RECTOR'S REFLECTIONS

Dear Friends in Christ Jesus,

In today's Gospel, we hear the words of Jesus in the Sermon on the Plain. He pronounces blessings and woes, calling us to live in a way that reflects His values, not the world's. "Blessed are you who are poor, for the Kingdom of God is yours. Blessed are you who are hungry now, for you will be satisfied" (Lk 6:20-21). 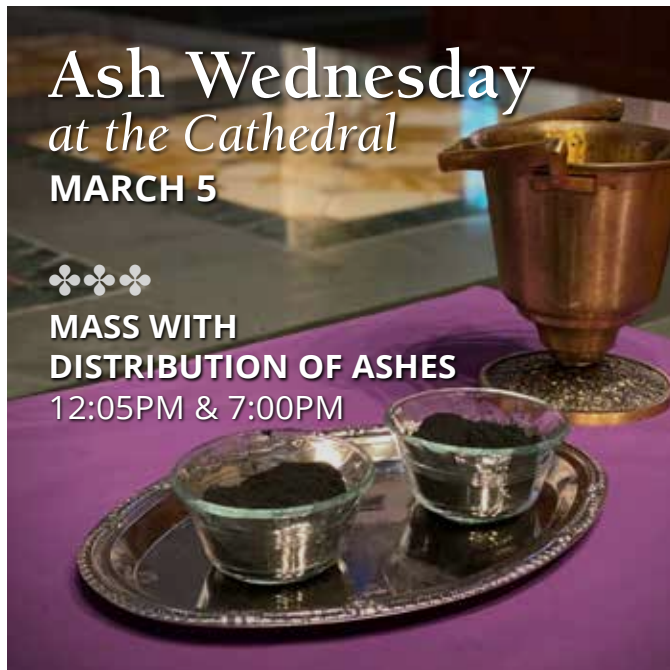

St. Gianna Pro-Life Ministry

Pro-Life Frequently Asked Questions - and Answers

Q) What is pro-life?

A) Pro-life is both a ministry and movement which protects and supports the survival and dignity of all human persons, from the moment of natural conception through natural death. Most of our work is done to support parents in unplanned pregnancies, with all that entails.

Q) How do you provide this protection and support?

A) The St. Gianna Pro-Life ministry does this work on a foundation of prayer, done in various ways. With this grounding, we support direct care ministries to pregnant & parenting folks, especially teens and young adults, by partnering with local ministry associates. We also do education and training, witness and advocacy; fund and resource raising.

Q) Why doesn't the Cathedral have a pro-choice group?

A) We work to create a culture of life, in which people's responsible sexual stewardship prevents crisis pregnancies. When such a pregnancy does occur, we support the welfare of all stakeholders, especially the infants in the womb. Jesus said, "Whatever you do for the least of these, you do for me." (Matt. 25:40) This is Church teaching about the sanctity of life.

Q) How does the St. Gianna Pro-Life Ministry differ from Walking with Moms in Need?

A) Walking with Moms in Need is a whole-parish ministry started by the USSCB several years ago. It serves the two-fold purpose of serving parents (and grandparents) who need extra supports in raising their infants, which parishes can so lovingly provide – leading us to purpose two: reinvigorating the parish by their involvement in this ministry. There is considerable overlap in the two ministries. The difference in the St. Gianna ministry is that it is done by a dedicated committee of folks, and its work is broader in scope. The second answer, above, tells a bit about this work.

Q) Why is the St. Gianna ministry at both the Cathedral and St. Alphonsus parish?

A) When Fr. Pen and Fr. Soplinski were sent to serve these two parishes, Fr. Pen immediately saw the wisdom of doing this ministry jointly. We're glad for this, because we are able to accomplish so much more together!

SAINT OF THE WEEK

St. Peter Damian (1007-1072)

Feast Day: February 21

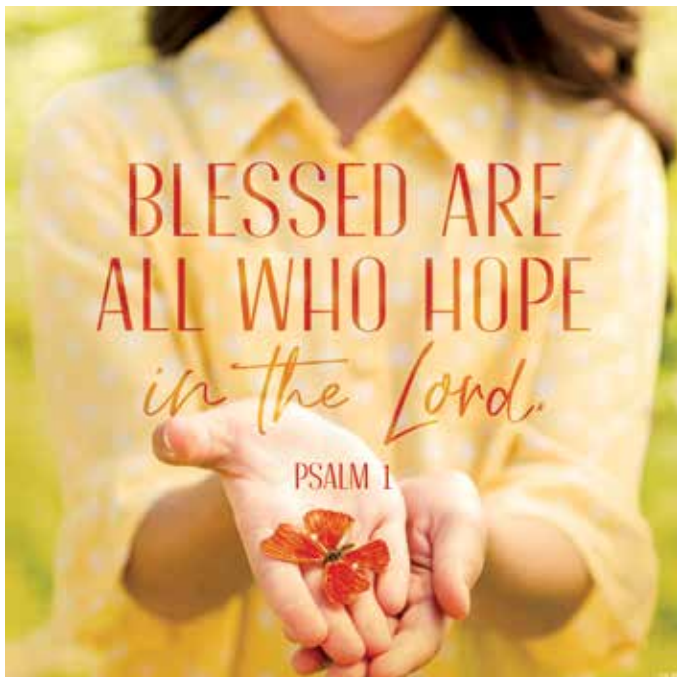
St. Peter Damian was a Benedictine monk, reformer, and Doctor of the Church who worked tirelessly to restore holiness and discipline in the Church. Born in Italy, he overcame early hardships and became a brilliant scholar before entering monastic life, seeking solitude and deep prayer.



As a Benedictine abbot, he promoted strict spiritual discipline, emphasizing humility, penance, and devotion. Called by the pope to assist in Church reform, he fought against corruption, clerical immorality, and laxity in religious life. Though he longed for a quiet monastic life, he served as a papal advisor and peacemaker, always placing God's will above his own desires.

Honored for his writings and dedication to Church renewal, he was declared a Doctor of the Church in 1828. His feast day is February 21.

CATHEDRAL MAINTENANCE FUND

Our beautiful Cathedral, rich in history and faith, is in need of some important repairs and upgrades to preserve its integrity for future generations. The Diocesan Office of Buildings and Properties and our Cathedral Finance Council has identified three critical maintenance projects that require attention:

Roof Repairs: A significant leak in the roof, especially problematic during strong winds, threatens further interior damage. The estimated repair is around \$145,000.

Wall Repairs: Cracked limestone near one of the transept windows needs urgent attention to prevent further deterioration. The estimated cost for this repair is \$9,680.

HVAC System Replacement: Our air conditioning system is aging, and the refrigerant it uses is now obsolete. The air handlers are nearing the end of their lifespan, with an estimated replacement cost of approximately \$250,000.

WHY DO WE DO THAT?

Catholic Life Explained:

Indulgences and Confession

Question:

Is Confession necessary to obtain a plenary indulgence if a person has no mortal sins and their venial sins have already been forgiven at Mass?

Answer:

First, let's look at what a plenary indulgence is: it is the full remission of the temporal punishment due to sins that have already been forgiven. This grace, offered by the Church, helps the faithful grow in holiness and be freed from the consequences of sin.

Confession is still required for a plenary indulgence, even if you have no mortal sins. The *Apostolic Constitution on Indulgences* states that sacramental confession is required to acquire a plenary indulgence. There is no exception for one who is not conscious of mortal sin:

"To acquire a plenary indulgence, it is necessary to perform the work to which the indulgence is attached and to fulfill three conditions: sacramental confession, Eucharistic Communion, and prayer for the intentions of the Supreme Pontiff. It is further required that all attachment to sin, even to venial sin, be absent. If this disposition is in any way less than complete, or if the prescribed three conditions are not fulfilled, the indulgence will be only partial" (*ACI*, 7).

While venial sins are indeed forgiven at Mass, Confession remains necessary for a plenary indulgence because it deepens our conversion, detaches us from sin, and ensures we receive the grace needed for the full remission of temporal punishment. The Church allows Confession to be made within 20 days before or after performing the indulgenced work. One sacramental Confession suffices for several plenary indulgences, but a separate Holy Communion and a separate prayer for the Holy Father's intentions are required for each plenary indulgence.

Sing to the Lord: The Vital Role of Sacred Music in Worship

How Music Elevates Prayer, Unites the Faithful, and Draws Us Closer to God

Liturgical music is a central part to Catholic worship. From the expression of the text to the ritual itself, liturgical music weds together theology and human emotion in such a way that only music can accomplish. Nothing else can combine the human emotional experience and the liturgical experiences of God quite like music. The sacred liturgies are not merely accompanied by the addition of music to pass the time, sacred music is integral and goes hand-in-hand with the liturgy. It is because of this that we strive for the very best in our music here at the Cathedral of Saint Joseph.

"Music, great music, distends the spirit, arouses profound emotions and almost naturally invites us to raise our minds and hearts to God in all situations of human existence, the joyful and the sad. Music can become prayer." Pope Benedict XVI

Music that blends both spiritual and artistic excellence, is liturgical – it is sacred. Such music has the ability to cultivate, strengthen, and deepen the spiritual experience of those gathered for worship. The musical tradition of the Church is a treasure of immeasurable value. Liturgical music never dominates, but serves. Sacred music imparts spiritual truth to one's mind, heart, and soul. It displays a dimension of meaning and feeling that mere words cannot. Music makes prayer more pleasing, promotes a sense of congregational unity, and confers greater solemnity upon the sacred rites.

"The singing of the Church comes ultimately out of love. It is the utter depth of love that produces the singing. *"Cantare amantis est"*, says St. Augustine, singing is a lover's thing. In so saying, we come again to the Trinitarian interpretation of Church music. The Holy Spirit is love, and it is he who produces the singing. He is the Spirit of Christ, the Spirit who draws us into love for Christ and so leads to the Father." -Pope Benedict XVI, "The Spirit of the Liturgy", (SF, CA: Ignatius, 2000), p. 142. Singing is an expression of joy. In Colossians 3:16, St. Paul exhorts the faithful assembled in expectation of their Lord's return to sing together. He says, "Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly..., singing psalms, hymns, and spiritual songs with gratitude in your hearts to God." Our relationship with God is one of love, and whether we sing loudly or softly, on pitch or out of tune, sing! St. Augustine, as quoted above, very rightly says that, "it is natural for a lover to sing.," and that "those who sing pray twice."



One of the most rewarding things for a liturgical musician (cantor, choir member, or organist) is to hear a congregation united in song singing their praise to God. Music serves to unite together those who worship. The Church encourages all to participate more fully in the liturgy by singing. God is not judging the pitch, tone, or quality of our voices - he is listening to the heart. We sing as a congregation, not worried about our individual quality, to unite in praising God. Throughout Scripture, the command to sing is given to God's people more than four hundred times. It is not an option, nor is it a recommendation. It is a command appropriate for everyone. The only requirement is to have a song to sing, and all Christians have a song to sing: the song of the redeemed. The great hymnist Isaac Watts said, "Let those refuse to sing who never knew our God. We who do know God, must never refuse to sing!" There are no prerequisites to sing this song, God simply says, "Sing!" So sing your praise, your song of love to God – He will surely be pleased.
