RECTOR'S REFLECTIONS

Dear brothers and sisters,

In today's Gospel, Jesus tells us, "You are the salt of the earth... You are the light of the world." (Matthew 5:13-16) With these words, the Lord reminds us that our faith is not meant to be hidden or kept only for ourselves. Salt gives flavor, and light drives away darkness. In the same way, our lives as Christians should make a real difference in the world around us.

To be salt and light means living our faith with joy and courage. It means choosing kindness, honesty, and mercy in our daily lives. Catholic faith is not meant to be dull or lifeless. It is meant to be alive, joyful, and exciting, because it is rooted in our relationship with Jesus Christ. When we truly love the Lord, that joy becomes contagious and draws others closer to Him.

This Wednesday, we celebrate the Memorial of Our Lady of Lourdes, a beautiful feast day that reminds us of Mary's care for the sick and suffering. This day is also the World Day of the Sick, when the Church prays in a special way for all who are ill, elderly, or struggling in body or spirit. We will celebrate a special Mass with the Anointing of the Sick at St. Alphonsus Church at 6:00 p.m. Prior to Mass, at 5:30 p.m., we will pray the Holy Rosary, and if the weather cooperates, we will have a brief procession around Centre Market, beginning at St. Alphonsus. All are welcome and encouraged to join us for this evening of prayer and healing.

May the Lord strengthen us to be salt and light in the world, and may our faith bring hope and comfort to all those we meet.

On February 11, the Memorial of Our Lady of Lourdes, the Church observes the World Day of the Sick, a time to pray for the suffering and to recognize those who care for them. Established by Pope St. John Paul II, this day reminds us of the healing love of Christ and the powerful intercession of Our Lady, who appeared to St. Bernadette in Lourdes, France, a place now known for miraculous healings.

To commemorate this special day, we will celebrate a Healing Mass with the Anointing of the Sick on Wednesday, February 11 at 6:00 p.m. at St. Alphonus. We invite all who are burdened—physically, emotionally, or spiritually—to come and receive God's grace.

What is the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick?

The Church sees the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick as a way of carrying forth Christ's ministry of healing. This sacrament has its origin in apostolic times (Jas 5:14-15). A priest lays hands on the sick person, anoints their forehead and hands with blessed oil, and prays for God's grace, mercy, and healing (CCC 1513). It can be administered at home, in a hospital, or in a church, for individuals or groups (CCC 1517).

When should a Catholic receive this sacrament?

Seriously ill persons and older persons in weak condition should be encouraged to ask for the anointing. Sick children may be anointed if their understanding allows them to be comforted by the sacrament.

What is the primary effect of this sacrament?

The hope, if it be God's will, is that the person is physically healed of illness. But even if there is no physical healing, the primary effect of the sacrament is a spiritual healing by which the sick person receives the Holy Spirit's gift of peace and courage to deal with the difficulties that accompany serious illness or the frailty of old age.

Whether you seek healing for yourself or want to pray for loved ones in need, this is a powerful opportunity to encounter Christ's mercy and Our Lady's intercession.

A Gift for the Holy Father Art, Hope, and an Encounter at the Vatican

On January 28, 2026, our Pastoral Associate, Tyler Greenwood, together with his wife Christie and our Sacristan, Martin Imbroscio, had the joy of meeting Pope Leo XIV at the Vatican. During their encounter, they shared news of the upcoming 100th Anniversary of the Cathedral of St. Joseph and assured the Holy Father of the prayers of our Cathedral family. Pope Leo was delighted to hear of the Centennial celebration and offered his prayers and best wishes as we prepare to mark this historic milestone. As a gift, they presented him with a framed sketch of our Cathedral, a work of art carrying a story far deeper than its frame.



The sketch was created by an artist incarcerated at Mount Olive Correctional Complex in West Virginia. Though he has never seen the Cathedral in person, he drew it out of gratitude for the relationships, faith, and sense of belonging he has discovered through people connected to our parish. For him, art has become a way to seek healing and to reflect on the mercy of God.



His early life was marked by poverty, homelessness, and foster care. Searching for belonging, he made choices that led to devastating consequences, including a violent act that took another man's life. At sentencing, he was told there was

nothing good in him and that he would never leave prison. Those words nearly ended his life.

In his darkest moment, he remembered one thing he could still offer, his ability to create. He committed himself to using his art as an act of restitution, a way to bring something good into a world where he had caused harm. Through connections with the House of Hagar Catholic Worker in Wheeling and parishioners of the Cathedral, his artwork began reaching beyond prison walls. His work has since been shared nationally through Catholic initiatives focused on human dignity, justice, and hope.

The Cathedral sketch itself includes a striking detail. Drawn on found cardboard, it contains only one touch of color, a small gold cross placed above where the tabernacle would be. The artist did not know this detail about our Cathedral. He simply felt inspired to include it, a quiet reminder of Christ's presence at the heart of all things.

As we prepare to celebrate our Centennial this April, this gift reminds us that the Cathedral is more than stone and glass. It is a place where mercy is proclaimed, dignity is restored, and hope is kept alive. May this story invite us not only to help others carry their crosses, but also to recognize and lift up the good God continues to bring into the world through every human life.

SAINT OF THE WEEK

St. Scholastica (c.480-543)

Feast Day: February 10

St. Scholastica, the twin sister of Saint Benedict, dedicated her life to God and became one of the first women in monastic life. She founded a monastery for women near Monte Cassino, following her brother's Rule of Saint Benedict, and embraced a life of prayer, study, and devotion. Her deep love for Christ and commitment to the religious life made her a model of faith and perseverance.



She is best known for her final meeting with Benedict. Knowing her death was near, she prayed that he would stay and continue their holy conversation. When he refused, a sudden and violent storm arose, preventing his departure. Benedict later saw her soul ascend to heaven in the form of a dove, a sign of her purity and union with God.

Scholastica's life reminds us of the power of prayer, the importance of spiritual friendships, and the beauty of a heart devoted to God. She is the patron saint of nuns and is also invoked against storms.

WHY DO WE DO THAT? Catholic Life Explained:

Divine Praises

Question:

What is the origin of the Divine Praises?

Answer:

The Divine Praises originated in the late 18th century, composed by Blessed Luigi Felici, an Italian priest, in 1797. They were originally written as a prayer of reparation for blasphemy and profane language. Pope Pius VII later expanded the prayer by adding more invocations, including praises for the Sacred Heart of Jesus, the Immaculate Conception, and St. Joseph.

The Divine Praises are traditionally recited after Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament as a way to honor and glorify God, the Blessed Virgin Mary, and various sacred truths of the Catholic faith. The prayer begins with "Blessed be God. Blessed be His Holy Name." and continues with praises for Jesus, the Holy Spirit, Mary, St. Joseph, and the angels. Over time, the prayer became an important part of Eucharistic devotion, fostering a spirit of reverence and gratitude for God's holiness and presence.

The recitation of the Divine Praises serves as a reminder to use speech to glorify rather than dishonor God. It invites the faithful to reflect on the sacredness of God's name and the blessings He has given. By publicly proclaiming these praises, Catholics affirm their faith and counter the increasing secularization and misuse of sacred language in the world.
