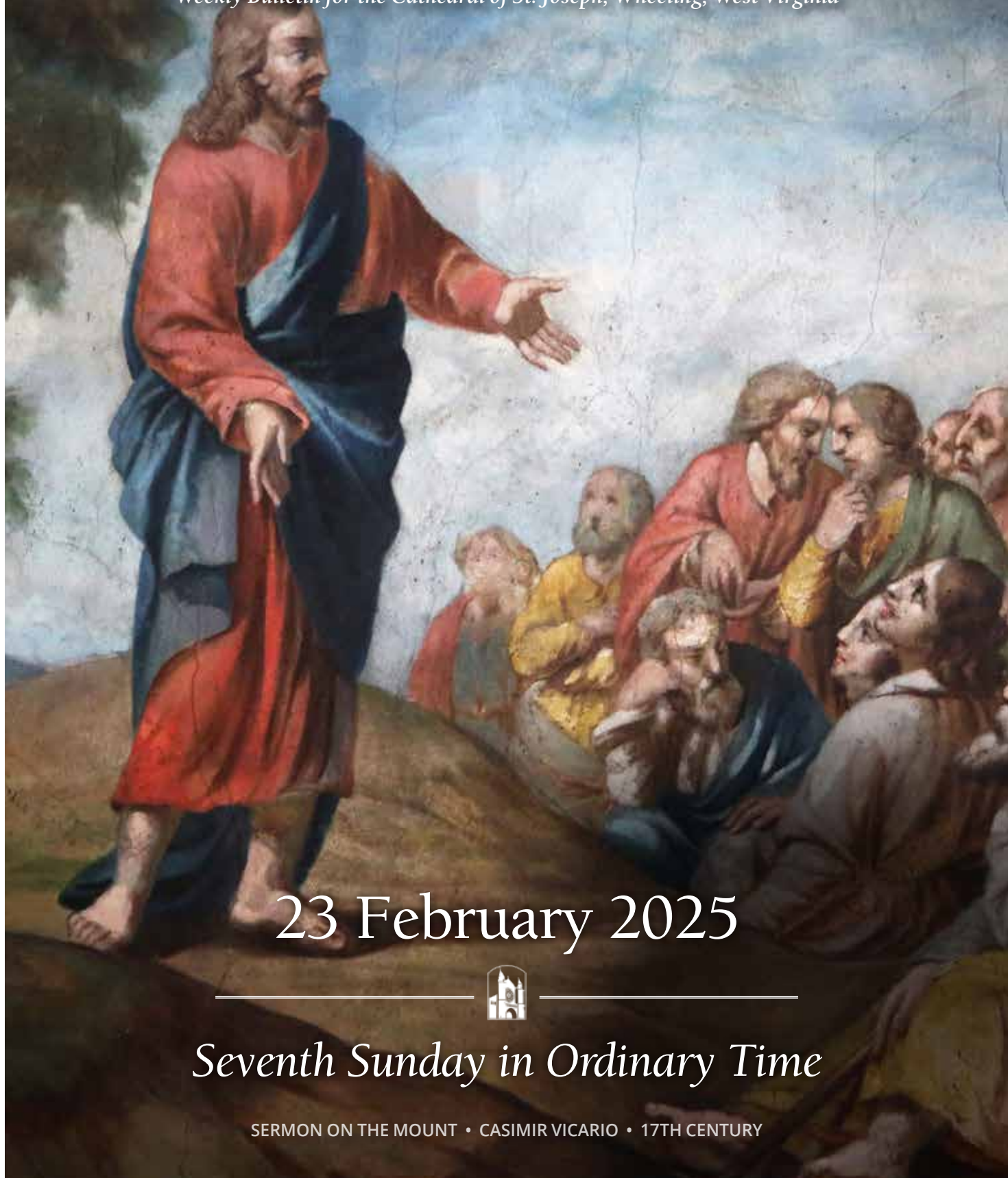

RECTOR'S REFLECTIONS

Dear Friends in Christ Jesus,

In today's Gospel, Jesus challenges us to embrace a radical way of living: "Be merciful, just as your Father is merciful" (Lk 6:36). He calls us not to judge or condemn but to forgive and give generously. This is not always easy, but it is the path of true discipleship. When we show mercy, we reflect the heart of God and open ourselves to His grace.

As we approach Lent, which begins in just over a week on Ash Wednesday, March 5, now is the time to prepare our hearts for this sacred season. Lent is a time of renewal—a time to return to the Lord through prayer, fasting, and almsgiving. I encourage you to start thinking about how you can make this Lent fruitful. What areas of your life need God's mercy? How can you grow closer to Him? Setting a Lenten plan now will help you enter the season with purpose and devotion.

State Funding for parents wishing to send their children to a Catholic school.

Applications for new students will open on March 1, 2025. The Hope Scholarship Board will accept applications year-round, but the timing of submission of the original application for the program will determine the amount of the Hope Scholarship received for the student's initial year of participation in the program. The application windows for 2025-2026 and the corresponding funding amounts are outlined in the chart below:

Application Window & Funding Amount

Mar 1, 2025 – June 15, 2025	100% of Scholarship
Jun 16, 2025 – Sept 15, 2025	75% of Scholarship
Sept 16, 2025 – Nov 30, 2025	50% of Scholarship
Dec 1, 2025 – Feb 28, 2026	25% of Scholarship

Cathedral of St. Joseph Named Pilgrimage Site

The Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston has designated four pilgrimage sites for the Jubilee Year 2025, including our own Cathedral of St. Joseph!

The other sites are the Basilica of the Co-Cathedral of the Sacred Heart (Charleston), St. Patrick Church (Weston), and St. Joseph Parish (Martinsburg).

From now until December 28, 2025, the faithful are invited to visit these locations to obtain a Jubilee Indulgence, as called for by Pope Francis. To receive this special grace, pilgrims must:

Make a brief pilgrimage to one of the designated sites as a sign of conversion and hope.

Pray—by participating in Holy Mass, Liturgy of the Hours, the Stations of the Cross, or the Rosary.

Confess—receive the Sacrament of Reconciliation within 20 days before or after the pilgrimage.

Receive Holy Communion, reflecting on the hope God gives.

Pray for the Holy Father and his intentions, with the Our Father and Hail Mary recommended.

A Plenary Indulgence may be applied to oneself or a soul in purgatory and can be obtained once per day.

On the first Sunday of each month, at the principal Mass (10:30 a.m. at the Cathedral of St. Joseph), special recognition and blessings will be given to visiting pilgrims.

SAINT OF THE WEEK

St. Gregory of Narek (c. 950–1003)

Feast Day: February 27

St. Gregory of Narek was an Armenian monk, mystic, and poet whose writings continue to inspire deep prayer and devotion. Born into a family of scholars, he became a monk at Narek Monastery, dedicating his life to contemplation, writing, and teaching.



His most famous work, *Book of Lamentations*, is a profound collection of poetic prayers expressing humility, repentance, and trust in God's mercy. Often called the "Doctor of Prayer," Gregory's writings bridge the human soul with divine love, making him one of Armenia's greatest spiritual figures.

Recognized as a Doctor of the Church in 2015, he is honored for his deep mystical insight and theological brilliance.

CATHEDRAL MAINTENANCE FUND

Our beautiful Cathedral, rich in history and faith, is in need of some important repairs and upgrades to preserve its integrity for future generations. The Diocesan Office of Buildings and Properties and our Cathedral Finance Council has identified three critical maintenance projects that require attention:

Roof Repairs: A significant leak in the roof, especially problematic during strong winds, threatens further interior damage. The estimated repair is around \$145,000.

Wall Repairs: Cracked limestone near one of the transept windows needs urgent attention to prevent further deterioration. The estimated cost for this repair is \$9,680.

HVAC System Replacement: Our air conditioning system is aging, and the refrigerant it uses is now obsolete. The air handlers are nearing the end of their lifespan, with an estimated replacement cost of approximately \$250,000.

WHY DO WE DO THAT?

Catholic Life Explained:

Mardi Gras

Question:

Carnivale and Mardi Gras celebrations are linked to Ash Wednesday, Lent, fast and abstinence. Can you tell us more about the connections between these events?

Answer:

Ash Wednesday is the beginning of the forty days known as Lent. Every year, Christians highlight this penitential season as a time of self-examination, reformation of one's life, and continued development of a deeper spiritual life. The recommended practices of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving become the focus of Lenten activity and ritual. Each of these spiritual practices is aimed at personal discipline as well as continued concern for the other, especially the poor or alienated.

Forty days is a symbolic biblical period of time, during which personal transformation occurs and out of which people surface as more spiritual, ready to carry out God's mission. Relying on God's providence and care, no matter how difficult life becomes, is crucial to Lenten spirituality. Fasting was initially stricter, permitting only one simple meal a day without meat, fish, or other delicacies. Such things were not even allowed in the house.

In order to prepare for this in an age of no refrigeration, people gathered to consume whatever was not allowed during Lent. This led to parties or celebrations originally referred to as Carnivale, literally meaning "goodbye to meat," or Mardi Gras, literally meaning "Fat Tuesday." The eating and celebrating ended on the Tuesday just before Ash Wednesday. Today we focus more on moderation in all things, as well as a strong concern the poor. What are you doing for the poor this Lent?

Sing to the Lord: The Vital Role of Sacred Music in Worship

How Music Elevates Prayer, Unites the Faithful, and Draws Us Closer to God

Liturgical music is a central part to Catholic worship. From the expression of the text to the ritual itself, liturgical music weds together theology and human emotion in such a way that only music can accomplish. Nothing else can combine the human emotional experience and the liturgical experiences of God quite like music. The sacred liturgies are not merely accompanied by the addition of music to pass the time, sacred music is integral and goes hand-in-hand with the liturgy. It is because of this that we strive for the very best in our music here at the Cathedral of Saint Joseph.

"Music, great music, distends the spirit, arouses profound emotions and almost naturally invites us to raise our minds and hearts to God in all situations of human existence, the joyful and the sad. Music can become prayer." Pope Benedict XVI

Music that blends both spiritual and artistic excellence, is liturgical – it is sacred. Such music has the ability to cultivate, strengthen, and deepen the spiritual experience of those gathered for worship. The musical tradition of the Church is a treasure of immeasurable value. Liturgical music never dominates, but serves. Sacred music imparts spiritual truth to one's mind, heart, and soul. It displays a dimension of meaning and feeling that mere words cannot. Music makes prayer more pleasing, promotes a sense of congregational unity, and confers greater solemnity upon the sacred rites.

"The singing of the Church comes ultimately out of love. It is the utter depth of love that produces the singing. *"Cantare amantis est"*, says St. Augustine, singing is a lover's thing. In so saying, we come again to the Trinitarian interpretation of Church music. The Holy Spirit is love, and it is he who produces the singing. He is the Spirit of Christ, the Spirit who draws us into love for Christ and so leads to the Father." -Pope Benedict XVI, "The Spirit of the Liturgy", (SF, CA: Ignatius, 2000), p. 142. Singing is an expression of joy. In Colossians 3:16, St. Paul exhorts the faithful assembled in expectation of their Lord's return to sing together. He says, "Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly..., singing psalms, hymns, and spiritual songs with gratitude in your hearts to God." Our relationship with God is one of love, and whether we sing loudly or softly, on pitch or out of tune, sing! St. Augustine, as quoted above, very rightly says that, "it is natural for a lover to sing.," and that "those who sing pray twice."



One of the most rewarding things for a liturgical musician (cantor, choir member, or organist) is to hear a congregation united in song singing their praise to God. Music serves to unite together those who worship. The Church encourages all to participate more fully in the liturgy by singing. God is not judging the pitch, tone, or quality of our voices - he is listening to the heart. We sing as a congregation, not worried about our individual quality, to unite in praising God. Throughout Scripture, the command to sing is given to God's people more than four hundred times. It is not an option, nor is it a recommendation. It is a command appropriate for everyone. The only requirement is to have a song to sing, and all Christians have a song to sing: the song of the redeemed. The great hymnist Isaac Watts said, "Let those refuse to sing who never knew our God. We who do know God, must never refuse to sing!" There are no prerequisites to sing this song, God simply says, "Sing!" So sing your praise, your song of love to God – He will surely be pleased.
