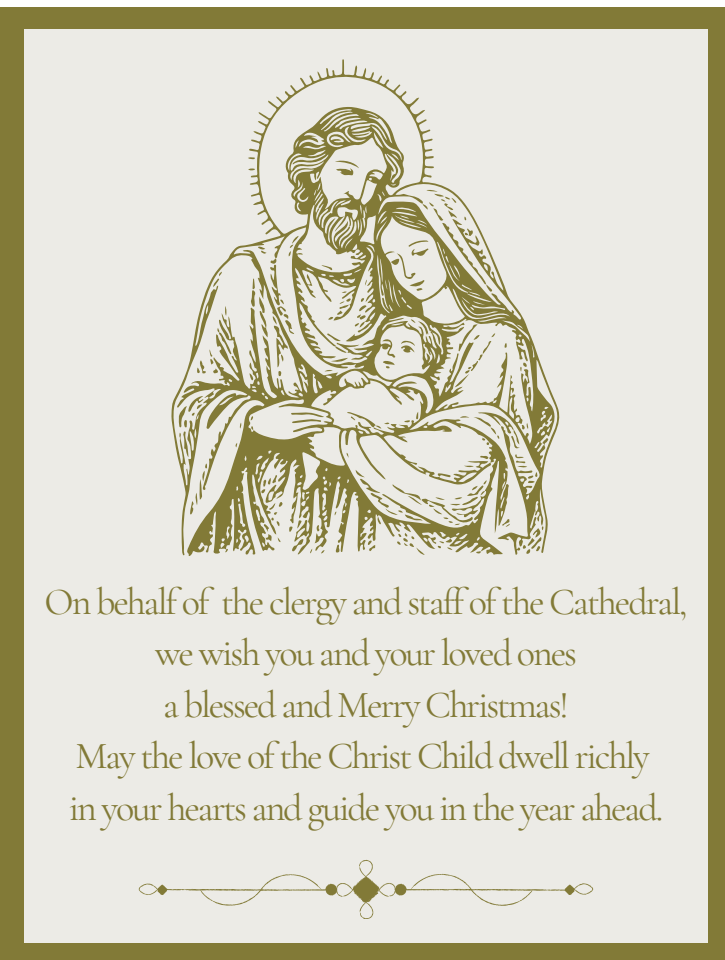

Maintenance & Restoration Update

We are pleased to share that several much-needed maintenance and repair projects are now underway at the Cathedral. Two sections of the roof over the Upper Sanctuary, which had been causing the most interior damage, have been completed. Additional exterior work is scheduled to begin on January 5, weather permitting, with a lift on site to address areas in need of attention.

Looking ahead, during the second week of January, interior scaffolding will be installed to support important restoration work inside the Cathedral. This will include cleaning the four main columns that support the dome, restoration of the Apse mural and work in both transepts. Further plaster repair and painting of the men's and women's restrooms is planned for the spring. We are grateful for your patience and generous support as we care for this sacred space entrusted to us.

Making this a Eucharistic Christmas

Welcoming Christ Who Comes to Feed His People

Each Christmas, we rejoice in the mystery of the Word made flesh. God enters human history, not in power or splendor, but as a child laid in a manger. Yet the Church invites us to go even deeper. Christmas is not only about remembering Christ's birth long ago, it is about welcoming Him here and now. One of the most profound ways to do this is to make Christmas intentionally Eucharistic.

The Eucharist is the Church's greatest treasure. It is not a symbol or a reminder alone, but Jesus Christ Himself, truly present, Body, Blood, Soul, and Divinity. What we celebrate at Christmas is inseparable from what we celebrate at every Mass. The same Jesus born of the Virgin Mary, wrapped in swaddling clothes, and laid in a manger, is the Jesus who comes to us under the humble appearances of bread and wine.

Saint John Paul II expressed this truth clearly: "The Church draws her life from the Eucharist." This is not poetic language alone. It is a statement of faith. Without the Eucharist, the Church would lose her heart. With the Eucharist, Christ remains with His people always.

Even the place of Jesus' birth points us toward this mystery. Bethlehem means "House of Bread." It is no accident that the Bread of Life first appears in the House of Bread. The child placed in a manger, a feeding trough for animals, will one day say, "I am the living bread that came down from heaven." From the very beginning, Christ comes to feed us, not only with teaching or example, but with His very self.

The humility of Christmas prepares us to understand the humility of the Eucharist. Just as many failed to recognize the Messiah because He came as a helpless infant, many still struggle to recognize Him hidden under ordinary signs. Yet faith teaches us to see more deeply. Saint Thomas Aquinas, whose Eucharistic hymns the Church still sings, wrote: "Sight, touch, taste are all deceived in their judgment of Thee, but hearing



suffices firmly to believe." We do not rely on appearances. We rely on Christ's own promise.

Making this a Eucharistic Christmas means allowing the mystery of Christ's presence to shape our celebrations. It means making room for Mass amid the busyness of the season, not as an obligation, but as an encounter. It means approaching the altar with reverence, gratitude, and awe. It means recognizing that the greatest gift we receive at Christmas is not found under the tree, but upon the altar.

It also means letting the Eucharist transform how we live. Christ gives Himself to us so that we, in turn, might become gifts for others. The One who comes to feed us sends us forth to feed the hungry, console the sorrowful, forgive generously, and love sacrificially. A Eucharistic Christmas does not end at the church doors. It flows into our homes, our relationships, and our daily lives.

At Christmas, we proclaim that Emmanuel, God-with-us, has come. In the Eucharist, we proclaim that He remains. May this Christmas renew our wonder at that astounding gift. May we kneel with the shepherds, adore with the Magi, and receive with faith the Bread of Life, born for us in Bethlehem, given for us on the altar, and offered to us as food for eternal life.

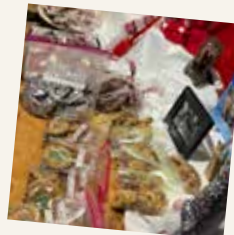
Rosary Altar Society

SAINT OF THE WEEK

St. Peter Canisius (1521-1597)

Feast Day: December 21

Saint Peter Canisius was a Jesuit priest, theologian, and Doctor of the Church who played a central role in renewing the Catholic faith during the Protestant Reformation. Born in the Netherlands, he joined the Society of Jesus early in its history and became known for his clarity of teaching and pastoral charity.



He traveled tirelessly throughout Germany, Austria, and Switzerland, preaching, teaching, and strengthening Catholic education. His Catechism, written in clear and accessible language, helped form generations of Catholics and remains one of the most influential catechetical works in Church history.

Known for his gentle approach and deep love for Christ and the Church, Peter Canisius showed that truth is best taught with patience and charity.

WHY DO WE DO THAT?

Catholic Life Explained:

Christmas Tree

Question:

Is the Christmas Tree a Christian tradition?

Answer:

The Christmas Tree, as Christians know it today, is a thoroughly Christian symbol that developed over time and was given a clear Christian meaning. While evergreen branches were sometimes used in pre-Christian cultures as signs of life during winter, the Church did what she has often done: she purified and transformed what was natural and familiar, filling it with the light of Christ. By the Middle Ages, Christians in Germany were using evergreen trees in connection with Christmas and Paradise plays, seeing in them a sign of the Tree of Life restored to us through Jesus Christ.

For Christians, the evergreen tree points to eternal life. Even in the dead of winter, it remains green, reminding us that in the Incarnation, God entered our fallen world to bring life that does not fade. The lights placed upon the tree recall Christ as the Light of the world, shining in the darkness, while the ornaments and gifts speak of the joy, beauty, and generosity that flow from God's great gift to us, His Son.

When placed in our homes, the Christmas Tree becomes more than decoration. It stands as a quiet proclamation of faith, rooted in hope and pointing toward heaven. Gathered around it, especially in prayer, families are reminded that Christmas is not merely a season, but a mystery: God with us, bringing life, light, and salvation to the world.

A Christmas Message, 2025

Dear members of the household of the faith,

As we move into the last days of Advent and see the great feast of Christmas just ahead, I want to extend to you my hope that you and your loved ones will experience a renewal of your faith and love during this holy season.

Remember what we celebrate: *God so loved the world that He gave His only Son, that anyone who believes in him might not perish but might have eternal life* [John 3:16]. This is no small matter. God became man in Jesus so that our twin enemies, sin and death, might be defeated and we might become by grace the holy children of God we were created to be and inherit the fullness of eternal life.

In a world full of conflict and suffering, what God has done – what Jesus preached and the Church continues to proclaim – is truly good news. It's too good to keep to ourselves. I urge you to speak to others of your faith in Jesus Christ when opportunities present themselves and tell them how your relationship with him within the Church he founded has brought you strength and blessings. *Do not be afraid*, says the Lord; *From now on you will be catching men* [and women and children, too! Luke 5:10]. If a fisherman, at times headstrong, at times timid, could tell others of Christ, so can you and I.

A beautiful Christmas carol begins: "It came upon a midnight clear that glorious song of old, from angels bending near the earth to touch their harps of gold: Peace on the earth, goodwill to men, from heaven's all-gracious King. The world in solemn stillness lay to hear the angels sing." It is Jesus our Lord who brings peace to human beings, both the inner peace that comes from a clear conscience and trust in God, and peace among people, who learn to forsake jealousy and violence and embrace friendship and mutual aid. It is that Lord whom we must serve and whom we must make known to others.

Hear the angels sing once again of our Savior's birth. Rejoice that God has not abandoned us even if we have so often abandoned Him. Love is at the core of God's being. Let us learn from Him to love and to share with others the faith that is fulfilled by love.
