Dear Friends in Christ Jesus,

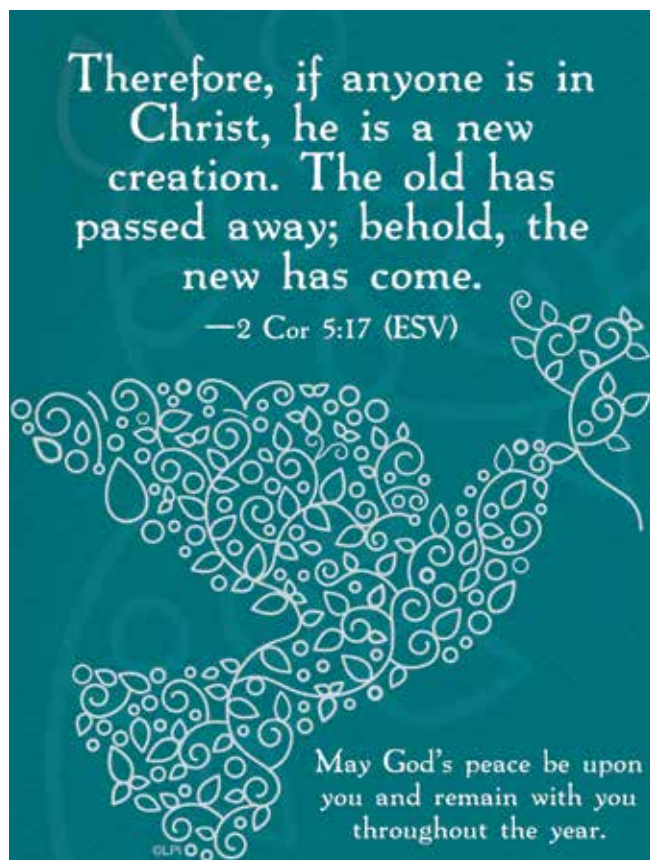



Maintenance & Restoration Update

We are pleased to share that several much-needed maintenance and repair projects are now underway at the Cathedral. Two sections of the roof over the Upper Sanctuary, which had been causing the most interior damage, have been completed. Additional exterior work is scheduled to begin on January 5, weather permitting, with a lift on site to address areas in need of attention.

Looking ahead, during the second week of January, interior scaffolding will be installed to support important restoration work inside the Cathedral. This will include cleaning the four main columns that support the dome, restoration of the Apse mural and work in both transepts. Further plaster repair and painting of the men's and women's restrooms is planned for the spring. We are grateful for your patience and generous support as we care for this sacred space entrusted to us.

Celebrating the Close of the Jubilee Year Walking Forward as Pilgrims Renewed in Faith and Hope

Throughout her history, the Church has observed Jubilee Years as sacred times of grace, renewal, and conversion. Rooted in the biblical tradition of Jubilee, these holy years invite the faithful to return to the heart of the Gospel through prayer, the sacraments, works of mercy, and renewed trust in God's promises. They remind us that the Church is always on pilgrimage, called to move forward in faith and hope.

The recently celebrated Jubilee Year was shaped by a theme chosen by the late Pope Francis, who invited the Church to become "Pilgrims of Hope." In a world marked by uncertainty, division, and suffering, he recognized hope as a virtue deeply needed. Christian hope, he taught, is not wishful thinking, but confident trust rooted in God's faithfulness.

In his papal bull proclaiming the Jubilee, *Spes Non Confundit* ("Hope Does Not Disappoint"), Pope Francis reflected on the universal human experience of hoping for good things even when the future is unclear. Hope, he wrote, dwells quietly in every human heart as a desire for goodness yet to come. Those words resonated deeply as the Church entered a year marked by both gratitude and transition.

This Jubilee Year became especially meaningful in the life of the Church. During it, Catholics around the world prayerfully bid farewell to Pope Francis, giving thanks for his pastoral leadership, humility, and constant call to mercy. At the same time, the Jubilee opened a new chapter as the Church welcomed Pope Leo XIV, the first American to serve as Successor of Saint Peter.

Preaching during the Jubilee of Prisoners Mass on December 14 at the Vatican, Pope Leo captured the heart of the holy year when he reminded the faithful that the Jubilee is never merely symbolic. "The Jubilee is a call to conversion," he said, "and, as such, it is a source of hope and joy." His words affirmed the Church's belief that true hope flows from repentance, mercy, and renewed life in Christ.

Jubilee Years matter because they refocus the Church on what is essential. They draw us back to the sacraments, especially Reconciliation and the Eucharist. They urge us toward charity and concern for those who suffer. They remind us that hope is not an idea, but a way of living shaped by faith.

Here in our local Church, the Jubilee Year in the Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston concludes on December 28,

2025, with a Closing Mass celebrated by Bishop Mark Brennan at the Cathedral of St. Joseph. While the diocesan observance comes to an end, the universal Jubilee will continue a little longer. On January 6, 2026, the Solemnity of the Epiphany, Pope Leo XIV will close the final Holy Door at Saint Peter's Basilica in Rome, bringing the Jubilee of Hope to its conclusion for the universal Church.

As this Jubilee Year draws to a close, we carry forward the graces we have received, renewed in our mission to live and witness to the hope that does not disappoint. May we continue our pilgrimage with faith, mercy, and confidence in the Lord who is always faithful.

Throughout the month of January, we give special honor to the Most Holy Name of Jesus. Saint Paul wrote to the Philippians: "At the name of Jesus every knee should bend, in heaven and on earth and under the earth, and every tongue should confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father" (Philippians 2:10-11). We hold the name of Jesus in special reverence. The very name of Jesus is a prayer.

A Way to Honor the Holy Name of Jesus

Adopt the pious practice (that used to be more widely practiced and is so meaningful and fitting) of bowing your head whenever you say or hear the name of Jesus (just as we should bow or genuflect before the Real Presence in the tabernacle or make a sign of the cross as we pass a Catholic Church). The Council of Lyons in 1274 stated: "Each should fulfill in himself that which is written for all, that at the Name of Jesus every knee should bow; whenever that glorious Name is recalled, especially during the sacred Mysteries of the Mass, everyone should bow the knees of his heart, which he can do even by a bow of his head." This devotion also helps to make amends for blasphemous use of the Holy Name.

SAINT OF THE WEEK

St. Sylvester I (d. 335)

Feast Day: December 31

Saint Sylvester I served as pope during a pivotal moment in Church history, following the legalization of Christianity under Emperor Constantine. His pontificate coincided with a time of peace and growth for the Church after centuries of persecution.



Although he did not personally attend the Council of Nicaea in 325, Pope Sylvester sent representatives, and the council's teachings helped clarify the Church's faith, especially regarding the divinity of Christ. During his time as pope, major churches were built in Rome, including the Lateran Basilica and the original Basilica of Saint Peter.

Saint Sylvester's leadership helped guide the Church from persecution into public witness and stability.

WHY DO WE DO THAT?

Catholic Life Explained:

Christmas Octave

Question:

What is the Octave of Christmas, and why does the Church celebrate it?

Answer:

The Octave of Christmas is the Church's way of savoring the great mystery of the Lord's birth rather than rushing past it. From December 25 through January 1, the Church celebrates Christmas as one continuous "great day," recognizing that the Incarnation of Jesus Christ is too profound to be contained in a single feast. By extending Christmas over eight days, the Church invites the faithful to linger in wonder at the Word made flesh, God dwelling among us.

Within the Octave, each day unfolds another facet of the mystery. We honor saints closely connected to the birth of Christ, such as Saint Stephen, Saint John the Evangelist, and the Holy Innocents, reminding us that the joy of Christmas is inseparable from the call to witness, sacrifice, and faithful love. The Octave concludes on January 1 with the Solemnity of Mary, the Holy Mother of God, drawing our gaze to the one through whom Christ entered the world and who continues to lead us to her Son.

The Octave of Christmas teaches us that the joy of Christmas is meant to shape our lives, not just mark a moment on the calendar. By praying, worshiping, and living these eight days with intention, we learn to carry the light of Christ beyond the manger and into the ordinary days of our lives, allowing the mystery of the Incarnation to transform us from within.
