RECTOR'S REFLECTIONS

Dear Friends in Christ Jesus,

In today's Gospel, Jesus sends out seventy-two disciples, instructing them to go ahead of Him and proclaim that "the Kingdom of God is at hand" (Luke 10:9). Before sending them, He says something that remains just as urgent today: "The harvest is abundant, but the laborers are few; so ask the master of the harvest to send out laborers for his harvest" (Luke 10:2).

The Church cannot flourish without holy and faithful vocations. When there are good and generous shepherds, the flock is nurtured, and the mission of the Church is carried out with joy. Here in our Diocese, we must continually foster a culture of vocations - especially by praying daily that young people will have the courage to say "yes" to Christ.

Our Lady of Mount Carmel Mass with Brown Scapular Enrollment

Join us on Wednesday, July 16 at 7:00 p.m. for a special evening Mass in honor of the Feast of Our Lady of Mount Carmel. During the Mass, those in attendance will have the opportunity to be enrolled in the Confraternity of the Brown Scapular and invested with the Scapular.

The Feast of Our Lady of Mount Carmel memorializes the apparition of the Blessed Virgin Mary to St. Simon Stock, a Carmelite priest, and her gift to him of the "Brown Scapular" on July 16, 1251. "Take, beloved son," she said, "this Scapular of your order as a badge of my confraternity and for you and all Carmelites a special sign of grace; whoever dies in this garment will not suffer everlasting fire. It is the sign of salvation, a safeguard in dangers, a pledge of peace and of the covenant." The Carmelites immediately began to wear this Scapular as part of their regular habit, and very soon many non-Carmelites also began to wear it—usually in a smaller form of two small pieces of cloth bound by two strings, worn around the neck, hanging down in front and back.



From the beginning, it was understood that, in order to participate in Our Lady's promises, the wearer of the Scapular must be officially associated with the Carmelite Order. So, the Carmelites established the "Confraternity of the Blessed Virgin of Mount Carmel," which any Catholic may be enrolled in through a short ceremony conducted by a priest. Even so, the Scapular is in no way a "good luck charm." As St. John Paul II wrote, it is a sign that evokes "the awareness that devotion to her cannot be limited to prayers and tributes in her honor on certain occasions, but must become a 'habit,' that is, a permanent orientation of one's own Christian conduct, woven of prayer and interior life, through frequent reception of the sacraments, and the concrete practice of the spiritual and corporal works of mercy."

A Faith Planted in Freedom: The Rich History of Catholicism in America

Catholicism in the United States has a long and inspiring history. The Church has grown from scattered missionary outposts into the largest single religious body in the country. Her story is one of perseverance, patriotism, and deep faith - a story woven into the fabric of American life.

Early Catholic Footprints in the New World

Long before the U.S. was founded, Catholic missionaries arrived on American shores. Spanish Franciscans brought the Gospel to Florida in the 1500s—St. Augustine, founded in 1565, is the oldest continuously inhabited European-established settlement in the continental U.S. French Jesuits evangelized in the Great Lakes and Mississippi regions, and English Catholics, seeking religious freedom, founded Maryland in 1634.

Though Maryland was initially a haven, tolerance there eventually faded. Still, it marked an early attempt at religious freedom—an ideal that would later be enshrined in the Constitution.

Persecution and Patriotism

By the Revolutionary War, Catholics were a small and often distrusted minority—only about 25,000 in a population of two million. Nevertheless, they fought for independence. Charles Carroll of Carrollton, a Catholic, signed the Declaration of Independence. After the war, America's religious liberty offered Catholics new hope.

In 1789, John Carroll was named the first bishop of the United States. A man of vision and faith, he laid the foundations of the American Church—establishing parishes, schools, and the first seminary in Baltimore, Maryland.

Immigration and Expansion

The 19th and early 20th centuries saw millions of Catholic immigrants arrive from Ireland, Germany, Italy, Poland, and elsewhere. Despite facing prejudice and violence, they brought faith, culture, and strength. Parishes and Catholic schools became centers of faith and community.

Religious sisters and brothers founded hospitals, orphanages, and universities. The Church grew rapidly, becoming a vital force in American life.

American Catholics and Public Life

Over time, Catholics entered public life more fully. In 1928, Al Smith became the first Catholic to run for president. Though he lost, his campaign paved the way for John F. Kennedy's election in 1960. Kennedy's speech on his Catholic faith and loyalty to the Constitution marked a turning point.

By the mid-20th century, Catholicism was no longer on the margins. The Second Vatican Council renewed the Church's mission—emphasizing the dignity of the laity, the importance of evangelization, and the Church's role in the modern world.

Challenges and Witness Today

The Church has faced deep trials, especially the clergy abuse crisis, which wounded many and demanded reform. Secularism and cultural shifts present new challenges. Yet the Church endures—not through power, but through faithful witness: in parishes, Catholic schools, food pantries, hospitals, and homes.

Today, American Catholicism is vibrant and diverse, with a growing Latino presence, committed young people, and renewed efforts in catechesis and evangelization.

Looking to the Future

As we look to the future, the Catholic Church remains a vital moral voice in American life—defending the dignity of every human person, promoting peace and justice, and proclaiming the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

The legacy of those who came before us—missionaries, martyrs, immigrants, and saints—reminds us that we are not alone. With the Eucharist as our strength and the saints as our companions, we press forward in faith, building a civilization of love in this land we call home.

LIVING OUR FAITH

Grow closer to the Eucharist as a family this summer



Though school is out, summer is a great time for families to grow in faith—especially by centering your home life around the Eucharist. There are simple ways to deepen your

children's love for the Eucharist both at Mass and at home.

Parents, Begin With Yourself

Think of the adults who passed on the faith to you—your children need you to do the same. By helping them understand Christ's Real Presence in the Eucharist, you give them the greatest source of safety, love, and peace. Jesus promised to remain with us always, and He does so most perfectly in the Holy Eucharist.

Read the Bible Together

Revisit the Scriptures with your children, especially the Eucharistic and Passover stories. Talk about their meaning. The Holy Spirit will guide you as you pass on the faith within your home.

Attend Mass as a Family

If you've fallen out of the habit, this is a great time to return to Sunday Mass. Sit near the altar so your children can see clearly. Talk to them about the signs and symbols of the liturgy—holy water, vestments, candles, colors. Read the Gospel ahead of time and discuss it after.

Help children learn to be reverent in church—not just quiet, but prayerful. Invite them to imagine angels adoring the Eucharist, to light candles, give alms, and pray for special intentions.

Look to Young Saints

Introduce your children to young saints who loved the Eucharist, such as Francisco, Jacinta, and Lucia of Fatima; Little Nellie of Holy God; Blessed Carlo Acutis; Saint Tarcisius; and Blessed Imelda Lambertini.

Encourage Small Acts of Love

Teach little acts of reverence—making the Sign of the Cross when passing a church, visiting the Blessed Sacrament, or spending quiet family prayer time with the Lord.



The month of July is traditionally dedicated to the Most Precious Blood of Jesus. The feast of the Precious Blood of our Lord was instituted in 1849 by Pius IX, but the devotion is as old as Christianity. The early Fathers say that the Church was born from the pierced side of Christ, and that the sacraments were brought forth through His Blood.

Ways to Honor the Precious Blood of Jesus

- Pray the Litany of the Precious Blood
- Spend some time in Eucharistic Adoration
- Pray the Divine Mercy Chaplet

2025 Jubilee Year Pilgrims of Hope



The Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston has designated four pilgrimage sites for the Jubilee Year 2025, including our own Cathedral of St. Joseph!

The other sites are the Basilica of the Co-Cathedral of the Sacred Heart (Charleston), St. Patrick Church (Weston), and St. Joseph Parish (Martinsburg).

From now until December 28, 2025, the faithful are invited to visit these locations to obtain a Jubilee Indulgence, as called for by Pope Francis. To receive this special grace, pilgrims must:

Make a brief pilgrimage to one of the designated sites as a sign of conversion and hope.

Pray—by participating in Holy Mass, Liturgy of the Hours, the Stations of the Cross, or the Rosary.

Confess—receive the Sacrament of Reconciliation within 20 days before or after the pilgrimage.

Receive Holy Communion, reflecting on the hope God gives.

Pray for the Holy Father and his intentions, with the Our Father and Hail Mary recommended.

A Plenary Indulgence may be applied to oneself or a soul in purgatory and can be obtained once per day.

WHY DO WE DO THAT?

Catholic Life Explained:

Carry Your Cross

Question:

As Catholics, we talk a lot about “redemptive suffering” and “carrying your cross.” What does that mean practically in daily life?

Answer:

When Jesus spoke these words, they would have sounded quite intense to his hearers. “Pick up your cross daily and follow me.” At the time, Jesus hadn’t yet been crucified. A cross was a Roman torture instrument. “Pick up the thing that tortures you the most,” Jesus seemed to say. Unfortunately, most of us have no real shortage of these in our life. To take up the cross isn’t to seek out new sufferings in our life. It’s to accept the life we have.

Of course, unjust or unhealthy circumstances should be rectified when possible. But there are always circumstances that remain out of our immediate control. It could be pain management, the defiance of our teenage child, or an unhealthy work environment ... but you need the paycheck to pay the bills. In difficult circumstances, it can be easier to blame, complain, or daydream our way out of it. None of these are real solutions, since none of them accept the reality of the situation at hand. Those options only add to our suffering, since they damage relationships, fixate on the problem, or set up unrealistic expectations.

Instead, Jesus invites us to take up our cross — to look at the uncomfortable situation square in the eyes, take a deep breath, and do our best to be present to God’s grace in the moment. To love those in our path. To take things one step at a time.

Wall Repairs: Cracked limestone near a transept window needs urgent repair — \$9,680

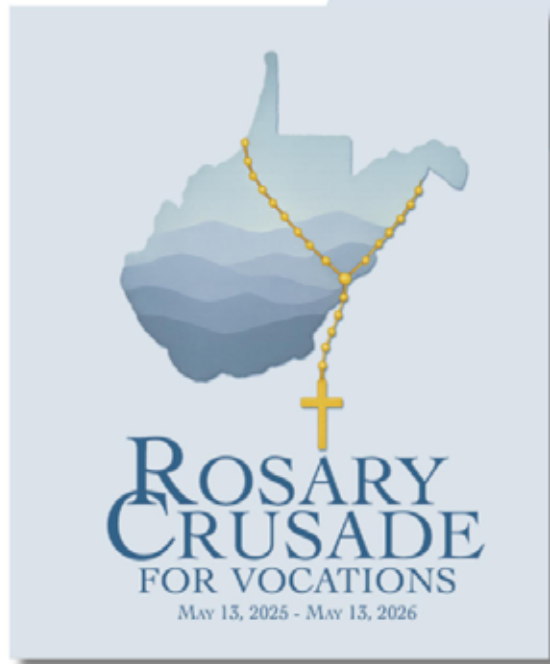
HVAC Replacement: Our aging system and obsolete refrigerant require full replacement — \$250,000

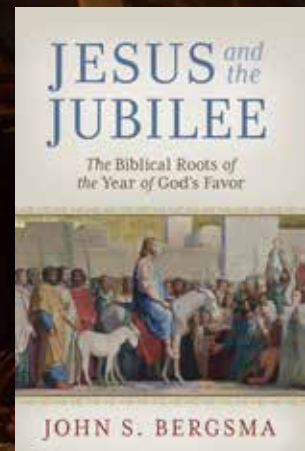
